Pee Wee Basketball Tourney Held In Matador Recently

Motley County sponsored a Pee Wee Basketball Tournament on March 22, 24 and 25. Teams from Jayton, Patton Springs, Paducah and Motley County participated.

The action started on Tuesday with Jayton defeating Patton Springs, boys and girls. Next the M.C. 5th grade girls defeated Paducah 6th grade 17-10 with Chandra Brown scoring 12 points. Then the Paducah 6th grade boys downed M.C. 5th graders 20-5. Rusty Willmon was high pointer with four.

The Paducah 5th grade girls defeated M.C. 4th 16-4 with Teresa Zarate and Brenda Zuniga scoring two points each. In the last game of the night Paducah 5th grade boys defeated the M.C. 4th graders 30-14 with Tony Gonzales scoring eight points.

On Thursday the action opened with the M.C. 4th grade girls losing to Patton Springs 2-6 with Teresa Zarate

scoring the two points. The next game was the most exciting in the tournament with M.C. 4th grade boys losing in a sudden death triple overtime 14-16. Billy Lefevre was the leading scorer with six.

Next on the winners side of the bracket M.C. 5th grade girls took on the M.C. 6th graders in a hard fought game. The 6th graders came out on top with Leigh Barton scoring eight points for the sixth and Chandra Brown scoring four points for the fifth.

The M.C. 6th grade boys had a good game against Paducah 6th grade, defeating them 26-24. M.C. jumped out to a quick lead and then saw Paducah fight back to tie the game. M.C. scored with 20 seconds left to win the game and advance to the finals. Next Jayton girls earned a trip to the finals by defeating Paducah 5th 17-6.

Paducah 5th grade boys made it to the finals also by defeating Jayton 28-16.

On Friday, Paducah's 6th grade girls could not make the consolation game because of U.I.L. so M.C. 4th grade girls played in their place taking on Patton Springs, and losing 4-12 with Brenda Zuniga scoring the four points. In the boys consolation, M.C. 5th grade defeated Patton Springs 11-10 with Chad Winn scoring seven points.

In the girls third place game, M.C. 5th defeated Paducah 5th 32-2. Kathy Mangram scored 10 and Cindy Shorter and Yolanda Campbell scored six each. In the boys third place game, Paducah 6th defeated Jayton 44-3.

In the girls championship game, M.C. 6th defeated Jayton 30-8. Janiele Long and Regina Cruse led M.C. with eight points each. The M.C. boys also won by defeating Paducah 5th 27-10 with Kenneth Jackson scoring 10 points.

The Motley County students represented the school well showing good sportsmanship and they have improved with each game. A special thanks goes to each one who supported the tournament and to each high school

student who worked. On Monday, March 28, the Paducah 6th grade came over and played M.C. 6th grade again. The Paducah girls missed their last game of the tournament and wanted to play again. The M.C.

girls defeated them 28-13 with Leigh Barton and Jennifer Davis scoring six points each. M.C. boys won 31-24 with it being a close game all the way. Gilbert Leal scored 12 points and Shawn Glidewell scored eight.

Last Whiteflat Grad Was 50 Years Ago

Fifty years ago May 29, 1933 the last class graduated from Whiteflat High School. Due to the depression the trustees decided to send the last grades of high school to Matador.

Students graduating that year were Inez Clifton Bailey, Cleo Smelser Bailey, Bertha Doran, Juanita McWilliams Aylesworth, Frances McCory Gaines, Pauline Martin, Nora Belle Stephens Dunning.

Of these all are still living. It was less than 20 years when all the school joined Matador. At one time in the middle to late 20's we had between 800 and 900 pupils going to Whiteflat School in the fall and winter months when people came in to pull cotton.

The Meaning Of Easter

What does Easter mean? It is not a Christian name. It bears its Chaldean origin on its very forehead. Easter is nothing else than Astarte, one of the titles of Belsh, the queen of heaven, whose name in Nineveh was Ishtar. The religious solemnities of April, as now practiced, are called by the name of Easter, that month, among our Pagan ancestors, having been called Easter-month. The festival, in the third and fourth centuries was not known as Easter, but Pasch, or the Passover, and though not of Apostolic institution was very

clearly observed by many professing Christians in commemoration of the death and resurrection of Christ. That festival was not idolatrous, and it was not preceded by Lent.

The popular observances that still attend the period of its celebration amply confirm the testimony of history as to its Babylonian character. The hot cross buns of Good Friday, and the dyed eggs of Pasch or Easter Sunday, figured in the Chaldean rites just as they do now. The "buns," were used in the worship of the queen of heaven, the goddess Easter, as early as the days of

Cecrops, the founder of Athens - that is 1500 years before the Christian era. The prophet Jeremiah takes notice of this kind of offering when he says, "The women knead their dough, to make cakes to the queen of heaven." And so the Easter egg is used in the pagan rituals.

In the Dionysiaca, or mysteries of Bacchus, as celebrated in Athens, one part of the nocturnal ceremony consisted in the consecration of an egg. The Hindu fables celebrate their mundane egg as of a golden colour.

The people of Japan make their sacred egg to have been brazen.

In China, at this hour, dyed or painted eggs are used on sacred festivals, even as in this country.

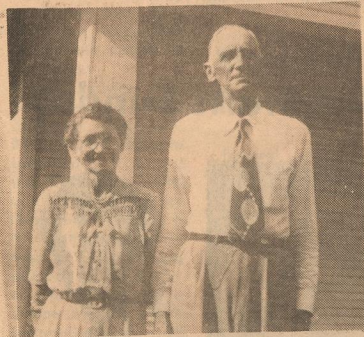

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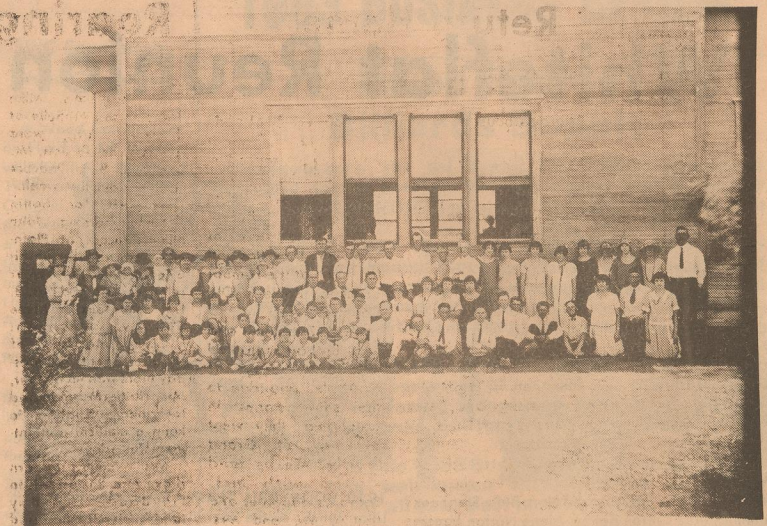

Leaving George, the Doberman with the Roworth Zabielski family, Mrs. Zabielski and Mrs. Bethard continued on through Indiana, stopping to visit the Tippecanoe Battlefield State Memorial Park. Tippecanoe is the land whose past influenced America's future. It was the home of the Indian for thousands of years and the events which occurred have influenced American history to the present day.

The Prehistoric Indian, The French and Indian Village, Kethipithecannuck, burned in 1791 by Gen. Scott. Tippecanoe, (Prophets town), Tecumseh and the Prophet (brothers), chose this site as the capitol of the largest planned Indian confederacy in American history (1808-1811).

The Battle of Tippecanoe occurred on Nov. 7, 1811. It resulted in the destruction of the Confederacy's nucleus and capitol. The battle helped led the U.S. into the war of 1812, and to elect the 9th President of the U.S. The battle lasted two hours with the American forces losing 57 men. The Indian count was not known.

While in Lexington they toured the Henry Clay estate, being impressed with the many conveniences that were not common to many homes of that era. One outstanding feature were two ice houses, with a milk and

storage house supplied by the ice water from the two ice houses, all underground. Shaker town was also visited, and lunch was eaten at the famous dining room in the Trustees Hall. The Shaker religion is no longer in existence, but the tradition of their simplistic life style is being kept alive.

Leaving Lexington on the return trip, Mrs. Zabielski and Mrs. Bethard stopped at Bardstown, Kentucky where Stephen C. Foster wrote the song, "My Old Kentucky Home," which became the state song of Kentucky, the original title was "Federal Hill."

A souvenir book of all of Stephen C. Foster's music, exact reproductions of the original sheet music, was purchased. Before leaving the state of Kentucky, they stopped for lunch at the famous Cracker Barrel, Old Country Store. Mrs. Zabielski and Mrs. Bethard returned home by way of Nashville, and due to the snow storms in Oklahoma, they went by way of Grand Prairie, Texas and visited with Mrs. Bethards daughter and family, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Swinnea, returning home, Sunday, March 20.

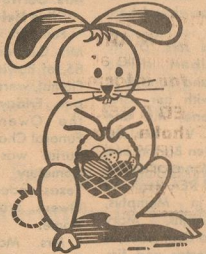

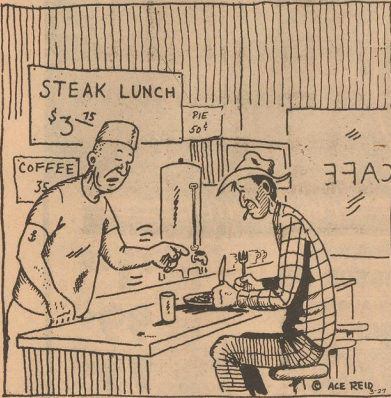

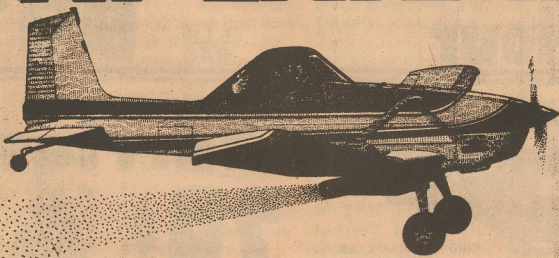
