1984 Cotton Program Provisions Should Have Two Objectives

Provisions of the 1984 cotton program, according to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, should be aimed at two major objectives—a year-end balance of supply and demand plus reasonable protection for producer income. producer income

To reach these goals the PCG Executive Committee

To reach these goals the PCG Executive Committee August 31 developed eight specific program recom-mendations. The U.S. Department of Agriculture asked for comments on the 1984 cotton program in the August 5 Federal Register, giving interested parties until October 4 to respond. An announcement of final decisions is expected no later than November 1. Although USDA's options with regard to the loan level, target price and acreage control are severely limited, says PCG President Tommy Fondren of Lorenzo. "we believe our recommendations will help to prevent a buildup of cotton stocks and at the same time give producers reason to hope for a profitable year in 1984." For scontinents will can for OSDA to take the following actions. 1. Set the loan rate for 1984 at the maximum level permitted by law. (It now appears that loan-setting formulas in the Food and Agriculture Actof 1981 will mandate a loan at the statutory minimum of 55 cents per pound)

2. Abandon its proposal to freeze the target price for 1984 and 1985 at the 76-cent level in effect for 1983, allowing a target price increase to 81 cents in 1984 as scheduled in current law.

Red Cross Seeking Donations


The American Red Cross has launched an emergency appeal for funds to assist the victims of Hurricane Alicia in the Gulf Coast anca, and the Motley County Chapter is appealing directly to our county residents for funds to help in this emergency. Due to the size of the relief efforts, a Texas disaster Texas disaste campaign goal of \$2 million has been established.
