Fire Hazards Continue

GRASS FIRES continued last week to menace property owners in the area and for the second time struck the Matador Ranch.

Thursday afternoon Matador Volunteer firemen were summoned to a range fire on the Matador Ranch about three miles south of town. The fire started about 2 p.m. east of Highway 70 and quickly spread in an easterly direction

Firefighting units from Matador and Paducah fought the swiftly moving blaze as it spread east to the Charlie Keith and D. P. Keith pastures. Wind gusts up to 50 m.p.h. hampered firemen in fighting the fire which started from unknown causes. However, the fire had been brought under

control by about 5 p.m. A number of local ranchers assisted in fighting the . preventing these fires during flames with cattle sprayers as well as county and State equipment.

The fire was not as costly as that of two weeks ago which struck the Matador Headquarters. Only about 150 acres were lost Thursday, along with about 100 acres of adjoining land.

Fire department officials remind citizens that throwing matches and cigarettes from automobiles can start a costly grass fire. They ask each citizen to help in extremely dry weather.

Earlier Thursday, firemen were called to the West

Texas Gin to fight a burr fire which had started there. The

firemen were still trying to extinguish the fire when the one south of town broke out There was concern for a while that the high wind would spread the fire to adjoining pastureland.

Saturday, Matador firemen were called to another range fire about 10 miles north of town on the Malcolm Jameson ranch. That blaze was quickly extinguished with a minimum of damage. The Tribune thanks Kodney Williams for the above
