

Trooper Randal McGee Assigned To Matador

Trooper Randal Wade McGee, 25, has recently graduated from the Department of Public Safety Training Academy and is assigned to the Highway Patrol Service in Matador.

Trooper McGee was one of 62 cadets recently commissioned as state troopers in graduation ceremonies in Austin. He is a native of Athens and assumes his new duties immediately.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said he is especially pleased at the quality of people who are entering the law enforcement profession. "These men and women were carefully

selected from a large group of applicants to undergo an intensive 18-week course," Adams said. "They have been trained to uphold the laws of this state in routine as well as difficult law enforcement situations."

"Today's Texas trooper is required to handle many varied tasks in addition to traffic enforcement. The trooper may assist in narcotics arrests, recovery of stolen vehicles and investigation of theft cases. A broad range of law enforcement responsibilities will face the trooper who has chosen to serve his fellow Texans," Adams said.

The DPS training course

included instruction in traffic law, criminal law, arrest procedures, accident investigation, and numerous other law enforcement related topics.

After all the fun of the day was over he drove Luci Johnson Turpin's car back to Austin where he met the rest of the crowd he was with and went out for an enjoyable evening in Austin.

SBA Declares Matador Natural Disaster Area

The Small Business Administration has declared Matador a natural disaster area, paving the way for tornado victims to receive low interest loans.

Representatives from the offices of John Tower and Jack Hightower said Monday that an SBA office will be set up in Matador to approve loans to repair physical damage until July 13, and the deadline to apply for application for a loan for economic injury will be February 14, 1985.

SBA loans for those homeowners with credit (those able to get loans elsewhere) who still want to file for an SBA loan, will have an interest rate of about eight per cent. This is for both individuals and businesses.

For storm victims without other credit, disaster loans interest will be four per cent for both individuals and businesses.

For non-profit organizations and churches the rate will be 10.5 per cent.

Glen Clavert Qualifies For Championship Meet

Glen Clavert, a 1982 graduate of Motley County High School and a sophomore at South Plains College, has qualified for competition at the National Junior College Athletic Association Track and Field Championships set for May 17-19 in San Angelo.

The Flomot native returns to the championship meet as a top contender in the shot put. Last season, he finished runner-up in that event, garnering All-American honors with a put of 55-0. Since coming to SPC, Clavert has become a three-time All-American and is the current NJCAA indoor shot put

champion.

"Glen has an excellent chance at earning a national championship in the shot put this year," said SPC track coach James Morris. He is presently ranked No. 2 in the NJCAA in the shot. His best mark this season has been 54-3/4/

He has also qualified to compete in the discus with a mark of 155-5.

Clavert joins twelve other SPC athletes who have qualified for NJCAA competition. Last season SPC finished fifth in the nation at the meet.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Clavert of Flomot.

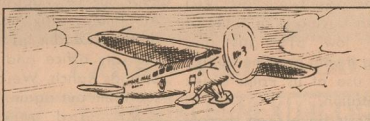
FIESTA STEAK

- 1 beef round steak, cut 1/2-in. thick
- 3 T. flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. coarsely ground pepper
- 3 T. lard or drippings
- 2 beef bouillon cubes
- 1/4 C. hot water
- 3 med.-size onions, quartered
- 1 lg. green bell pepper, cut in 1-in. squares
- 3 med.-size tomatoes, cut in 1-in. wedges
- Flour for gravy, if desired.

Cut round steak into 6 servings. Combine flour, salt, and pepper. Dredge meat in seasoned flour. Pound to 1/4-inch thickness. Brown in lard or drippings. Pour off drippings. Dissolve bouillon cubes in hot water. Add to meat. Add onions. Cover tightly and cook slowly 1 hour. Add green pepper and tomatoes. Cover tightly and continue to cook slowly 25 minutes or until meat is tender. Thicken cooking liquid with flour for gravy, if desired. Serves 4-6.

May 25 Final Planting Date For Insured Peanuts

May 25 is the final planting date for insured peanuts in Motley County, according to Ross Smith, District Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

"Acres of peanuts planted by May 25, insured by FCIC (or by a private company reinsured by FCIC), must be reported by June 15 to receive full crop insurance coverage," says Smith.

Acres planted after May 25 should also be reported on the June 15 acreage report (in the "remarks" section) as being planted too late for insurance

coverage. "The final planting date of May 25 is the latest date established by FCIC to plant and expect a normal crop to be produced. Crops initially planted after this date are not insurable unless a late planting agreement is signed by May 25," Smith said.

Farmers wishing to discuss local conditions, such as excessive moisture, that may affect planting should contact their local, authorized crop insurance agent as soon as possible.

Pets Should Be Immunized Here On Tuesday May 22

Every spring brings renewed outbreaks of rabies across the State. With this should come the realization that each of us needs to have our pets immunized.

Rabies is one of the oldest and most feared diseases that can be spread from animal to man. It is a natural disease of dogs, cats and many wild animals such as bats, skunks, coyotes and raccoons. However all warm-blooded animals are susceptible.

Clinical rabies in man and most animals is 100 percent fatal; there is no specific treatment once the clinical course of rabies has begun. It is vital for anyone bitten or

scratched by a domestic or wild animal suspected of being rabid to contact a medical doctor immediately. It can be halted before it reaches the clinical stage through proper treatment.

Each year in Motley County a pet immunization day is held, sponsored by the 4H Club and City of Matador. This year Dr. Westbrook will be here on Tuesday, May 22, from 8:00 till 11:30 a.m. at the Matador City Hall.

Other vaccinations will be available also to protect your pet from other diseases. Please bring your pets for everyone's protection.

New varieties promise increased pecan crop

AUSTIN--Centuries ago, Pecan trees grew wild along the rivers and creeks of nearly 157 Texas counties and today the Texas pecan industry can hardly be considered peanuts--contributing some \$144 million a year to the state's economy.

Norman Winter, Executive Director of the Texas Pecan Growers Association, points out that between 75 and 80 percent of the pecans grown in Texas are still borne from native varieties of trees producing an average of 150-million pounds of fruit a year. But, he added, it will be new varieties named after many of the Indian tribes which once roamed the southwest that will increase production levels.

"Indian varieties such as Choctaw, Sioux, Cheyenne and Mohawk are the most popular varieties that are now being planted in Texas. There are literally thousands of trees that have been planted along the Rio Grande in South Texas, in the Trans-Pecos area, in Central Texas. These trees are not yet into full production, we are anticipating a large increase in total production," Winter explains.


In fact, in just a few years Winter predicts that Texas Pecan production will average upwards of 400 million pounds a year. This figure is nearly equal to the nation's entire almond production.

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Texas beef makes good diet food

AUSTIN--Beef is an important commodity in Texas, the biggest beef cattle state in the country.

Twelve million head of cattle graze on pastureland from South Texas to the Panhandle while another two million are being fattened in feedlots concentrated in the state's High Plains area.

The cattle industry contributed more than \$4 billion to the state's economy in 1981. With these figures it is easy to see why Texans take their beef seriously.

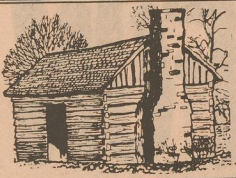
Since 1976, however, nationwide beef consumption has dropped from 94.3 pounds annually per capita to 77.2 pounds. Though the decrease can be tied to an unhealthy economy and rising food prices, a small percentage is related to an increasingly health-conscious

population reducing its intake of animal fat.

Beef lovers who are watching their weight do not have to eliminate beef from meals.

Leaner cuts contain the same high quality nutrients--protein, vitamin B6 and 12, zinc and iron in particular--without the fat. A quarter-pound of top round steak, for example, contains 196 calories. The same size hamburger with 21 percent fat adds up to 235 calories.

Home economist Karen DeCuennick of the Texas Department of Agriculture--San Antonio district office--says the small amount of waste makes top round an economical as well as a low-calorie cut. One pound will serve three people, four if they are reducing portion size.

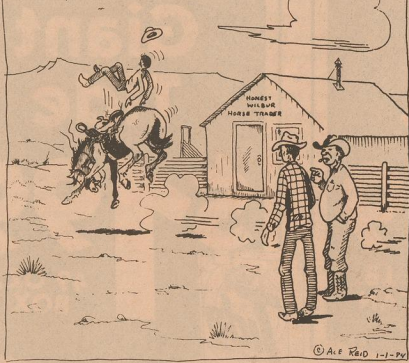
