Old Ranch Line Camp Birthplace Of Edna Waybourn

Mrs. Gerald (Edna Leonard) Waybourn recently visited the old Mott Creek line camp, Cottonwood Mott, of the Matador Ranch fame, now owned by Mrs. W. E. Burleson of Floydada. It was here on June 30, 1906, that Edna Leonard was born of the Joe Flourney (Frank) and Mary Ethel Overhuls Leonard family, eighth child of nine.

Earlier the family had lived just down the creek in the James Field dugout on the claim Leonard bought from the Fields in 1903. Leonard received a Patent from the State of Texas in 1904 for unsurveyed land on the John Hall Creek (now Chinney Creek) nearby. Being a homesteader, a "nester", surrounded by a big ranch proved to be too difficult and later that

year he sold his holdings to the Matador Land and Cattle Co.

Whereas Mr. Leonard had been hiring out as a day worker at \$1 a day, he then hired on full time with the Matadors, moving his family into the line camp. This two room log and plank cabin, featured in the August 28, 1952 edition of the Tribune, had been the site of the Harkey/Barbee shoot-out in 1880 in which both men died. When this cabin was torn down, a new two room shiplap house was built from lumber hauled from Childress or Wichita Falls. Here Edna Leonard was born.

When her arrival became imminent, brother Van was sent to Matador by way of Salt Creek to fetch Dr. Traweck. When Dr. Traweck arrived in his buggy, the baby girl had already made her debut.

While visiting with the Bobby Jack Dempsey and the Frank Potts family on the ranch, Mrs. Waybourn pointed

out various historical sites: the site of the spring house, the original grave site of the murdered cowboys, and the cottonwood mott where gigantic picnics were held for the ranch employees and families. As she toured the ranch and the dugout site, she reminisced about the times the family had returned here to picnic and harvest fruit from the orchard where a lone pecan tree and a stand of wild pears survive.

Mrs. Waybourn pointed out a carving of JFL showing faintly on the dugout fireplace which were her father's initials and a horse etching carved into the sandstone above the spring along the creek which was carved by her sister Ruth.

Although it has been seventy-nine years since the family owned this land their influence in settling and holding the area can still be seen and felt by those who walk the creeks and canyons after them.

West Texas Utilities Files For Rate Increase

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a general increase in its electric rates for retail customers.

Local Manager Freddie Welling said the application, filed Friday, is a systemwide request for higher rates. Simultaneous filings were made in all incorporated towns and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas at Austin for an increase in rural area, unincorporated towns and in incorporated towns which have ceded jurisdiction over electric rates.

So far, a total of 19 municipalities served by WTU have opted to let the PUC analyze rate requests and to make decisions for them. These are Albany, Chillicothe, Dickens, Eldorado, Goree, Hedley, Lakeview, Matador, McCamey, Mertz, Moran, Paint Rock, Roaring Springs, Robert Lee, Roby, Rotan, Rule, Trent and Weinert. WTU has filed complete information about the rate request with each of these towns.

The principal reasons cited for the new rate proposal is that the present rates are not adequate to support the investment WTU has made in necessary new

facilities since the last rate increase, he said.

WTU's current construction program, the core of which is the coal-fired power plant at Oklaunion, is the biggest and most expensive in the Company's history. By the time the proposed rates become effective, WTU will have invested

more than \$84.4 million in new facilities and must spend considerably more in the years ahead to satisfy the growing demand for electricity in West Texas.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total retail revenue of \$26.6 million. This amounts to

11.4 per cent.

No major changes in rate structure are included in the proposal. For residential customers, the average electric bill, including fuel costs, would go up by about 13.2 percent, although the actual increase would vary with the amount of usage.

Governor White Declares June 1, Green Thumb Day

Governor Mark White made June 1 memorable for almost 2,000 hard-working older Texans by designating it as Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb/Senior Texans Employment Program Day in the state.

Citing the "meaningful employment opportunities" offered by the two senior employment programs since the early 1970's, the Governor signed a special proclamation during ceremonies at the Capitol.

Texas Farmers Union has sponsored the Green Thumb program in Texas since 1970. The largest and oldest federally-funded senior employment program, Green Thumb has more

than 17,000 enrollees nationwide, including 1,059 in 108 Texas counties.

In 1973, the Texas Legislature adopted a TFU proposal to establish the Senior Texans Employment Program (STEP), which now receives both state and federal support through the Texas Department on Aging. STEP employs 930 workers in 122 counties.

Governor White said that through the two

programs, STEP and Green Thumb workers "have found a new lease on life and have made major contributions to their communities."

"Citizens of Texas are grateful for the rejuvenation of their rural areas and the reclamation of lost manpower these programs provide," the Governor said.

People who are nearing 65 and do not plan to retire will find that their Social Security check will be bigger when they do claim benefits.

This is because of the delayed retirement credit. This credit increases a person's retirement benefit for each month between 65 and 70 that he or she does not receive a benefit.

The credit adds 1/4 of 1 percent to each month -- 3 percent for a full year -- that a person does not get a check because of work. The credit also applies to widows and widowers benefits. Starting in 1990, the credits will increase gradually until they reach 8 percent by 2008.

In addition to these credits, a person's earnings after 65 may result in a bigger check than would have been payable at 65.

Of course, a person who starts getting checks at 65 can work and have significant earnings and still receive benefits. A person 65 or over in 1983 can earn up to \$6,600 before checks are affected. If earnings exceed \$6,600, then \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above \$6,600. This annual exempt amount will increase automatically in future years to keep pace with increases in average wages. The exempt amount of people under 65 is \$4,920 in 1983. (Starting in 1990, the \$1 for \$2 withholding will become \$1 for \$3 for people 65 and over.)

over with senior centers, schools, libraries, and municipalities to furnish services that would not otherwise be available.

TFU President Mike Moeller, who attended the signing ceremony along with officials from both programs and the Texas Department on Aging, said Governor White's proclamation "is clear evidence that the new leaders of this state value our strong rural heritage, and the past and future contributions of older Texans."

Moeller emphasized that STEP and Green Thumb are "true self-help programs designed to serve those who have the most faith in the work ethic and in the nation itself; older workers."

"Most of these people were raised on farms and they know what it means to work. For them work isn't a necessary evil, a means

to an end; for them it's a worthy end in itself," he said.

The two programs not only provide rural elderly persons with work and rural communities with much needed services, he added, but also actually save the taxpayers money.

"A study by the American Association of Retired Persons estimates that for every dollar going into senior employment, the government saves \$1.15 in benefits the workers could be receiving if they were unemployed," he said.

"So this recognition is not just for the idealistic purposes of these programs; it's also for the very real and practical advantages that accrue to all of us -- rural and urban -- as citizens and taxpayers," he concluded.

Green Thumb worker Cleo Holder, 82, of

Dripping Springs, who was honored at the ceremony and received a pen from the Governor, knows first hand how important employment can be for an older person.

A cook at the Dripping Springs senior center since 1977, Holder has found that it's "almost impossible to get by on Social Security because things have gotten so high that you don't have anything left (out of Social Security) to buy clothing or much else."

Even more important to Holder, however, is the sense of purpose she derives from her work. "I think Green Thumb has meant my life," she said.

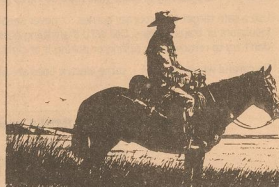

Surveyor's Job Requires Accuracy, Lions Are Told

Absolute accuracy is necessary in the field of surveying land and requires years of study. In addition, in order to practice the profession, a person must be licensed to do so, just as doctors, lawyers and other practitioners in occupations which require special study. But the results are rewarding in adventure.

Matador Lions Club members were informed of these interesting facts by Tommy Anderson, Registered Public Surveyor from Lubbock at the organization's June 7 meeting at the United Methodist Church.

After an introduction on the subject, Mr. Anderson showed a film designed to inform the public of the services of surveyors in Texas, described as "this vast land of contrasts."

"Texans fought for and bought the land, and it was important that metes and bounds (boundaries) be designated. The first principle is the first survey, which is considered as accurate," Anderson said.

Research into history and heritage are elements in determining boundaries, which are described in terms of league (from 2.4 to 4.6 miles); labor (177.14 acres) and Vara (33.33

inches) commonly used in Texas, but varying for different times and countries." Attesting to the attraction of surveying is the fact that three early leaders of the country, George Washington, Thomas Jefferson and Abraham Lincoln were expert surveyors, the speaker pointed out.

Landmarks were often used to signify corners of a plat, and an interesting fact brought to light during a question and answer session is that the N.W. corner of Matador is designated by "a Buffalo Head set in a mound of earth," as described in Eleanor Traweck's history of Matador County, "Of Such As These."

The speaker was introduced by Gerald Pipkin. A graduate of Texas Tech, Anderson is president of Hugo Reed and Associates of Lubbock, a member of the Board of Directors of Texas Surveyors Ass'n., and Chairman of Public Relations committee of Texas Surveyors Ass'n.

President Donnie Jackson presided and led the club in applause for an enjoyable meal prepared and served by Lion Walter Jones. In business session, he announced that dates for a softball tournament had been set for August 5, 6 and 7.

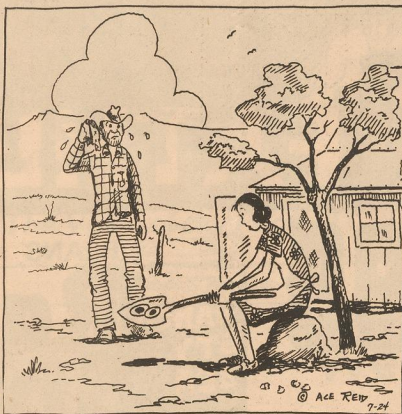

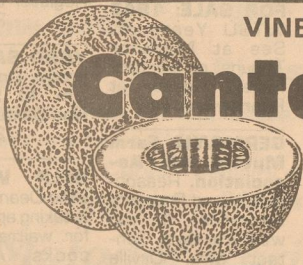
