MATADOR FFA TEAM WINNERS OF PLAINVIEW DIST. CONTEST

The Matador FFA Shop Contest team composed of Ricky Elliott, Tutt Garnett, Lee Hurt and Jerry Jones won the Plainview District Contest held Thursday, May 13, at the Texas Tech University shop in Lubbock.

The four-part, timed contest consisted of arc welding in two positions; installing and wiring in a duplex wall outlet and a ceiling lamp, controlled by a single switch; measuring, cutting and threading a pipe to fit between

two elbows; and identifying shop tools and supplies.

Elliott, Garnett and Jones tied, with two other boys, for first place in the Plumbing division with scores of 398 out of a possible 400. Lee Hurt was first in the Electrical division with a score of 293 out of a possible 300 points. Ricky Elliott was second high individual in the entire contest.

The team won over the second place Dimmitt team by 225 points in the Plainview District division and made the highest score in the three district contest made up of teams from 20 schools from over the South Plains.

The team was accompanied to Lubbock by Bill Moss, vocational agriculture instructor and FFA advisor.

He was a member of the First United Methodist Church of Tulia where he served on the administrative board and board of trustees. He was a former trustee of King's Manor, a Methodist home for the elderly in Hereford. He also was lay delegate to the annual church conference.

COWBOY KILLED IN ACCIDENT

A Briscoe County cowboy was thrown from his horse and dragged to death early Monday during a cattle drive across Turtle Hole Creek near here.

J. Ronald Taylor, 28, of Quitaque was attempting to drive a herd of cattle across the creek on the Taylor Brothers Ranch in northeast Motley County. According to witnesses, his horse stumbled, Taylor fell from the saddle and his foot hung in the stirrup. The horse dragged him about 150 yards before kicking him free.

Cowboys brought the severely injured man to the old Turtle Hole line camp, which was formerly part of the Matador Land and Cattle Co. ranch. Taylor died shortly afterward.

Motley County Justice of the Peace Fred C. Bourland, escorted by Deputy Sheriff J. E. Russell Jr., conducted an inquest at the camp and ruled accidental death.

Services were held at 10 a.m. Wednesday at the First Baptist Church in Quitaque with the pastor, Rev. Freddie Martin officiating, assisted by Seacy Smith. Burial was in Resthaven Cemetery under the direction of Quitaque Funeral Home.

Mr. Taylor was a deacon in the Quitaque First Baptist Church. He is survived by his wife, Willie Mae; two sons, Jeffrey and Johnny of the home; two sisters, Mrs. Joe Taylor of Lockney and Miss Katie Taylor; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Taylor of South Plains and his grandfather, Warren Merrell of Quitaque.

Hospital Problems Discussed at Meet

THE NEED of a doctor to replace the late Dr. J. S. Stanley, willing to cooperate in the difficult struggle to obtain Medicare approval, were among the problems discussed at a meeting last week.

The meeting was held at the West Texas Utilities Company office Friday evening and included members of the Motley County Hospital Board and concerned citizens.

John V. Stevens, President of the hospital board, explained that the fully equipped Motley General Hospital is being kept in abeyance until the crisis is overcome. He said that once another doctor is

willing to locate in Matador, it will be necessary to again go through the difficult procedure of obtaining Medicare approval.

He said one of the problems ranking second in importance to a doctor, is that of obtaining a qualified hospital administrator. Next in importance will be the securing of registered nurses and a staff of LVN's acceptable to Medicare.

Stevens pledged the complete support of the hospital board in aiding in any way possible in locating a doctor, and cooperating fully in the other problems that face the re-opening of the hospital facility.

He said the hospital is being maintained at the lowest possible cost in order to protect equipment and grounds from deterioration. The lights, he said, are being maintained for safety protection. All hospital equipment, including beds, are being kept intact, in the building, for the time when the badly needed facility can be put into service, for the county and area.

Personal Contact Advised
With several leads suggested, it was agreed that the most effective method of obtaining a doctor would be to make a personal contact with the prospect.

A possible relief in the doctor crisis was discussed with regard to an announcement by the military, that young doctors might be released from service, if they were willing to establish a practice in small communities. Many other communities with established hospitals have lost doctors in recent months, it was pointed out.

Voters Oppose 4 Amendments

LESS THAN one out of every four qualified voters in Motley County went to the polls Tuesday to cast ballots on the four proposed Texas constitutional amendments. The total vote was 280. The county has more than 1200 registered voters.

The voters were against all four of the proposed amendments in all of the county's five voting boxes, and reflected the attitude of voters in the state with the exception of No. 4. The water quality bonds proposal carried statewide 403,532 for and 356,437 against in 240 counties, according to the Lubbock Avalanche. Matador box polled 160 votes of the 280 cast in the county.

STRAW VOTE OPPOSES HAIL CLOUD SEEDING

A "straw" or sample vote held in the county in connection with Tuesday's amendment election, with relation to the seeding of hail clouds in areas west, showed strong opposition.

It is believed that the seeding of clouds to prevent hail, also prevents rain. Proponents of the plan say it does not affect rainfall. Irrigation farmers in counties west of Motley have met opposition in the cloud-seeding movement. The referendum Tuesday was 251 against and 13 for.

NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC HEARING CORRIDOR (LOCATION) AND DESIGN (COMBINED HEARING)

The Texas Highway Department is planning the construction of F. M. Road 3203, extending from F.M. 684 in Roaring Springs, South and East to State Highway 70, in Motley County. The proposed highway project will pass through the town of Roaring Springs.

The proposed design in Roaring Springs will provide a curb and guttered street, having a width back-of-curb to back-of-curb of 48 feet, from Broadway Avenue (F.M. 684) Southwesterly to end of residential area. This section will be on a minimum right of way width of 60 feet. The proposed design for the remaining rural section will provide a two lane road having a 20-foot surface, on a minimum right of way width of 100 feet. There will be no relocations on the project.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometrical design, environmental studies, and any other information

about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's office at Matador, Texas. Also, the drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file in the office of the Mayor of the City of Roaring Springs and the County Judge of Motley County, in Matador.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displacees, and the relocation Assistance office - as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction - can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's office.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic, and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's office, or to Mr. V. J. McGee, District Engineer, Childress, Texas, on or before June 4th, 1971. In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

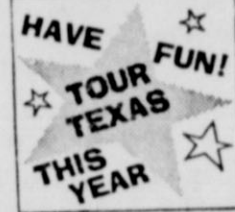
