

## Granny Self Keeps Busy By Feeding Birds At Lockney

"Granny" Self, 91, of Matador, as she is affectionately known to the residents of Lockney Care Center, started the New Year with her morning ritual of feeding the birds.

Wearing her sunbonnet and her apron filled with bread crumbs, she was oblivious to the 28 degree temperature and the traces of snow as she called to the birds while scattering their food.

"The days from December 18-30 "Granny" considered time

lost, since she could not feed the birds," Gloria Shoemaker, director of nurses, explained. "With that interval termed the coldest December this century, we could not risk her falling on the frozen snow. She has priority on bread crumbs and other residue foods suitable for the birds from the dining room."

"Active as a wren, happy as a lark, 'Granny' is our Man Friday for wheelchair residents, dispensing her services and sharing her happiness as she attends to their wants," Mrs.

Shoemaker continued. "She loves everybody, and her interests are not limited to the Center. She is an avid newspaper and magazines reader and is attentive to the other news media."

"Her feeding the birds is a two-way street for us. She enjoys feeding them and we enjoy her."

Mrs. John William Self was admitted to the Center June 8, 1982, to recover from hip surgery which resulted from a fall in her Matador garden. She has been home only once since then. Learning of her plans to return New Years Day, 1983, her friends had an immaculate home and an abundance of food waiting.

Daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John W. Miller, she was born March 6 1891, in Pickens, Georgia.

James Bean of Portland, Oregon, an architect, whom she has raised as a son, is the only other surviving member of her family.

## Wholesale Power Coop Organized By Companies

Ten rural electric cooperatives serving a large area of the Texas High Plains and Oklahoma Panhandle have announced plans to form a new generating and transmission cooperative to be headquartered in Amarillo, Texas. The name of the new association is Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, and will serve an area extending from Hooker, Okla. to Lubbock, Tex.

The ten participating Cooperatives are Bailey County Electric Cooperative, Muleshoe; Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Hereford; Greenbelt Electric Cooperative, Wellington; Lamb County Electric Cooperative, Littlefield; Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc., Floydada; North Plains Elec. Coop., Perryton; Rita Blanca Elec. Coop., Dalhart; South Plains Elec. Coop., Lubbock; Swisher E.

C., Tulia; Tri-County E.C., Hooker, Okla. The combined assets of the ten systems exceeds 215 million dollars.

The purpose of the new organization is to provide better coordinated power supply planning and contract negotiation. In addition, the new organization will use system studies to find savings through interconnecting transmission systems, load management, other suppliers, and studying cooperative owned generating projects.

Lighthouse Electric Board President, Cecil Baxter, said he thought joining the new generation and transmission Cooperative was a wise move because, "We can now monitor wholesale power costs more closely in the future."

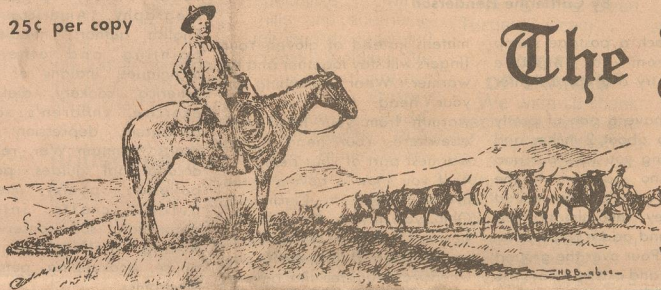

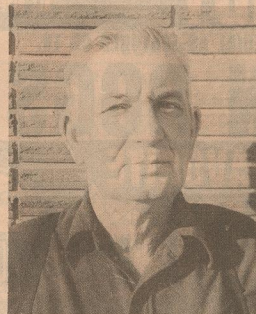

## Vernon Electric System Purchased By WTU

Citizens of Vernon voted Saturday to sell their Municipal Electric System to West Texas Utilities Co.

The transaction, scheduled for completion this spring pending approval of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, will add about 2,500 customers to the

WTU system, which already serves about half the city.

Rising fuel costs, needed power plant and distribution improvements, and rising maintenance and operation costs were cited by the City Commission as reasons for the proposed sale.

Any alternatives to selling the system would have required rate increases and possible tax increases, city officials stated. The sale to WTU will bring lower electric rates in Vernon, because rates there are set by the city and are higher than standard rate WTU charges in other towns.

In its proposal, WTU agreed to pay the city \$2.68 million, subject to adjustments for changes in inventory or property conveyed.

Vernon will be the third municipal electric system purchased by WTU in recent years from cities whose power plants were outmoded. Others were at Winters and Baird.

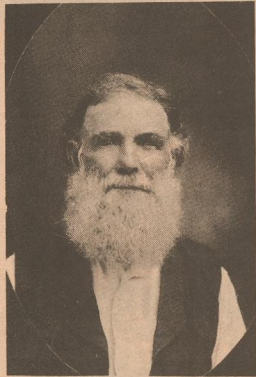

## County Agent's Corner

### FURROW DIKING IMPROVES DRYLAND CROP YIELDS

The factor that most often limits crop yields in Motley County is drought during the growing season. Research has shown that furrow diking may be used to improve efficiency of soil moisture storage and lessen the effects of drought. Many Motley County producers are already using this practice. Furrow diking refers to a tillage practice which mechanically places mounds of soil at intervals across the furrow, thus forming small basins. When rainfall occurs, it is trapped in the basins and infiltrates into the rather than being lost a runoff.

Research recently conducted by Dr. C.J. Gerard, Professor of Soil Physics with TAES at Vernon, has addressed this problem. His studies have shown the effects of furrow diking on yields of cotton and grain sorghum. Dikes six to eight inches in height were established in the furrow at intervals of six feet. A tractor-mounted diker was used to establish the dikes in January. Subsoiling was performed with Chisels 20 inches apart plowed to a depth of 14 to 16 inches.

Furrow diking significantly increased crop yields. In 1981, prior to planting, runoff occurred on undiked land but not on diked land. In 1981 and 1982, grain sorghum yields were more than doubled as a result of furrow diking every furrow. In 1981

sorghum yields were increased from 1,035 lbs. on the check plot to 2,240 lbs. per acre under furrow diking. In 1982 the sorghum yields were increased from 1,660 lbs per acre on the check treatment to 3,400 lbs per acre by furrow diking, an average increase from both years of 108%.

Furrow diking in alternate furrows increased sorghum yields by an average of 56%, while subsoiling alone increased yields by 27%. Alternate row diking was more effective in increasing grain yields during 1981, a dry year, than during the wet year of 1982.

Dr. Gerard's research showed that cotton yields were also increased by furrow diking. Although the average increase in yields due to furrow diking was not as spectacular on cotton as on grain sorghum, diking every furrow resulted in yield increases averaging 34% for 2 years. Diking resulted in cotton lint yield increases from 326 to 429 lbs. per acre in 1981 and from 329 to 445 lbs. per acre in 1982. Cotton on half-diked land produced a 15% yield increase in 1981 and a 29% increase in 1982. Diking every furrow increased gross returns on cotton over \$50 per acre.

## Social Security News

Although home health care has been covered by Medicare since it began in 1965, it is often overlooked by people who are considering their health care options. Home health care was developed as an alternative to inpatient care in a hospital or skilled nursing facility. This coverage is for persons who do not need full-time inpatient care, but do have an illness or injury which prevents leaving home.

People who need part-time skilled health services in their home can receive them from a home health agency which takes part in Medicare. Such an agency is a public or private organization specializing in providing skilled nursing services and other health care services to patients in their own homes.

When eligibility conditions are met, home health care can be

covered under both hospital insurance and medical insurance. Medicare now covers unlimited home health care up to the approved charge limits.

When home health care is covered, Medicare can pay for part-time skilled nursing services, physical therapy, and speech therapy. If one of these services is needed, Medicare can also pay for part-time services of an occupational therapist, home health aide, or medical social worker, as well as for medical appliances furnished by the agency.

### YOUR HEALTH

Facts From The American Dental Hygienists' Association

What we eat and how much we eat affects the way we look and feel. Like the rest of the body, your teeth and gums need proper food to stay healthy.

In the 4th century B.C., Aristotle noticed that people who ate lots of ripe figs had more tooth decay than people who did not.

It wasn't until the 1950s that scientists started to see the relationship between food and tooth decay. Decay occurs because of plaque, a sticky, colorless layer of harmful bacteria that forms on everyone's teeth. The bacteria in plaque feed on sugars and produce acids that attack your teeth and gums. The plaque holds these acids on to the teeth. After many such attacks, the tooth enamel breaks down, forming a cavity.

It would be difficult to eliminate all sugar-containing foods from your diet. The object is to cut down on the number of times plaque bacteria can go to work producing harmful acids.

The American Dental Hygienists' Association offers these tips on diet for better dental health:

-Eat balanced meals daily.

-Don't snack between meals. Each time you eat, acids attack tooth enamel for twenty minutes.

-Remove plaque by brushing and flossing thoroughly at least once a day.

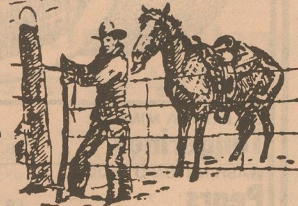
