

DRT Chapter Receives Outstanding Project Award

The General James Smith Chapter, Lubbock, of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas was named the outstanding chapter for 1983-1984 by the Sesquicentennial Committee of DRT for the accomplishments of Sesquicentennial projects.

An engraved silver bowl was presented to the chapter president, Mrs. Douglas F. Blackburn, and the chapter Sesquicentennial chairman, Mrs. Frank Potts, at the Awards Luncheon during the annual state DRT convention, May 11, in Amarillo.

The Lubbock chapter, made up of members from ten surrounding counties, served as Convention hostesses with the other District X chapters; Odessa, Wichita Falls, Pampa, Abilene, Snyder, Archer City, and Amarillo. Mrs. Rex Arnold of Lubbock, President General of the state organization, presided for the business sessions.

Serving as convention chairman for the Lubbock group was Mrs. Furman Vinson, Flomot. Mrs. Vinson was in charge of decorating individual tables and the headtable. A western motif was carried out in the headtable centerpiece with two of Furman's boots stuffed with red carnations, red bandannas and DRT branding irons.

Centerpieces on individual tables were attractively made up with clothespin cowboys and cowgirls, made by Mrs. Winifred Lee, Matador, cotton bales, Texas flags and mesquite branches with the base surrounded by red, white and blue ribbon. Tumbleweeds, peacock feathers and cow skulls decorated a corner of the luncheon area, under the dome at the Amarillo Hilton.

During the year the chapter conducted contests to name the Outstanding Texas History Teacher and the Outstanding 7th Grade History Student in the area. Mrs. Sallye Harris Lyles, Floydada Junior High, and Mark Harrison, 7th grade essayist representing Atkins Junior High, Lubbock, were winners of both the chapter and District X contest. Regina Cruse of Motley County School was second in the area contest.

A pecan tree was planted at the Senior Citizens' Center, Hale Center, and members participated in a massive individual bluebonnet planting campaign. Two Republic of Texas Citizens' graves were marked at the Bookout Cemetery, Dermott, Scurry County which Mrs. Potts and Mrs. Stanley Burleson attended.

A set of Texas flags was presented to All Saints Episcopal School; a framed Texas Declaration of Independence was given to Texas History classes of Mrs. Frances Evans, Atkins Junior High; a framed Sesquicentennial Map of Texas, 1836, was given to Floydada Junior High history classes.

Pioneer Women in Texas (Annie D. Pickrell) was presented to the Motley County Library for their genealogical department. **The Matador Tribune** published Mrs. Frank Potts' manuscript, "The Peaks Witnessed Many Dramas Over the Years," and her essay on "The Texan-Santa Fe Expedition of 1841" was entered in the Mamie Wynne Cox Historical Research competition.

Rankin, former DRT chapter president of Hale Center, was given in the name of the chapter to the Hale Center Museum. More than 125 ABC Coloring Books were distributed to area kindergarten children.

Dr. Patricia Horridge, Lubbock, placed a portrait of her ancestor, Dr. Martin Ruter, first Methodist Missionary to the Republic of Texas in 1837, in the Tarrytown United Methodist Church, Austin, where her parents are members. Two workshops aided prospective members to complete nine membership applications and members to submit twenty supplemental lines approved this year.

The chapter donated \$200 to the French Legation, \$30 to the DRT Museum, \$30 to the DRT Historical Publication Fund, and gave 100% to the President General's Scholarship Fund.

Several chapter members spoke on Texas topics to various groups, clubs, organizations and schools. Mrs. Blackburn spoke to history students about her ancestors and DRT. Mrs. Arnold gave a talk to the Plainview Women's Club on "Rebellion, Revolt, Revolution." Telling about the Indians of the area, Mrs. Roberts conducted museum

tours. Speaking to Motley County and Floydada Junior High history students, Mrs. Potts outlined the Texan-Santa Fe Expedition of 1841.

Fifteen members attended the convention, including Mrs. Vinson and Mrs. Potts from this area, which was held from May 9 to May 11.

Billie Beth Moore, niece of Mrs. Olive Russell and Mrs. John Hamilton of Matador, gave a report during the business sessions at convention on her Historical Publication Committee. Miss Moore will be remembered for recently becoming a life-member of the Motley County Library with her \$100 donation. Mrs. William R. Moore, former Matador resident, was responsible for counting votes at the business session.

The General James Smith Chapter was recognized as third, state wide, in the publicity category. Area newspapers, such as The Matador Tribune are to be commended for their part in this award by printing the articles of members, and reporting on the various contests and projects.

Donna Nelson Selected "Woman Of Excellence"

In ceremonies at the Red Lion, Jantzen Beach, in Portland Thursday, May 3, Donna Nelson--Vice President and a member of the Board of Directors of Evergreen International Aviation, Inc.--was honored along with five other women from the state as "Women of Excellence."

SPECIAL EMERGENCY GRAZING AND HAYING ON ACREAGE CONSERVATION RESERVE

The Motley County ASCS Office is now accepting requests for permission to graze and harvest hay or other forage from ACR acreage (set-aside). Producers who wish to graze and harvest hay or other forage from ACR acreage (set-aside), must first make a request at the Motley County ASCS Office before grazing or haying ACR acreage.

Only ACR acreages operated by the producer making the request may be grazed or hayed. Only livestock owned by the producer on or before April 17, 1984 may be grazed on ACR acreage during the remainder of the 6-month nongrazing period. Hay harvested from ACR acreage must be fed by the producer making the request. Hay or roughage harvested on ACR acreage may not be sold. Livestock purchased or leased after April 17, 1984 may not be grazed on ACR or fed hay from ACR. Grazing and haying of ACR should not remove the cover to the extent that the acreage is unprotected from weeds and from wind or water erosion.

LIST OF AVAILABLE HAY INCLUDING OTHER ROUGHAGES

The Motley County ASCS is providing assistance to: (1) Livestock producers in locating hay or other roughages to buy; and (2) Producers with excess hay or other roughage in locating buyers in need of their crop.

We will compile a list of producers with hay or other roughages available for sale in the county. If you have hay or other roughages for sale, or know of someone who has hay or other roughages for sale, please contact this office so we can get you or them on the list.

EFAP FEEDING PERIOD EXTENDED

The feeding period for emergency purchase of corn for eligible livestock has been extended until June 15, 1984. Livestock producers in Motley County interested in obtaining the corn need to make application at this office. Remember, the corn a producer is eligible to receive must be fed by June 15, 1984. There should

be no more than a 10 day supply of corn on hand on June 15, 1984.

USDA REQUESTS COMMENTS ON 1985 WHEAT PROGRAM

The United States Department of Agriculture is seeking public comment on provisions of the 1985 federal wheat program which, by law, must be announced no later than July 1. USDA is seeking comments on the following:

1. The loan and purchase prices and the established target price. The minimum target price is \$4.38 per bushel.
2. The level to be established under an acreage reduction program. This acreage reduction cannot exceed 20 percent of a farm's wheat acreage base and will be combined with an additional 10 percent paid cash land diversion program.
3. Whether there should be an optional land diversion program with either payment-in-kind compensation or cash payments.
4. Whether to allow haying and grazing on acreage conservation reserve land.
5. Whether there should be offsetting compliance requirements for an acreage reduction program.
6. Methods for determining 1985 crop acreage bases for wheat.
7. Whether contracts producers will sign to participate in the program should be binding after the sign-up period.

USDA is also seeking comments on provisions for a farmer owned reserve, commodity eligibility, premiums and discounts, the establishment of county loan rates and other provisions necessary to carry out a loan and purchase program for wheat. Comments, which must be received by June 11, may be sent to: Director, Analysis Division, USDA-ASCS, Room 3741-S, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013.

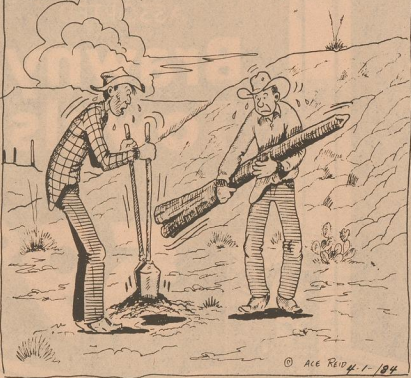
