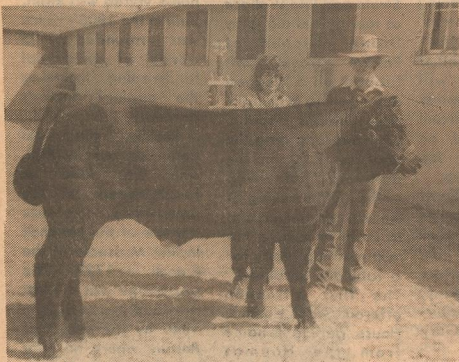

# Couples Return From Recent Cruise

Mr. and Mrs. Bill McCaghen and Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Dirickson returned recently from a week's cruise on the Delta Queen up the Mississippi River.

A group of 38 people, sponsored by Leading Ladies of Republic Bank of Lubbock, with Dudley Strain and Rita Wallace as tour guides aided by Diane Mitchell of Envoye Travel, left Lubbock on a Wednesday morning arriving in New Orleans about 5 p.m. and boarding the boat by 7:00 on the start up the river.

The gentle rolling of the waves put everyone to sleep to awake the next morning ready for a fabulous breakfast. The first attraction offered was Houmas House, getting its name from the Houmas Indians who at one time occupied this territory. Antebellum homes, fine architecture and furnishings reflecting the period of 1840 were viewed during this showing.

Reaching Baton Rouge, the next tour began by visiting the rural life museum; seeing what plantation life was like by strolling through the 20 buildings with all types of artifacts to be seen; visiting Magnolia Mound where ladies in costume tell of life in the 1790's and see old-fashioned cooking where hot breads are made in the oven; the state capital which is the tallest state building of all 50 states (thanks to

Huey Long); the two governors mansions, one of which is exactly like the White House and lastly the LSU campus.

The Natchez tour began with the viewing of homes in which the group was greeted by ladies in antebellum costumes. The first home visited was Elgin, built in the 1800's which was surrounded by 25 acres of informal landscaping including the original family's cemetery.

Rosalie, the next home was built in 1820, and was used as headquarters for the union army. It is near the site of the Natchez Indian Massacre of the French in 1729. The parsonage was the last stop and it was built in 1840 by the owner of Rosalie where his wife was hostess to Methodist ministers.

A later tour was a pageant at the civic center in Natchez, showing the true glamour the south displayed in pre-civil war times, a truly beautiful and spectacular show.

The St. Francesville tour depicted the mid 1800's where half of the millionaires in America lived. Today it is a sleeping little river town. Many old mansions as Rosedown Plantation, Stanton Hall, Carriage House and the Virginia House was visited.

French and Spanish cuisine were enjoyed both on the boat and New Orleans. There was fried chicken, fish dishes of all sorts, Juiche Lorraine, pecan pie, and champagne. In New Orleans such famous eateries as Antoinette (since 1840 still going in one family), Brennan's, Delmonico, French Market Restaurant, Andrew Martin's Cajun Cuisine and the list goes on.

The nights were filled with fun, games, dancing and music by "Vic" Tookers Riverboat Ramblers. The main attraction was the versatile "Vic" who manned eight or ten different musical instruments. The last song was sung by a huge negro man who sang "Hello Dolly" impersonating Louis (Satchmo) Armstrong, brought the house down. This number was repeated by requests the last night.

The tour of New Orleans by Gragline Tours was the last. The group explained for Lubbock.

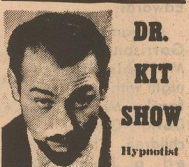

## ASCS Advises Farmers On Planting Conservation Acres

Farmers in the Matador area who participate in the 1983 Reduced Acreage Program (RAP) should consider planting their conservation use acreage to soil improving over crops this spring, a local conservation leader said this week.

James Gillespie, district conservationist for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service at Matador, said crops of forage sorghum, small grains or, cowpeas, reduce erosion while adding badly needed organic matter to the soil.

"Some farmers might want to fallow their diverted acreage to save operating expenses," Gillespie said. "We can't argue with the need to save money, but if they leave their land bare all year, wind erosion could be severe."

Gillespie said personnel on his staff use a formula called the Wind Erosion Equation to predict erosion on cropland. It considers such factors as cover, length of unprotected field width, surface roughness, surface texture, and climate.

The equation, developed by USDA's Agricultural Research Service (ARS), shows that erosion on bare, fallow land can be enormous compared to land protected by a close growing drilled crop.

A typical soil in the Motley area is a Miles loamy fine sand. Under bare, fallow conditions, yearlong soil loss could reach 25-30 tons per acre, mostly to wind erosion. Under a cotton following cotton system where the land is plowed and replowed after harvest, soil loss from wind erosion averages about 25 tons per acre and four tons from water erosion. There would be almost no erosion if the land were protected with a close drilled crop.

Cotton burs can also be used to prevent wind erosion. SCS personnel use the Wind Erosion Equation to calculate the amount of hours of burs needed to prevent erosion based on the individual soil. Usually, three to five tons per acre are needed.

Approved chemicals may be used to control undesirable plant growth. The conservation use acreage may also be seeded to crops such as wheat in the fall for harvest the next year.

The ASCS State Committee has designated certain sorghum and sorghum-grass crosses that are eligible for planting as cover crops. The approved crops are listed in the Sorghum Classification Guide published by the Texas Agricultural Service. Approved crop are limited to Classifications 11, "hybrids sold for forage having feed grain and sweet sorghum as parents;

showing sweet sorghum characteristics" and Classification V, "hybrids which have a grass type as one or more parents and show grass sorghum characteristics."

SCS personnel give technical assistance to landowners and operators in planning, installing, and maintaining conservation measures through the local Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District.

Gillespie urged farmers to try to keep at least 2,000 pounds of crop residues on the surface most of the year to prevent erosion. To accomplish what SCS calls conservation tillage, there should be a minimum of 1,000 pounds of grain sorghum on the surface after the next year's crops is planted and 500 pounds of small grain residue after planting time.

You can make a good estimate of the residue your crop produces and the amount you are

leaving on the land.

For every bushel of wheat you harvest, for example, you will produce about 100 pounds of residue. A 20 bushel wheat crop should produce about 2,000 pounds of residue.

For grain sorghum, multiply your yield in pounds by 1.35; a 3,000 pound sorghum crop produces about 4,000 pounds of residue.

Now, every trip you make across your land with a plow buries residues. A tandem disc destroys about 25 percent each trip. Starting with your 2,000 pounds of residue, one discing cuts it to 1,500 pounds. The next discing cuts it to 1,125 pounds.

But chiseling destroys about 15 percent of the surface cover each trip. Three trips with a chisel on the same 2,000 pounds of residue would leave 1,228 pounds where as three trips with a disk leaves only 843 pounds/acre.

## Foot Facts

### Nail Problems

One of the most common nail complaints seen in a podiatrist's office is thickened and/or discolored nails. Thick and discolored nails may be due to an old injury to the toe which also damaged the nail matrix. Usually, however, they will be due to a fungus infection of the nails.

A fungus is a microscopic organism which is also the cause of athlete's foot, ringworm, and numerous other skin conditions. If a scraping of the nail is chemically treated and examined under the microscope, some tiny strands or fibers, which are actually a sort of seed, may be seen. This is the only sure way to diagnose a fungus nail.

Fungus nails can occur at any age but they are definitely more common in the older age group (past 60) and men and women are equally affected.

People often wonder if fungus nails are contagious and the only

definite answer is, maybe. Basically, fungus nails behave in an unpredictable manner. A person can have one infected nail for years which never involves other nails. Or he can have a condition which slowly spreads to involve other nails but which may spare, for reasons unknown, one or more nails. Also, a man with severe fungus nails can sleep in the same bed as his wife for 40 years, and yet his wife may never develop the problem herself.

There are several treatment alternatives available. It may be decided after a discussion between podiatrist and patient that no treatment other than keeping the nail trimmed short is required. Or, a conservative home treatment with the application of a fungicide lotion to the nail may be used. In some cases, a surgical removal of the involved nail followed by home treatment may give the best results.

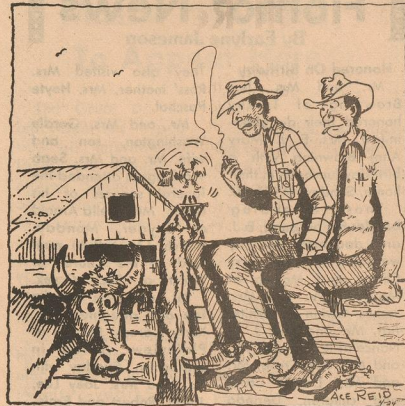

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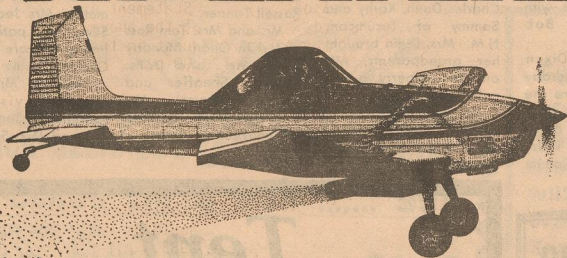

On or about April 12, 1983, the above-named City of Matador will request the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to release Federal funds under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (PL 93-383) as amended, to be used for the following projects:

Paving Improvements	104,940.00
Flood Drainage	18,020.00
Sewer Improvements	47,700.00

All of the above referenced projects will be located within the corporate City Limits of the City of Matador, Texas. It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and accordingly the above-named City of Matador has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (PL 91-190).

The Reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement are as follows:

**SEWER FACILITIES** - Health and safety hazards currently exist due to inadequate and improper sewage disposal. The proposed project should eliminate those health and safety hazards. Construction activities will produce certain amounts of air and noise pollution, however, the effects will be short term and low intensity.

**FLOOD DRAINAGE** - This project is needed to provide a run-off of excessive water build-up which currently is a problem after a rain. This project would construct a diversion channel from Campbell to Willow Street to handle the run-off and prevent the flooding of homes in the Target Area. The proposed project will eliminate a threat to health and safety of occupants of the Target Area. Construction activities will produce certain amounts of air and noise pollution, however, the effects will be short term.

**PAVING/DRAINAGE** - It is the major intent of the City of Matador to improve access for area residents within the neighborhood and into and out of their neighborhoods. Unpaved streets in the Target Areas create safety hazards and air pollution. The project will eliminate these problems. Minor grading and clearing will occur in regard to street improvements, but no long-term change in land characteristics will occur. Construction activities will produce certain amounts of very limited air and noise pollution over a short term. No major increases in traffic or auto exhaust pollution are expected.

An Environmental Review Record respecting the within projects has been made by the above-named City of Matador which documents the environmental review of the projects and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying upon request in the office of the City Secretary between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

No further environmental review of such projects is proposed to be conducted prior to the request for release of Federal funds.

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City of Matador, to the office of the undersigned. Such written comments should be received at P. O. Box 367, Matador, Texas 79244 on or before April 8, 1983. All such comments so received will be considered and the City of Matador, will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within projects prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

The City of Matador will undertake the projects described above with Block Grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Matador is certifying to HUD that the City of Matador and Gary Lancaster in his official capacity as Mayor consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision making and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval the City of Matador may use the Block Grant funds and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. HUD will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the certifying officer or other officer of applicant approved by HUD; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58) and may be addressed to Community Development Department of Housing & Urban Development, P. O. Box 10050, Dallas, Texas 75207.

Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD. No objection received after April 29, 1983 will be considered by HUD. The Chief Executive Officer of the City of Matador is Gary Lancaster.
