

Tapes By Phone Available To Farmers

There is a service you may have heard about in this column before called the TOMI phone tapes. They are produced by Texas A&M and deal with current topics. To listen to the tapes, you dial (409) 845-8664 (TOMI).

During December there are a few tapes you may be interested in. From December 6-8: "End of Year Tax Tips" by Wayne Hayenga can be heard; Dec. 9-12, "Cotton Update" by Carl Anderson, and

Dec. 16-18, "Cattle on Feed Report" by Ed Uvacek. These are interesting and informative talks that are easily accessible to you.

Farmers and ranchers have only a few weeks left to make decisions that could affect their 1983 income tax situation.

Year end planning can help save tax dollars. Planning mainly involves decisions to adjust income or expenditures so as to come up with a more favorable tax situation.

With lower tax rates expected during 1984 you may be in a dilemma about the income tax situation this year. Some may feel inclined to shift some taxable income into next year to take advantage of the lower tax rates, particularly if this year's taxable income will be above average. It may be advisable to check with a tax consultant for further information. I have a little more information available at the Extension office.

Questions have come up on the quality of cotton seed saved from this year's crop. Much of it was mature by mid October. The heavy rains since that time may make much of this seed questionable as far as its use as planting seed.

If you are catching some for planting seed you should have it tested for germination. The Texas Department of Agriculture lab in Vernon can run the test for producers at \$5.00 per sample. Also a high free fatty acid content of seed 1.0-1.2% is an indication of germination problems.

assisted by the Rev. Earl Blair, pastor of Floydada First United Methodist Church.

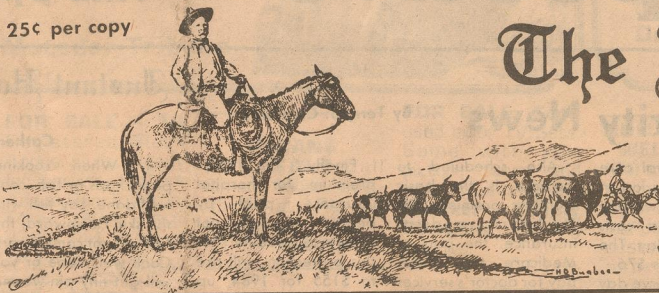
Burial was in Floyd County Memorial Park under direction of Moore-Rose funeral Home.

Accurate Recordkeeping Necessary For Taxpayers

Keeping accurate financial records is probably one of the best tax saving actions that a taxpayer can take, the Internal Revenue advises.

When the time comes for filing a federal tax return, good records can mean the difference between filing an accurate return or an inaccurate one, the Internal Revenue Service says. Also, good records can help taxpayers take all the deductions and benefits to which they are entitled.

Taxpayers are not required to use a specific recordkeeping system. However, receipts, cancelled checks, bills, old returns, and other written documents are essential in proving expenses. Tax records should be kept at least three years

after the return is due or filed, or two years after the tax was paid, whichever is later.

An exception to the three-year retention rule is a property transaction, such as the purchase of real estate. These records should be kept to as long as they are helpful in determining the basis of original or replacement property.

More detailed information about recordkeeping appears in the free IRS Publication 552, "Recordkeeping Requirements and a List of Tax Publications." Taxpayers can obtain the free publication by mail by using the handy order blank contained in the tax package or by calling the IRS Tax Forms/Information number listed in the telephone directory.

The Medicare hospital insurance deductible, the amount a Medicare patient is responsible for when he or she first receives hospital inpatient service in a benefit period, will increase to \$356 in 1984. The 1983 deductible is \$304.

Also scheduled to increase are the per day amounts patients are responsible for after certain lengths of stay in a hospital or skilled nursing facility.

After 60 days of inpatient hospital care in a benefit period in 1984, Medicare will pay for all covered costs except \$89 a day. The 1983 figure was \$76.

For each reserve day of inpatient care, Medicare will pay for all covered costs except \$178. The 1983 figure was \$512.

After 20 days of care in a skilled nursing facility, Medicare will pay all covered costs except \$44.50 a day. The 1983 figure was \$38.

Also scheduled to increase is the basic monthly premium for Medicare medical insurance, the part of Medicare that helps pay for doctor's services and other medical services. The basic 1984 premium will be \$14.60, up from the 1983 figure of \$12.20. Some people will pay more because the basic premium is increased 10 percent for each year a person could have had this protection but did not.

Finally, the basic premium for hospital insurance, paid by people who do not otherwise qualify for this protection, will rise to \$155 for 1984, up from the 1983 figure of \$113.

Instant Household Hints

1. When cooking pork chops or fish, cook well done. Lay fish with the skin downward, the fish will not come apart. Cook well done or you will get tiny pin worms. The tiny worms or parasites, cling to the inside of your intestines and draw the blood out. You will begin to feel lazy. Fish are good protein and also a good brain food.

2. Now the pecans are falling and want a place to go to sleep. Every family should plant 2 or 3 pecans. Dig a hole 3 or 4 inches deep. Lay three leaves in for fertilizer, lay the pecan in and cover. Plant 40 or 50 feet apart. If a wet season, the plant will be up in June. If a dry season, the plant will be up in September. When a tree is removed another tree or seed should

replace the tree. If not, your grandchildren aren't going to have any timber or lumber when they are grown.

3. A good youthful drink for young people. A medium glass of unsweetened pineapple juice with 1/4 of a lemon. No sugar.

4. People over 65, soak your feet in good warm water for 20 minutes, then cut your toenails, not too short. Go over with a file. Calcium will collect at the end of the nails. Trim them off and sometimes the nails are twice as thick as they should be. Wash your feet good and dry real good. Around each nail, paint with mercurchrome. Let dry before slipping socks on. The warm water makes the nails soft.

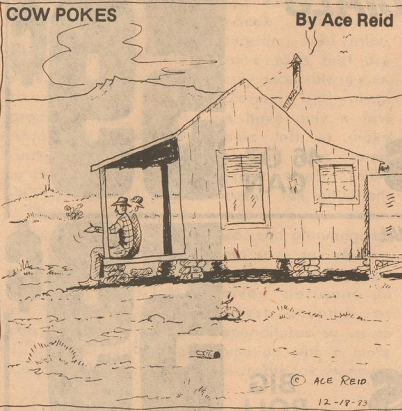

 The joy of owning your very own 'Touch Tone' phone could turn into tragedy if your phone line is designated for a dial or pulse phone. A pushbutton 'pulse' phone will work on most lines, since it also duplicates the signal of a regular dial phone. However, a 'Touch Tone' phone emits a 'beeping' tone that requires special equipment to recognize the signal. Some dial phones, even if you have Touch Call Service, are not compatible under certain circumstances.
