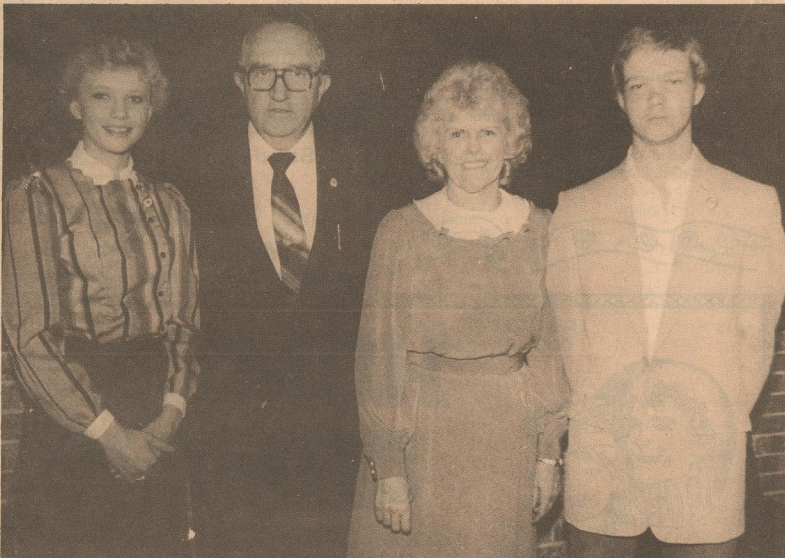

Social Security News

Last week we talked about Supplementary Security Income (SSI) and how it can be a life saver but also a hardship if reporting requirements are not met.

We mentioned that changes in income, resources or living arrangements must be reported. However, at times changes occur that the recipient does not see as a change.

For example, a change in income is considered by most people to be a change in their monthly cash income. However, "in-kind" income is also recognized by SSI rules. For example, a recipient may have their utility bills, taxes, insurance or food bills paid by another

person. This is income. A friend or relative may let a recipient live in a house for free. This too is income. A son or daughter may rent a house to a parent who is a recipient and charge less than market rental value. Income again. A person living with the recipient may help with the bills. This is possible income.

Occasionally, a recipient will give their home to another party, usually an adult child. This creates a major problem for the recipient. The recipient continues to live in the home but doesn't own it. According to SSI, the recipient is receiving "in-kind" income in the form of rent free shelter, because the person is no longer

living in their own home.

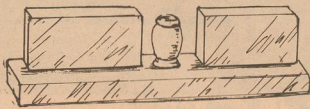

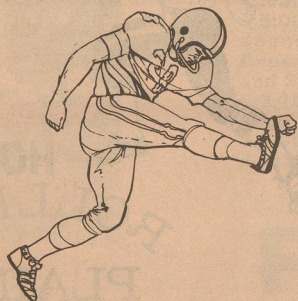

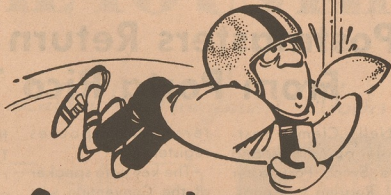

The 7,500 cataloged books in the library collection is one requirement that must be met in order for Motley County Library to remain a member of the West Texas Library system and the Texas State Library System, as well as to receive Establishment Grant Funds in the amount of \$59,424 from the Texas State Library.

At present the library has 4,200 cataloged books in its collection. It also contains approximately 2,000 uncataloged books to be cataloged before August 1984. 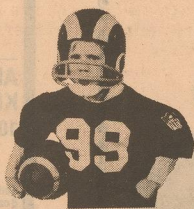

County Agent's Corner

Significant changes in federal and state laws affect you as a private pesticide applicator. Federal and state law regulates pesticide use. As a pesticide applicator you may want to become familiar with all provisions of these laws.

Federal law requires EPA to classify each use of a pesticide as either "restricted" or "general", based on considerations of potential hazard to the applicator or other persons, and the possibility of unreasonable adverse effect on the environment. A federally restricted use pesticide may be used only by or under the direct supervision of a certified applicator. The

state may further restrict additional uses to certified commercial and non-commercial applicators or impose other restrictions.

To buy and use the restricted pesticides one must be a certified pesticide applicator. Retail chemical salesmen are required to check the certification of individuals whom they sell the pesticides to.

If you are not a certified applicator you can pick up a manual and test at the County Extension office. It is a simple process to become certified and you will not be able to buy some of the chemicals you use without it.

In its annual survey of the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the significant producing counties of Texas, Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association reported that the county ranked 189th among Texas' 254 counties on the basis of value of its

marketed petroleum production. Such production includes condensate and casinghead gas.

The county's wells produced 122,025 barrels of crude oil, valued at \$3.9 million and 18 million cubic feet of natural gas, valued at \$37,498. Owners of royalty in the county received \$484,703 as their share of the output, the Association noted.

"The figures cited in this survey offer graphic evidence of the continuing importance of petroleum production to nearly every

county in Texas, a situation which should continue indefinitely," said the Association's chairman, Joe C. Walter, Jr., Houston Independent producer.

"There are a number of encouraging signs indicating that the oil and gas industry's protracted slowdown in activity is coming to an end. A general economic recovery in the United States and other industrialized countries will increase the demand for petroleum products, thereby stimulating geophysical and drilling activity here and abroad. The

domestic petroleum industry stands ready to drill more wells as drilling projects become economically feasible, Walter said.

In addition to paying property taxes to cities, counties, and school districts, producers in the county supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$179,458, according to the Association survey. Crude oil taxes amounted to \$176,646, while natural gas levies totalled \$2,812.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county, oil and gas producers spent a reported \$2.8 million in the drilling of six wildcat or exploratory wells. All were dry. As of April 1, 1983, there were 22 producing oil wells in the county.

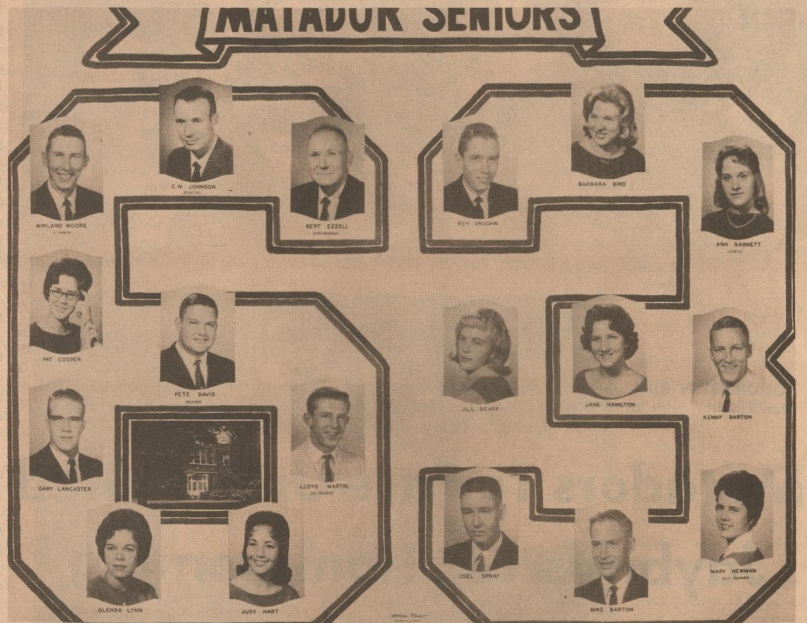

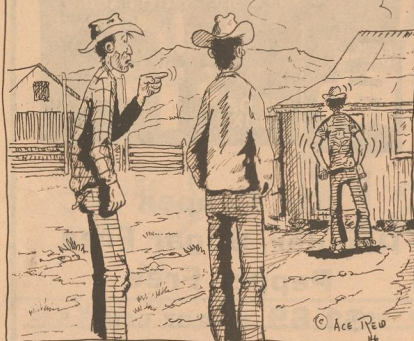
