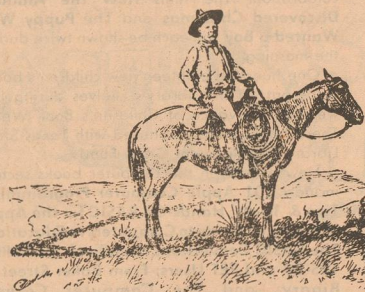

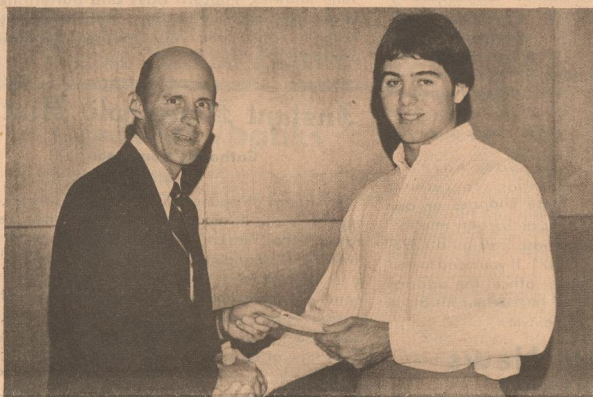

## Tractor-Truck Crash East Of Matador

Three people miraculously escaped serious injuries Wednesday when a semi-truck and a farm tractor collided one mile east of Matador on U.S. Highway 62.

Local farm worker Pete Gonzales was driving a 1980 International Tractor east on the highway and attempted to turn left across the west bound lane. J. Sierocinski, of Roswell, N.M., was also east bound and was

attempting to pass the tractor when the crash occurred.

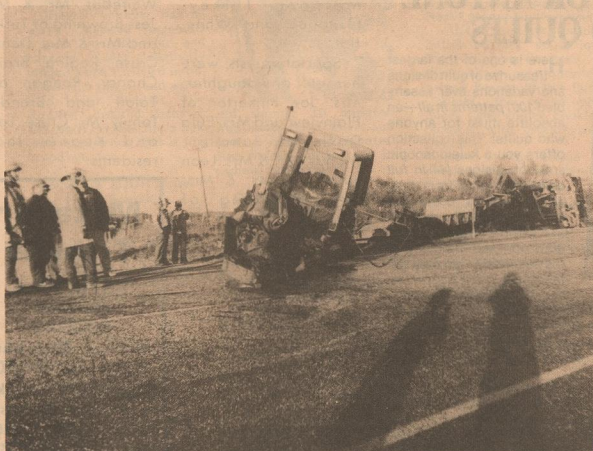
Gonzales jumped free of the tractor cab and received cuts and bruises. Sierocinski was not injured but a female companion also received minor injuries.

Both vehicles were destroyed. Both front tires were knocked off the tractor, plus one of the large rear tires. The truck, a 1978 Kenworth, turned over in the barrow-ditch.

All three of the people involved were taken by ambulance to Floydada. Both drivers were cited for being unsafe.

DPS troopers Dude Speed and Neal Haralson worked the accident. Members of Matador Volunteer Fire Department were on hand to direct traffic and guard against fire.

The tractor belonged to Charlie Renfro.

## Hance Amendment Aids Texas Housing Program

An amendment by U.S. Rep. Kent Hance (D-Lubbock) to a tax bill pending before Congress will be a big boost to Texas' new housing bond program for military veterans.

The Hance amendment exempts the bonds authorized by Texas voters to finance the housing program from pending federal legislation. That legislation would severely limit the amount of these bonds

that states can issue annually. "My amendment ensures that the Texas veterans' program can continue for the next several years without federal controls," Hance said.

Voters in Texas approved the new veterans' mortgage bond program on November 8. Under the program, Texas veterans can apply for low-interest loans of up to \$20,000 to assist them in purchasing a home. The

lower interest rate is possible because the earnings on the bonds issued by the state will be free from federal income tax. Texas voters authorized \$500 million in bonds for this program, a sum expected to last for several years.

Since approval of the veterans' bond program, state officials report receiving thousands of telephone calls from veterans inquiring about the program.

"I am pleased that I was able to help veterans in our state," Hance said. "Americans everywhere owe these fine men and women a debt of gratitude. Helping them buy a home for their families is just one way we can show our appreciation for their sacrifices on behalf of this nation."

The Hance amendment is attached to a larger tax bill, "The Tax Reform Act of 1983." The Lubbock Democrat, a member of the House Ways and Means Committee, said he would work for a complete exemption for the Texas program as this legislation progresses through the Congress.

## United States Stamp Guide Available From Postmaster

Postmaster Nell Clem of Matador says the U.S. Postal Service's 1983 Commemorative Mint Set and the latest edition of **The Postal Service Guide to U.S. Stamps**, a Postal Service book on stamp collecting for the new collector as well as the experienced philatelist,

may be ordered at the post office.

The 1983 Commemorative Mint Set contains 26 issues -- 19 single stamps and seven blocks of four stamps -- at total of 47 stamps and individual plastic mounts which help protect each issue. The set includes a block of four Balloon stamps and 16 of the 24 Olympic stamps, issued to commemorate the 1984 Olympic games.

The 1983 Commemorative Mint Set is the current edition of a series of annual sets released by the Postal Service each year prior to the holiday season. The cover of the \$12.50 Mint Set features artwork related to the commemorative stamps issued during 1983.

The new full-color tenth edition of **The Postal Guide to U.S. Stamps** is priced at \$3.50, the same as last year's book. The 296-page book provides interesting philatelic information for the novice and the experienced collector. It includes latest market

values, catalogue numbers and current prices for souvenir pages and commemorative panels, an index listing of all U.S. Commemorative stamps, a listing of the locations of Postal Service Philatelic Centers, and a special section of Olympic stamps.

The **Guide** also contains many articles and stories related to stamp collecting.

Postmaster Clem also noted that a number of popular topical stamp collecting kits priced from \$2-\$3 each are available. Of particular interest to beginning collectors, these kits feature topics ranging from "Outer Space" and "Science and Scientists" to "Sports" and "Animals."

Each kit includes a 20-page album, 25 to 30 stamps, mounting material, insert sheets for additional stamps and a booklet entitled, "Introduction to Stamp Collecting."

Also on hand are the "Fifty State Birds" and "Flowers Mint Set."

The store will continue to operate much as it has in the past, but the new owners regret that no

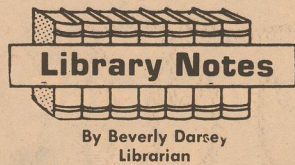
credit will be given under their ownership.

### Leadership the key to success

**THE FAMILY**, Church, school, community, state, or nation will never progress beyond its leadership. Americans visiting Russia have been amazed at the cordiality of the Russian people. Travelers in China return praising the gracious reception the citizenry gave them. All of us have German friends and relatives dear to our hearts. Yet Russia, China, and Germany have perpetrated appalling crimes against humanity. The six million Jews gassed in Hitler's death chambers received the most publicity. However, an esti-

ated SIXTY million Russians were exterminated—many by starvation! And that, of course, does not include the multitude of Poles, Latvians, Yugoslavs, Afghans, etc., Russia has slaughtered. A student from China reported SIXTY million of her people were executed. She said she saw hundreds of Chinese Christians and other dissenters loaded into cattle trucks, drenched with gasoline, and set afire. The screaming, dying people were driven through the streets as a warning to anyone who dared oppose the "cultural" revolution. We who live in freedom and dignity tend to ignore the

fear and degradation that is a way of life for the majority of the people of the world. Surely, Russia's wanton murder of the 269 men, women, and children aboard the Korean airliner will silence the American peaceniks. How can the followers of Jane Fonda, Bishop Mathisen, and Ted Kennedy justify communism's latest crime against humanity? Can anyone advocate America cutting back on our own defense program, while aiding and abetting Russia with food, machinery, and technology? We have indeed fulfilled the Russian prophecy that the U. S. would provide them the rope to hang us with.

Who can believe Russia would have any more qualms about dropping a nuclear bomb on America than they had about shooting down the Korean jetliner. When the leadership of any organization is destructive, there will be suffering. When leadership is constructive, even the dullest followers can prosper. Despite its many flaws, America has been blessed because the man at the helm is trying to steer in the right direction. Godly leaders can preserve even an unGodly people. May we keep all our leaders at home, in the Church, and the world at the top of our prayer lists.

### Social Security News

Recently, we discussed how the Social Security Act as amended in 1977, limited the payment of back benefits on some retirement and survivor's claims if the back payment would result in a permanent reduction to future monthly benefits. Among those affected by this provision were widows and widowers who had attained age 60 but who were under age 65.

The changes in 1977 became effective with January 1978 and continued to be in effect through June of this year. However, beginning with July, 1983 a new law excludes the limit on back payments on widows/widowers claims. Under this new law, back payments may be made for one month; the month of death.

For example: If you lose your spouse due to death this month, you may wait until next month to file your widow's/widower's application. If you meet all factors for entitlement (age, length of

marriage, etc.) to widows/widowers' benefits, during the month of your spouse's death, your payments may begin effective with the month of death rather than the month after death when you actually file your application.

Under the 1977 Amendments, your payments could not begin until the month you actually filed an application. The reason for this change is obvious. If death occurs during the latter days of the month, personal grief may make it undesirable to rush to the nearest Social Security office to file for survivors benefits. In recognition of this fact, the Administration has made this new provision to allow for the one month's back pay.

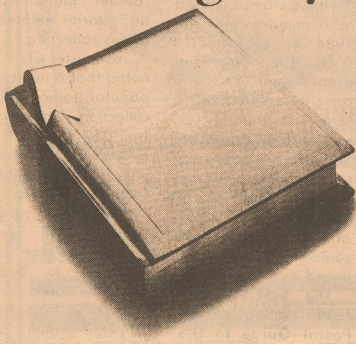
most divorces occur when the couple is married before age 20." He also said that the highest divorce rate was recorded in 1960.
