CELEBRATION IS VARIED AFFAIR

FROM the opening parade to the final event of the day, the street dance, Motley County's Bicentennial celebration was a varied affair, offering something for everyone in observance of the nation's 200th birthday.

Led by the colorful Reese Air Force Base Color Guard from Lubbock (in colonial costumes) the parade included floats, antique cars, wagons and buggies, bicycle riders, riders on horses, the Amarillo Khiva Shrine Probst riding in a convertible, and the Lubbock Khiva Cart Patrol performing a drill in miniature cars.

From his place on the reviewing stand, U.S. Representative Jack Hightower paid tribute to the founding fathers for the privileges we enjoy today. "We acknowledge our debt of gratitude for 200 years of freedom, dedicated to that proposition."

Congressman Hightower congratulated Motley County on its spirit and outstanding contribution to the bicentennial observance and expressed his preference for small communities. He still lives in Vernon and commutes from there to his office in Washington.

He was introduced by his friend of many years, Furman Vinson.

The program opened with a flag-raising ceremony, by Maador Boy Scouts followed by a gun salute by the VFW and American Legion firing squad, and pledge of Allegiance.

J. M. (Sonny) Russell served as Master of Ceremonies and presented the awards to the parade winners. Following Congressman Hightower's address, Mrs. M. G. Bethard, chairman of Motley County Senior Citizens, presented the Senior Citizen of the Year Award to Mrs. Ben Keltz of Matador for outstanding leadership in civic and church activities. She also introduced her daughter, Mrs. Sam Swinnea of Dallas, who sang, "God Bless America."

Following the program, Congressman Hightower dedicated the Pioneer Memorial Park which had been designated as a memorial to Mr. and Mrs. James E. Meador by their son, the late Douglas Meador, longtime publisher of the Matador Tribune.

Mr. Hightower dedicated the park to all pioneers who had a part in the development of Motley County. He recognized Harold V. Brown of Yale, Okla., who had presented a plaque to Meador in behalf of the Cimarron Valley Historical Society, for his literary achievements, and Meador's brother, Joe Meador of Paducah, who made a brief talk, expressing his gratitude for these tributes. Delegates To Receive FFA Degrees

Two members of the Motley County Future Farmers of America will receive their FFA degrees Thursday (today) at the 48th State FFA convention in Dallas. The delegates have been in Dallas this week attending the convention set for July 14-16 at the Dallas Convention Center. The theme for the convention is "A Future For America - FFA."

The members, Jim Cooper and Louis Shorter, and their Chapter Advisor, Bill Moss are attending the three-day meeting of representatives of over 899 chapters from throughout the state, which will include the awarding of advanced degrees, scholarships and the awards to outstanding members of the organization.

Keynote speaker for the FFA convention will be Charlie Plumb of Kansas City, Missouri. He graduated from Annapolis in 1964 and two years later finished training as a pilot of the Navy's supersonic interceptor, the F4B Phantom. He spent nearly six years as a POW in Vietnam prisons and was awarded the Navy Commendation Medal, the Air Medal, Purple Heart and Silver Star.

The Honorable John Tower will also address the meeting. Senator Tower is a Life Member of the FFA Alumni Association. National FFA President Bobby Tucker will also address the convention delegates and Mark Ellison, State FFA President, Rosebud-Lott will preside during the programs, assisted by nine vice presidents.

One of the highlights of the convention will be the awarding of the Lone Star Farmer Degree. Jim, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Cooper, and Louis, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Shorter will be among the recipients, and both boys will be voting delegates.

from one booth to another, trying to decide what, if anything to buy, having a cold drink and a hot dog, perhaps listening to a little music, taxes are probably the last thing they think about.

But the Comptroller's Department, as the state's chief tax collector and administrator, has to think about taxes all the time.

It is important not only for us, but also for Texas taxpayers, the organizations which sponsor arts and crafts shows, and the exhibitors to be aware of the legal requirements for sales at such events.

Sales of arts and crafts are taxable.

Artists and exhibitors must obtain sales tax permits, collect the sales tax from their customers, and report and send the tax dollars collected with their sales tax returns to the Comptroller's Department in Austin.

Sponsors of such events should require exhibitors to present and prominently display their sales tax permits. It is difficult enough to put together and run an event like this without having problems with violations of the sales tax law. The time to insure that violations do not occur is in advance of the occasion, not in the midst of it.

The Comptroller's Department wants to avoid tax problems—for ourselves, for retailers who collect taxes for us, and for taxpayers. Avoiding problems or solving them when they first arise saves time, money, and trouble for everyone.
