Legislation To Provide Cotton Growers Relief

Legislation to provide cotton growers needed relief from USDA's "harvest-for-Pik" plan moved closer to passage this week when a House-Senate conference committee added the proposal to a 1983 supplemental appropriations bill.

After the committee concludes action on matters unrelated to the cotton PIK provision, the appropriations conference report will go to the House and Senate for final approval before being sent to the President.

The cotton amendment, put forth by Chairman Jamie Whitten (D-Miss.) of the House Appropriations Committee, requires Agriculture Secretary John Block to reopen the cotton bid program to attempt to acquire additional cotton for meeting PIK obligations. Under USDA's previously announced plan, growers with insufficient 1980, '81, or '82 loan cotton to meet their PIK requirements would be forced to use their '83 crop which in many cases has already been forward contracted.

The Whitten amendment was identical to a bill introduced earlier by Chairman E. de la Garza (D-Tex.) of the House Agriculture Committee and Cotton Subcommittee Chair-

man Jerry Huckaby (D-La.) and approved 312-97 Tuesday by the full House. After the substantial margin of approval, conferees working on the supplemental appropriations bill agreed to the amendment late Tuesday night.

National Cotton Council President Gerald Brewer of Fresno, Calif., applauded the action which he said was strongly supported by the industrywide organization.

"It will not only restore balance in the PIK program by providing cotton producers equity with growers of other commodities, but will also help avoid the threat of widespread disruptions in the marketing of cotton," he stated.

The Council president praised efforts of Reps. Whitten, de la Garza, Huckaby, and others, saying this week's action would not have been possible without their leadership.

"The entire cotton industry owes them a special debt of gratitude," he added. Brewer also expressed appreciation for industry leaders all across the Cotton Belt who he said worked together in strong support of the legislation.

Home Health Care Available in County

In the past several years, Home Health Care has become a major provider of nursing services to all communities, but particularly to rural areas where the shortage of physicians and medical services are acute problems.

By providing an intermediary between the physician and the patient, a medical plan of care and Doctor's Orders can be carried out much more efficiently. Many times the control of health problems has meant the difference between an older person staying in their home or going into a nursing home. Although nursing homes are definitely a needed institution, most people would much prefer their own homes.

For the first time since nurses have been available in Motley County, home health care is being provided now as a local concern. Rolling Plains Health Care Inc. has been recently formed by local R.N.'s Marie Linson and Michelle Bearden. An office is currently located in Roaring Springs. It is specifically designed to care for the needs of rural communities without regard to race, creed, color or socio-economic level.

All care must be ordered by a physician and must be able to be provided safely. Services can be paid for by Medicare, Medicaid, Private Insurance, Private Pay and V.A. All billing will be taken care of by Rolling Plains Health Care.

Skilled nursing care consists of intramuscular and intravenous injections, Monitoring vital signs, monitoring for cardiac and respiratory problems, diabetes, cancer and post-surgical cases with dressing care. Special diet teaching is given and teaching of disease processes with measures to assist with problems. Catheter care and colostomy care is provided and family members are also taught, if possible, to provide aspects of

care. Currently, Rolling Plains Health Care is also involved in community education as well as giving blood pressure clinics in effort to prevent potential health problems.

Anyone in the community is able to refer persons to Rolling Plains Health Care: friends, relatives, minister, doctors, even the patients themselves. For further questions, please call 348-2211.

Mrs. Campbell, the former Mary Nichols, was born in Haywood County, Tenn., where she grew to womanhood and married Turner Campbell on May 25, 1919. Rabies Cases Are Up Sharply

Texas rabies cases are up sharply for the first third of 1983. During the first four months of this year, 333 cases of rabies were reported compared to 253 cases for the same time period last year. That's more than a 30 percent increase.

The big jump was due mainly to an increase in skunk rabies. Cases of skunk rabies for the first third of this year totaled 269 compared to 204 for the first four months of '82. Rabies cases also were up slightly in foxes, dogs, cats and cattle.

Cat rabies continue to pose the greatest potential danger of rabies exposures to humans. Cats, like dogs, may expose up to 20 or more people, a much higher number than wild animals.

Even though state law requires annual rabies vaccination of dogs and cats, a much lower percentage of cats are actually vaccinated than dogs. This situation is unfortunate because cats, being predatory

animals, are more likely to come in contact with wild animal rabies.

All dog and cat owners should make sure their pets are vaccinated annually against rabies. It's much easier and far less expensive to vaccinate a dog or cat than to provide post-exposure rabies treatment to humans.

Studies have shown that dogs and cats will not shed rabies virus as early as 10 days prior to showing signs of rabies. Therefore, a 10-day quarantine of these animals will determine if a bite could possibly produce rabies infection. However, this is not necessarily true for other warm-blooded animals. So, if there is a question of possible exposure to rabies by a wild animal bite, laboratory examination of the animal's brain is the only method of providing a rapid and reliable answer. Thus, wild animal bites should be evaluated individually by the appropriate health authority.

Mailing Parcels Guidelines

The following are guidelines from the U.S. Postal Service for mailing parcels.

- (1) Select suitable box according to weight and shape of article. The size of the box must be adequate to contain the item and provide enough extra space for cushioning material.
- (2) Package surfaces which will not retain an adhesive stamp, postage meter imprint, ball point pen or pencil markings are not acceptable. Address labels and particularly envelopes will be firmly sealed to container.
- (3) Outside wrapping is acceptable if properly sealed with proper tape. Cellophane and masking tape shall not be used for closure or reinforcement of packages. Pressure sensitive, filament reinforced tape, or reinforced paper tape is recommended.
- (4) It is recommended that an address and return label be placed inside the package.
- (5) Unauthorized markings which do not designate the address, nature of contents, or handling are not permitted.
- (6) Space on the parcel should be left for stamps and special markings.
- (7) Address on one side only is required.
- (8) Limit weight for parcels is 70 lbs and 100 inches (length plus girth).
- (9) Always put return address on package in case it cannot be delivered.

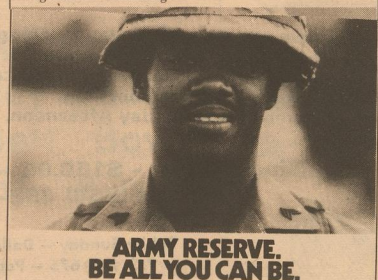

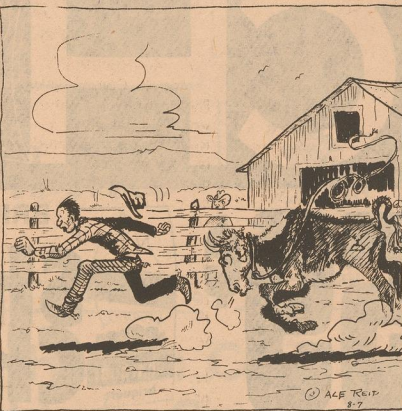

- PEACH CRUMB CAKE**
1 package (4-serving size) Jell-O butterscotch flavor instant pudding and pie filling
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1 cup chopped nuts
1/8 teaspoon cinnamon*
1/8 teaspoon nutmeg*
2/3 cup milk
1 egg, beaten
1/4 teaspoon almond extract
2-1/4 cups all-purpose biscuit mix
1 cup diced peeled fresh peaches or nectarines*

*Or use 1 cup fresh blueberries and 1/8 teaspoon mace.
Combine pudding mix, sugar and butter in bowl, blending with pastry blender or fork until mixture forms coarse crumbs; stir in nuts. Measure 1 cup crumb mixture, add cinnamon and nutmeg; set aside. To remaining crumb mixture, add milk, egg, almond extract and biscuit mix; stir to blend well. Fold in 3/4 cup of the peaches. Pour into greased and floured 9-inch layer pan. Scatter remaining 1/4 cup peaches over batter and sprinkle with reserved crumb mixture. Bake at 350° for 45 to 50 minutes or until cake tester inserted into center comes out clean. Cool 5 minutes. Invert on rack, turn crumb side up and cool. Sprinkle with confectioners sugar, if desired.

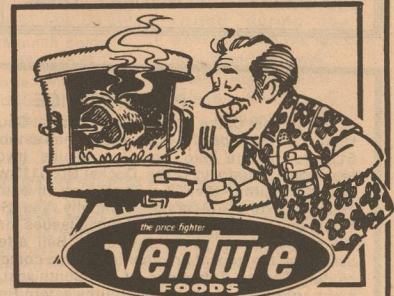
