County Production of Oil Leads Neighbors

TEXAS has produced over 36 billion barrels of oil since the energy liquid was first discovered in the state. One of the largest producing counties is Gregg, where oil was discovered in 1931. The county has produced 2,345,958,463 barrels since that time. Ector County has produced over 1,700,000,000 barrels since oil was discovered in 1926. The compilations are by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Motley County's Roaring Springs fields have produced a total 5,346,701 barrels since oil was first found in 1957. The wells are producing about half a million barrels per year, or 1,423 per day, the release declares.

Oil was discovered in Dickens County in 1953, and total production since that time has been 1,674,079 barrels. It is now producing 674 barrels per day.

Oil was discovered in Floyd County in 1952 and the total production since that date has been 66,529 barrels and it is currently producing 6 barrels

per day. No production is shown in Hall or Briscoe Counties. Cottle County has produced 249,846 barrels since oil was discovered in 1955. Current production is 33 barrels per day.

Lubbock County, where oil was discovered in 1941 has produced a total of 10,477,099 barrels since that time (about twice the amount of Motley County). Currently Lubbock County is producing 2,032 barrels per day.

It is interesting to note the history of Wichita County where oil was discovered in 1910. It has produced a total of more than 689,000,000 barrels but current production is slightly over 20,000 barrels per day. Wood County where oil was discovered in 1941 has produced a total of over 600,000,000 barrels and daily production is over 120,000. Scurry County where oil was discovered in 1923, has produced over one billion barrels and current daily production is 233,297. Many counties listed in the survey produce gas only.

Flomot Hard-Hit By Heavy Rainstorms

MOST of the Flomot community in northwest Motley County suffered severe crop damage Friday night and Saturday morning, during two storms which passed in this area.

Mrs. Crable Jones said the rainfall was 3.30 inches and

She said as far as she knew, all cotton and other crops which had been planted, would require replanting. She said many farmers had stopped planting because of needed moisture.

Matador received a total of 1.06 inch according to Bob Stanley's rain gauge. He registered 80-inch Friday night and 28-inch Saturday afternoon.

Roaring Springs received about one inch according to reports. The rains were heavy at Whiteflat with 2.50 to 3.50 inches being reported.

A large part of Hall county was flooded, including Memphis, according to newspaper reports. Several areas reported six inches and Federal disaster aid is being sought.

Lightning Paintings Sets Blaze Exhibited

Lightning, spawned from a seemingly insignificant thunderstorm on May 20 about 3:45 p.m. resulted in a fire which left a White River Lake house in virtual total ruin and destroyed a portion of the household and personal effects of the Max Kennedy family, formerly of Matador.

The blaze was the second major catastrophe to strike the Kennedy family within the past year.

Their son, Randy, was killed last July in a tractor-shredder accident. The 13-year-old lost his life soon after he had moved to Spur from Abernathy with his parents and two brothers.

Friends of the family said lightning struck a television antenna at the residence and "came right on down through the TV" to ignite the blaze.

The Kennedys moved into the house in early May. Kennedy, head coach at Spur High School the past year, had resigned that post and was scheduled to become manager of the White River Marina on May 23. The house was owned by the marina.

According to the Crosbyton Review, flames quickly gutted the six room and bath structure. Crosbyton Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene.

A CONTRACT for half a million dollars was signed Friday between the board of trustees of the Motley County Independent School District and the South Plains Steel Structures, Inc. of Lubbock.

The \$500,000 worth of new school facilities will include a new gymnasium, as well as new grade and high school building. Construction will be of concrete, steel and brick. The cost will be about \$11-\$12 per square foot, which is about \$4 less than the nearest bidder.

Using bonds which the old Matador district had in reserve, school officials believe the structure can be completed, including the gymnasium, without any increase in taxes.

Bonds were sold in February at a very favorable interest rate of 4.37 percent.

Superintendent Charles Johnson said Monday that the building company expects to set stakes this week. A goal of completion has been set in March, depending on favorable weather during the period.

STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

Science is truth -- knowledge. Theory is some man's idea for explaining a mystery of life or the universe. In time a theory may prove to be a fact. If evidence is lacking, a theory must remain just that, a theory; no matter how strongly the author feels about it. When the Bible mentions an idea in the field of science, that idea has been proven to be scientifically true.

"O Timothy, guard what has been entrusted to you, avoiding worldly and empty chatter and the opposing arguments of what is falsely called knowledge (science, KJV) -- which some have professed and thus gone astray from the faith." 1 Tim. 6:20-21.

Today many who profess Christ have "gone astray from the faith" by believing science theorists instead of God.

Three decades ago many Christians considered the words "scientist" and "atheist" as synonymous. Today, it seems, there is a trend which indicates that many scientists are back on the Lord's side. You are aware that some of the astronauts are reading the Bible while on their space missions.

Let us note another evidence that many of today's scientists believe that God is the Force behind creation. **Biology: A Search for Order in Complexity.** This is a recent publication (1970) designed for use as a high school text in biology, edited by John H. Moore, M.S., Ed. D. and Harold S. Slusher, M.S. In the Preface, page XX, we read this, "There also exists today a significant body of biologists and other scientists who are convinced that special creation provides a more reasonable and satisfying philosophy of origins than evolution." The same paragraph states that about 350 scientists in the Creation Research Society support the idea of "creation versus evolution."

A Christian should never be against science-knowledge. However, all Christians should agree with Paul the apostle and be against "science falsely so called."

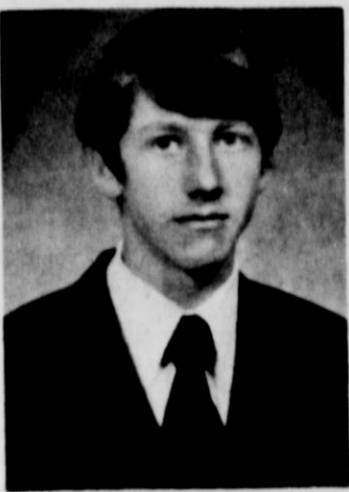

This may be another year for the screwworm. As of May 1, 1973, 89 cases have been confirmed in Texas, and the weather is going to be a key factor in determining the screwworm situation.

If worms are found, collect some and send to the Mission lab for identification. According to information I have received, if screwworm samples are

submitted, the sterile flies will be dropped over the area where the case originated as was the case prior to 1972 when the demand exceeded the supply of sterile flies available.

My military duty comes a little early this year, so I hope you will excuse my absence from June 10-23 while I am at Ft. Bliss, Texas.

Planting time is near, but how much thought are you giving to the seed you plant? Cost of seed represents only a small part of the total amount of crop production, so why not give yourself a chance for good yields.

The cheapest seed may not be the cheapest. Variety, purity and germination must be considered. If the variety is not suited for the area, your chances for success are greatly reduced, and as for purity, who wants to plant weeds or a mixture? The higher the germination, the less seed you will have to plant per acre, and the less skips in the field.

A person should not close his mind on other varieties. If you are growing a variety that you like and the performance is good, stick with it, but be on the lookout for other varieties that do well in the county. Try some of this variety and see if it will do better than the variety that you like. If it out performs your favorite, why not change. It will mean more "change" for you.

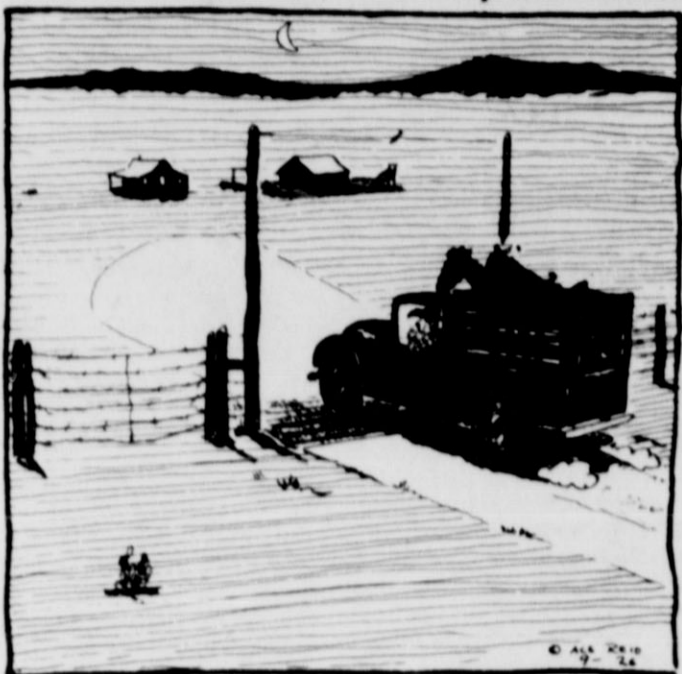
