

Grant Received For Sr. Citizens Hall

Texas Governor Mark White notified Motley County Judge Billy Whitaker this week that the county has been awarded \$110,000 by the Texas Department of Community Affairs to construct and equip a "Senior Citizens Center" in Matador.

The Center, which could be a new steel span building, will be built Northeast of the courthouse square, just West of the Housing Authority Apartments.

Governor White told Judge Whitaker the state assumed responsibility for the Community Development Program on June 13, 1983, and this grant is

among the first awarded under the Program's Community Development fund. He said a representative of the Texas Department of Community Affairs will contact the judge to begin execution of the contract.

Until now the senior citizens in Matador have been meeting at the VFW Post 6286, for no charge. They meet once a month.

Recently Mrs. D. C. Baker, Mrs. Liller Garrison and John M. Russell went to Lubbock to a meeting with Mrs. Roy Hobbs and Mrs. L. B. Campbell, to present their petition for the funds to the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

Earlier Mrs. Hobbs and Mrs. Campbell made a trip to Austin to pursue the idea of obtaining a grant for the Matador Senior Citizens.

It should take approximately 45 days to complete the Environmental Protection Agency work. Then a notice to accept bids will be published for three weeks before a contact to build will be let.

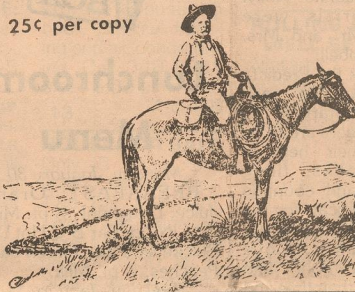

Library Needs Volunteers To Help Catalog Books

The Matley County Library has a serious deadline to meet, and if it is not met it will result in the closing of the facility.

The Library needs 7,500 cataloged books by August 31, 1984 to meet West Texas Library System membership requirements, and to fulfill the minimum requirements for receiving "Establishment Grant Funds" from the Texas State Library.

"This is the only requirement our library has not yet met in order to keep all the equipment and books purchased with the \$59,000 in grant funds we have received during the last three years," Beverly Darsey, local librarian said Friday.

"We will have the total

number of books we need by the deadline date; however getting them cataloged and processed is the problem."

Mrs. Darsey said it has taken library workers three years to catalog and process 5,000 books. Now they have seven months left to process 2,500 more.

"Volunteers can help," she said. "We especially need those with typewriters or those who can type on the computer keyboard. Also if volunteers can come to the library to look up call numbers for books, that will help also."

All interested residents are urged to contact Mrs. Darsey, to help the community keep this worthy facility.

Girls Cling To District Lead

PRE-SEASON

The Motley County Lady Matadors basketball team are now sporting a district record of four wins and no losses, with an overall season record of nine wins and eight losses.

Average points scored in the four district games is 57.2 to the opponents 34.8.

Highlights in pre-season was the double overtime victory over Claude in the Silverton Tournament on December 9, 1983. The score was 56-55. The MC girls won second place in the tournament. Leading scorer in the game was Kim Hand with 27 points and 10 rebounds.

Another highlight was the 52-42 MC win over Crosbyton for third place in the Crosbyton Tournament on December 3. Leaders in that win were Renee Renfro, 13 points and 5

rebounds; Kim Hand, 13 points and 10 rebounds; and Jelene Long, 12 points and 7 rebounds.

A third highlight this season was on December 19, when the local girls defeated rival Paducah 50-42, in Matador. High point girls were Kim Hand, 18 points and 10 rebounds; and Donna Kay Warren, 8 points and 7 rebounds.

Pre-season averages were Kim Hand 200 points, 16.6 per game, 112 rebounds, 9.3 per game, and she made 64 percent of her free throws, hitting 58 of 91. Renee Renfro had 89 points in pre-season, 7.4 per game, 67 rebounds, 5.6 per game.

Donna Kay Warren scored 88 points, 7.4 per game, 84 rebounds, 7.0 per game. Holly Hobbs led the team in steals with 27 and 20 assists. Jelene Long scored 68 points, had 62

rebounds and hit 66 percent of her free throws, 20 of 30, to be the team leader.

DISTRICT HIGHLIGHTS

On January 6, the MC girls defeated McAdoo 67-29 with Kim Hand scoring 15 points. She had 8 rebounds. Renee Renfro scored 12 with 5 rebounds, Penny Bearden led the team in rebounds with 11 and 4 steals.

The girls defeated Jayton 51-37 on January 10, with Kim Hand scoring 17 points and getting 10 rebounds. Renee Renfro had eight points, 11 rebounds; Holly Hobbs had 9 points, hitting 5 of 6 free throws.

On January 13, the girls

defeated Patton Springs 56-38. Kim Hand had 20 points; donna Kay Warren 12 points, 10 rebounds and 4 steals, 2 assists, shooting 66 percent from the floor.

Guthrie was the next victim as the MCgirls won 55-35. Holly Hobbs had 10 points, Kim Hand 11 points, Donna Kay Warren 8 points, 11 rebounds, 6 steals and 2 assists.

The district leaders are: Points per game, Kim Hand, 15.8; Rebounds, Donna Kay Warren, 7.2; Steals, Donna Kay Warren, 2.8; Free Throws, Holly Hobbs, 7 of 11 (64%).

Social Security News

Both employees and self-employed people can earn Social Security credits, commonly referred to as quarters of coverage. A certain number of credits are needed for a person to qualify for Social Security benefits.

For 1984, a person who works in Social Security-covered employment earns one quarter of coverage for every \$390 of covered earnings, up to a maximum of four quarters for the year. The amount of covered earnings required for a quarter of coverage changes automatically each year in accordance with changes in the average wage levels.

Somewhat different rules apply to domestic workers and to farm workers.

All of the earnings of a domestic employee who works in a private household are covered for Social Security if he or she is paid at least \$50 in cash by a single employer during a 3-month calendar quarter.

All of the earnings of a person who works on a farm, including someone employed as a domestic, are covered for Social

Security if he or she is paid at least \$150 in cash by a single employer during the year, or if the person is employed by the farmer at least 20 days during the year for cash pay figured on a time basis (hour, day, week, month, etc.), regardless of the amount of pay.

Domestic and farm workers also earn one quarter of coverage for each \$390 of covered annual earnings, up to a maximum of four quarters for the year.

Similarly, a self-employed person earns one quarter of coverage for every \$390 of net income from self-employment, also up to a maximum of four quarters for the year. In general, net earnings must be \$400 or more to be covered for Social Security. Information about exceptions to this rule may be obtained from any Social Security office.

County Agent's Corner

The Pecan Grafting Training meeting held last Friday the 20th will be repeated on Friday, January 27 for those who were unable to come because of the weather and time.

The meeting will start at 1:00 p.m. and will again be at the Summit Savings in Matador. We will also discuss subjects for additional meetings this winter and spring on landscape and gardening.

For those 4-H'ers with steers who would like to enter them in the District Beef Show, the deadline for entries is February 3.

The last days of winter just before the greening of new spring growth is pruning time for many plants in the home landscape. A well planned landscape which is planned to reduce plant maintenance will eliminate much unnecessary pruning. The wise gardener chooses dwarfs or semi-dwarfs to plant near the home, at entrance areas, near the patio, and in planter boxes. Large plants should be given ample growing room at their mature size.

The gardener should prune with a good reason for pruning. Reasons may include to correct winter damage and to correct overgrown plants, which may be too large for a small area. Plants may also be pruned to increase flower production, such as roses

and crape myrtle. Fruit trees are pruned to increase new growth and fruit formation. Pruning an old plant will rejuvenate it and cause it to grow, especially nandina. Clipped hedges of course need regular pruning.

We are often confused as to the best time for pruning because different types of plants are pruned at different seasons. Basically, pruning times can be grouped as follows:

Spring flowering plants such as azalea and guince should be pruned once they complete their peak bloom in the spring.

Evergreens such as junipers and hollies should be pruned in the winter.

Summer flowering shrubs and trees such as althea, crape myrtle, and mimosa also call for winter pruning.

Hybrid tea roses should be pruned just prior to spring growth.

Berrying ornamentals such as hollies and pyracantha produce berries on old or second-year growth so leave some if you want berries.

Pruning also goes along with transplanting in the winter. Always prune back the branches to compensate for the loss in roots.

For additional tips on pruning and landscape care we have a lot of free handouts at the Extension office and can contact specialists in the horticulture area.

They came in covered wagons, together with the Joe Hollands (brother of Mrs. Edmondson) and the J. L. Burselons, from De Leon, driving some 600 head of cattle. After journeying 230 miles for three weeks, they reached the banks of Ballard Creek where they began to homestead school land.

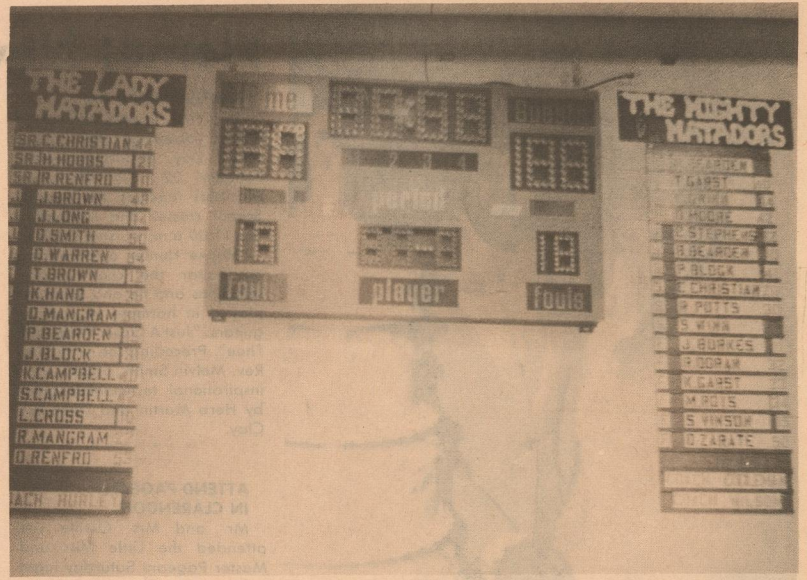

Two packages are needed for the cabinet.

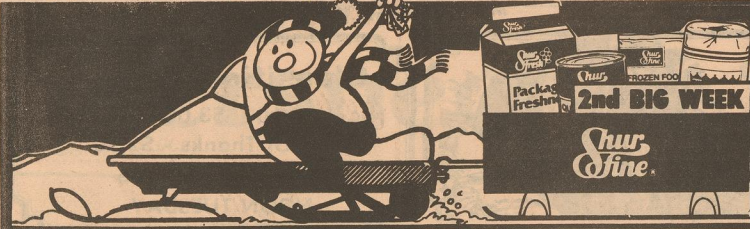
