History Comes Alive At Ranch Day

The foothills of the Caprock at the old Matador Ranch line camp, Cottonwood Mott, will be crawling with Texas History students and buffs on October 27 when the Daughters of the Republic, General James Smith Chapter of Lubbock, present "History Day at the Ranch," a sesquicentennial project for the

group.
Beginning at Mott Camp, groups will tour a portion of the ranch hearing lectures on the history of the Matador Land and Cattle Company by local historian Judge Billy Whitaker, Johnny Stevens, the last manager of the ranch, and Bundy Campbell, grandson of

the founder of the ranch. Some of the colorful history recounted will be the shoot-out of Harkey and Barbee which took place on the site in 1880.

Wayne Parker of Ralls, featured guest speaker who is distantly related to Quannah Parker, will describe the life of the Comanches from a campsite

as he illustrates his talk with an extensive artifact collection. Wayne and his assistant, Judge Choise Smith of Floydada, are well known for their contributions of Blanco Canyon history and artifacts to the Crosby County and Ralls Museums.

Ruins of a dugout, probably built around 1900, will be the setting for a talk by Mrs. Edna Leonard Waybourn of Childress on pioneer life. Mrs. Waybourn was born at Mott Camp in 1906, and often visited the dugout as a child to pick fruit or picnic with the family. Her father, J.F. Leonard, purchased the site from James Fields in 1903, but was pressured into selling this and his other holdings, some he had filed on in 1898, to the Matadors when homesteading became too

Counties Receive Checks

State Treasurer Ann Richards has sent checks totalling 17.3 million to Texas' 254 counties for road construction and maintenance.


The Treasurer each year disburses money appropriated by the Legislature for the Lateral Road Program. The grants may be used by counties for the purchase of right-of-way and for construction and maintenance of lateral roads, farm-to-market roads or state highways.

The money is allocated to each county under a formula based on the county's area, rural population and lateral road mileage, Richards said.

Some of the area counties and amounts they received are: Briscoe, \$13,729.90; Cochran,

\$16,665.90; Crosby, \$24,751.61; Dickens, \$15,987.07; Floyd, \$30,252.25; Hale \$43,106.99; and Motley \$12,123.77.

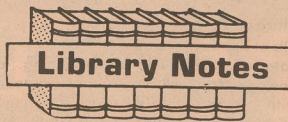

Dear Editor,

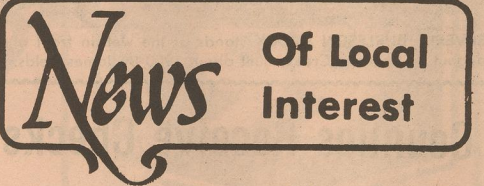
I have been watching the community of Matador closely since our tragedy on May 1st. I have seen the people who have spent their time trying to replace what has been lost.

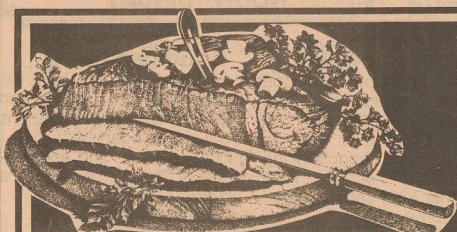

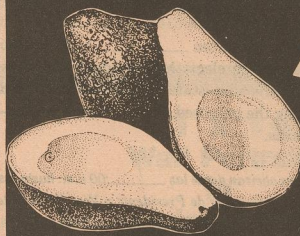
