Legion Commander Warns

Country Stands at Uneasy Crossroads

This country stands at the crossroads of history, and there is only one road to travel if we are to survive as a free people, was the warning of Henry H. Hill, Past Commander, Department of Texas, The American Legion, in an address here Monday night.

Occasion was the annual banquet sponsored by Fleming Post and the Legion Auxiliary for Motley County high school seniors. Three schools, Flomot, Roaring Springs and Matador were represented by the students, sponsors and school board members.

“We have never seen the breakdown of law and order as we are seeing it today. Fear of punishment at one time was a deterrent to crime... today the criminal knows that through the laxity of our courts and parole boards, little or nothing will be done to him.”

First Aid Course Completed Here

A First Aid course conducted by the American Red Cross was completed here Tuesday night, by representatives of the national organization.

Special guest Tuesday night, was John Guckian, disaster representative of American National Red Cross, West Texas division, with headquarters in Ft. Worth.

The First Aid class here was composed of nine members of the Matador Volunteer Fire Department, and Mrs. John Briscoe. The class was taught in the District Courtroom, by James L. Moody of Childress, consultant on the national staff in safety services.

Aiding in the course was Mrs. James L. Moody, Executive Secretary of the Childress Chapter and volunteer assigned by the national headquarters to assist surrounding counties. The counties in the group are Childress, Cottle, Collingsworth, Donley, Hall, King and Motley. In the event of disaster, volunteers from these counties would come here.

Mrs. Moody had high praise for the friendly people of Matador and for the cooperative and highly receptive manner in which the First Aid course had been received.

She also had high praise for grocery merchant Billy Wason for his 15 years of service to the Red Cross, as a link between servicemen overseas and their relatives at home. She said Miss Rachel Patton, as secretary of the Matador Chapter, has served long years in a cooperative and efficient manner.

It was explained Tuesday night that the completion of the First Aid course is a preliminary to the disaster preparedness course, which will be taught by Guckian, April 14 and 15th. Anyone interested in the work is invited and urged to attend.

Fire Chief Alton Marshall has been named Disaster Chairman here. Other members of the fire department completing the course were Vaden Hays, Robin Smauel, Randy Binder, Don R. Warren, Boyce Hart, Mayor Kirby Campbell, Richard Bumpus and Pete Williams.

New Record is Set By 440 Relay Team

Matador's 440-yard relay team set a new record Saturday in Jayton in the Annual Rolling Plains Relays, to bring home a first place trophy and individual medals.

Another first place trophy and medals were brought home by the mile relay team.

The Matador track team placed 3rd in team points over 23 class B entries in the meet.

In the 440 yard relay, Stanley Smith, David Lee, Bobby Simpson and Lee Hurt broke the meet record of 46 seconds flat set in 1969, with a 45.2 time. Then Smith, Lee and Hurt joined Bill Barnhill to bring home the mile relay awards. The team lacked one tenth of a second breaking another record time in this event.

In the individual running events the boys ran against 40 to 50 boys in each event. Hurt placed 2nd in the 100 yard dash and Smith placed 5th in the 220 yard dash.

In the next race there was less than one tenth of a second difference between 2nd, 3rd and 4th places.

Barnhill placed 4th in the 330 hurdles and Lee came in 4th in the 440 yard dash or quarter.

The boys are showing great effort and interest in their track team and show good possibilities of going to State in certain events.

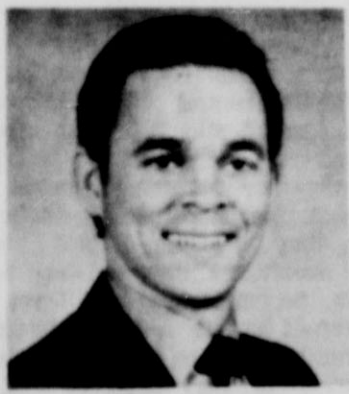

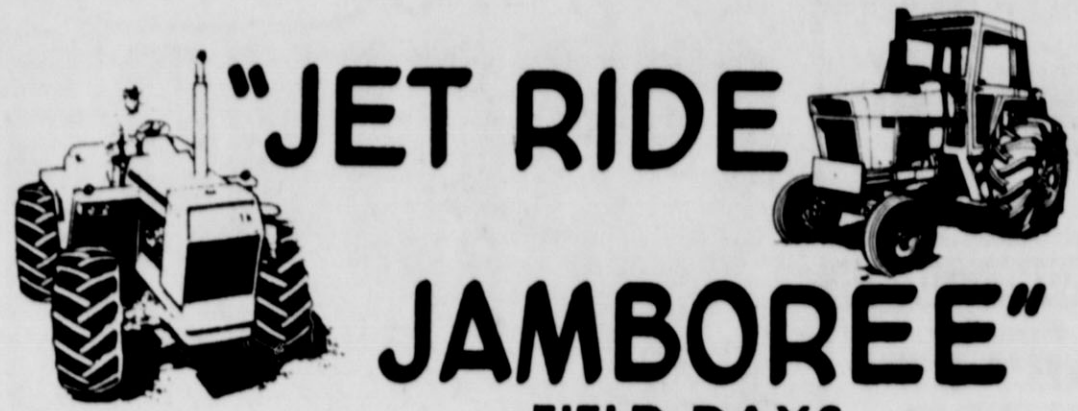

Ex-Addicts Talk To Student Body

Two ex-addicts spoke to the student body of Matador High Friday, March 19. "Kim", and ex-drug addict and "Jim", an alcoholic related to the students the effects of drugs and alcohol on the body and the mind. Kim, ex-drummer for an area band, talked about his experiences with LSD by saying, "The trips

were not really bad at first. I kept telling myself I could quit... but trips became monthly, then daily, then hourly. I was in the State hospital more times than one. Finally they became quick rides and all of a sudden you're in hell with your back broken." Jim, an alcoholic for eight years, told of his adventures during this time. His father drank, and one day he left without putting the bottle in the cabinet. Jim was there alone and that was his first adventure with alcohol. He was 15 at the time. It took a few minutes for the first drink to affect him, but when it took effect, it made him feel good.

He decided that if one drink could make him feel that good, two drinks would make him feel even better. So, he had a second drink, then a third, and then he had some more and he began to kick things around. This experience started him on the road to alcoholism. Jim finally quit school and joined the navy, telling himself that he would quit as soon as he got out. He drank for eight years before going to Alcoholics Anonymous.

When he first went to AA he didn't think it would work, and he stayed drunk all the time. He did not think he was an alcoholic because: "I thought an alcoholic was a Skid-row bum, a tramp, and I knew I wasn't." After driving about 1000 miles that he couldn't remember, he admitted that he was a drunk and went back to AA for help. AA did help him and he hasn't had a drink since November 22, 1969. He doesn't need alcohol; he has found a better way of life through AA.
