WT Utilities Case Reaches Agreement

A settlement agreement providing an increase in base rates and a decrease in fuel cost charges has been reached in the West Texas Utilities Co. rate case now pending before the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

A formal hearing scheduled for this week in Austin was cancelled after WTU, the PUC staff and intervenors on behalf of several cities entered into a negotiated settlement on all issues involved in the rate case. A hearing is set for 3 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 26 for submission of the written agreement, which must be approved and signed by the cities. The hearing examiner then will make a recommendation to the three-member Commission.

Under the agreement, WTU would receive an increase in basic rates of approximately \$12.5 million. It will receive about \$7.1 million less for fuel costs because fuel prices apparently have softened. WTU

School Money Approved But Red Tape Is Involved

Senate action, Tuesday, to appropriate \$1 million for the rebuilding of the Motley County School does not represent final action for the school to receive the money at this time.

The Senate approved legislation by Sen. Lloyd Bensen to appropriate the money to assist the community in rebuilding the school destroyed by the tornado May 1.

However, a spokesman from Senator Bensen's office told the Tribune Tuesday that there are still hurdles to cross before Motley County will receive the money.

The next step to finish work on the bill is for it to go to the House of Representatives, which has a different version of the bill. Both the Senate and House must have identical bills before it can go to

conference, then back to both houses to be passed. From the houses the bill will go to President Reagan's desk to be signed.

The Bensen bill, an amendment to the Labor/Health and Human Services Appropriation Bill pending before the Senate, was approved unanimously.

Letters Exchanged Between Bank And MC Citizens

There are numerous rumors concerning a letter written recently. A few citizens met with the city council on August 9th. They decided to compose and send a letter of concern to the City National Bank of Plainview. The following is the content of that letter.

Plainview, Texas

Dear Mr. Stokes,

Following the May 1st tornado, approximately \$29,000.00 was given to the Matador Tornado Relief Fund. As of this date, the victims have not received any of this money.

The Texas Dept. of Community Affairs recently announced a \$350,000.00 grant has been awarded to the victims. They have not received any of this aid. Those who qualify will only

receive assistance on real estate. This grant does not cover any damage to personal property.

The victims were told by Mayor Gary Lancaster, in a June meeting, the money donated to the City for the victims would be used to replace personal property.

The victims were then told, in an August meeting, the \$20,000.00 sent by the City National Bank had been divided between the City and County "to benefit the majority of the people as a whole." We understand this was approved by the City National Bank.

We feel this was not the intent of the donors of Plainview and the City of Matador should not expect to benefit from the victims' tragedy and loss.

We would like to know if there were stipulations on this donation? If it was intended to aid victims, would you approach our City Council to reimburse the money to the Tornado Relief Fund to be disbursed to the victims?

Our intention was to make the initial step in stimulating the citizens of Matador to rebuild (what we think is) a very fine city.

Everyone's patience and understanding is requested, as the city government labors to untangle the red tape and delayed action of other parties concerning this matter.

Flomot Woman Dies In Truck-Van Collision

An elderly Flomot woman was killed instantly Monday morning after a van in which she and her husband were riding was broadsided by a tractor-trailer truck north of Floydada.

Shirley Ross, 73, was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace R.H. Ford of Lockney after sustaining fatal injuries in the crash, which occurred at 7 a.m. at the intersection of Ross Pit Road and Highway 207.

Sam Davis Ross, 77, the driver of the van, sustained a broken wrist, cuts and bruises from the collision. He was taken to Caprock Hospital in Floydada following the accident, but was

later transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, where he was treated and released.

According to Department of Public Safety Trooper Doug Whitworth, who investigated the accident, a gravel truck being driven by David Kilpatrick of the Weaver Trucking Co. in Odessa had pulled out onto Highway 207 from the pit after failing to see the oncoming van.

Whitworth said that a stop sign was at the intersection on Ross Pit Road, but that charges against the driver were still pending.

The accident occurred about four and a half miles north of Floydada.

Senior girls at Motley County High School, and their mothers were special guests at a Friendship Tea given by GFWC El Progreso Club Thursday, Sept. 20, at the home of Mrs. E.A. Day.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. Robert Dickson and business of the club was disposed of before the arrival of the guests. Announcements included the upcoming board meeting Sept. 26-28 of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs as members of the General Federation of Women's Clubs which will be held in Austin, and also of the GFWC Santa Rosa Workshop which will be held Oct. 20, in Matador. Mrs. Dickson appointed committees for this meeting.

Yearbooks for the new club year were distributed by Mrs. C.D. Garrison, chairman of the yearbook committee. She gave a preview of the programs and special guest days.

Mrs. Frank Pohl served as program leader and played casio music from "The Sound of Music," as the guests arrived. She presented Mrs. J.E. Edwards as Speaker for the program emphasizing Education.

Mrs. Edwards spoke on the subject, "Making the Most of Opportunities," which profiled career opportunities from the local community.

"You will encounter stiff competition when you finish high school," she told her audience. Handing them copies of a survey in the current issue of Woman's Day, she reviewed 15 starting jobs that begin at \$15,000--and up, headed with the notation: If you're thinking of entering a new field, pick one that's lucrative! These occupations, requiring only two years of training or less, are your best bet. The list included carpenter, chef, computer systems technician, mail carrier, painter and paperhanger, paralegal, paramedic, police officer, printer and lithographer, registered nurse, technical writer and telephone services. From U.S. News & World Report, Mrs. Edwards read from an Occupational Handbook which

listed the percentages of various jobs projected for 1995, from 1982.

"So many students who have graduated from Matador High School have become successful in professional fields, it would be impossible to name them all," Mrs. Edwards said, "but listed among these are physicians, lawyers, journalists, scientists, military personnel, heads of businesses and many, many more, including those who are engaged in various civic and county positions and business enterprises here in our small community."

In her talk Mrs. Edwards referred to a new terminology, "YUMPIES," which has recently come into use. "They stand for Young Upwardly Motivated Persons, to describe youth of today seeking success." She closed her remarks with an observation by the actor Ben Vereem when he took a reporter on a tour of the ghetto in New York, where he was born. The reporter asked Vereem why, with all the money he had made, he had not moved his parents to a better location. "They did not want to be moved," he replied. "They told me 'there's something important about humble beginnings, and we want to continue to nurture those humble beginnings.'"

Mrs. Edwards then called for a roll call of the club members, to name some outstanding person who had graduated from the local schools.

Inspirational Thought by Mrs. Pohl was a verse from Ecclesiastes, and a quotation from John Wesley, "Do all the good you can, to all the people you can, in every way you can, for as long as you can."

Refreshments of punch and cookies were served by a tea committee composed of Mrs. Gus Bird, Mrs. C.D. Garrison, Mrs. W.D. Lipscomb and Mrs. Harold Campbell. A cutwork cloth covered the table, which was centered with an arrangement of fall foliage and flowers. Mrs. Dickson poured the punch.

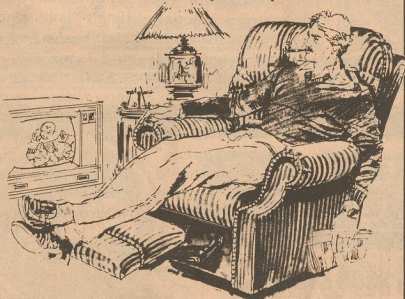

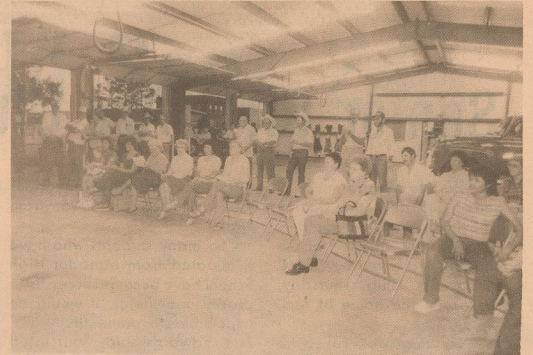

Do-It-Yourself Kitchen Projects

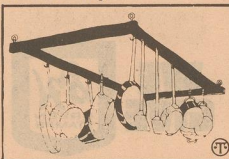
A hanging pot and pan rack is a good solution to a "storage short" kitchen or for the cook who likes cooking gear where it is handy and visible, experts say. What's more, it can be easy to make yourself.

Make the rack out of 2x4s joined together with 1/4 inch carriage bolts about four inches long. Hangers for utensils can be brass or made of 1/4 inch dowels set at an upward angle. Adjust height of the rack so utensils will be within easy reach. A solid platform of 3/4 inch plywood can be added to take those seldom used articles.

The rack can be suspended from the ceiling with either toggle bolts or by running lag bolts into ceiling joists.

Ends can be secured in the same fashion, if counter is set between adjoining walls. If not, use brackets made of 2x4s. Let them run from underside close to front edge to wall just above baseboard. Easier yet, use a solid plywood end support.

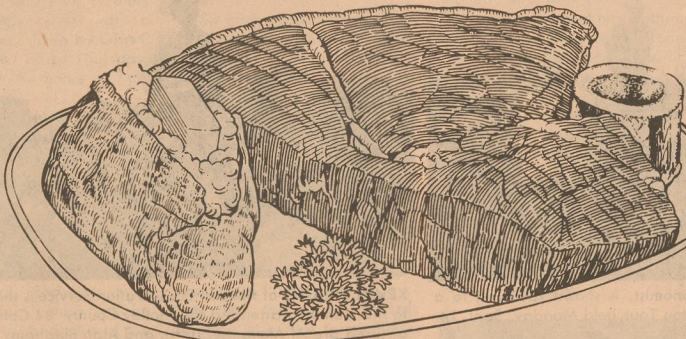

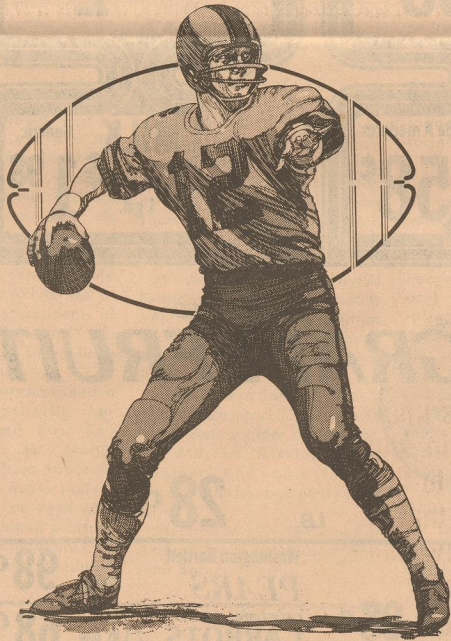

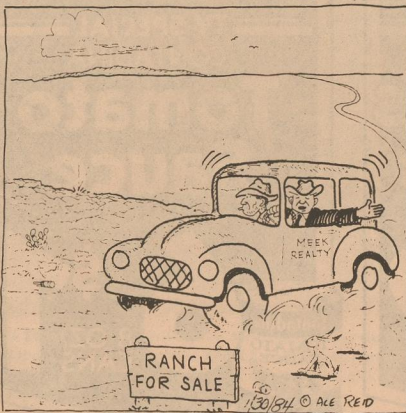
