## Fire Dept. Explains Siren

The Matador Volunteer Fire Department responded to a reported grass fire 16 miles east of Matador on Friday June 1 at 11:55 p.m. Rainfall in that area apparently extinguished the blaze before firemen arrived. The sounding of the fire alarm caused some confusion because of heavy cloudiness and light rain.

"We use three different alarms for fires, practice and severe weather," said chief Rodney Williams. "We would like for everyone to be familiar with these siren sounds to avoid any possible confusion in the future."

A steady blast of the siren is an alert to fireman that there has been a fire reported in Matador or elsewhere in the county. This steady siren will last from 30 seconds to three minutes. Three short blasts of the siren will only be heard on Monday night. This is to call the firemen to the fire

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station for practice and also a test of the siren to assure that it is in working order.

"Severe weather warnings will come to the public in two ways," says chief Williams. Information about the weather will first be broadcast over Matador Cablevision through your television set. Please listen to this broadcast as you will be instructed to watch for severe weather or take shelter. Second, the siren will only be sounded when the Fire Department feels persons should take shelter from threatening weather. This siren is an up and down of "looping" sound lasting two to ten minutes. This is the only siren used to alert citizens of Matador to take shelter from severe weather.

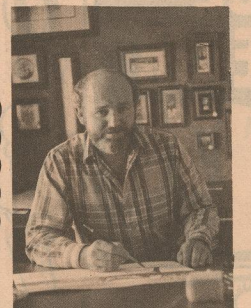

## Long-Distance Assistance Change Made By AT&T

Changes approved by the Federal Communications Commission on May 25, 1984 will affect General Telephone customers using interstate long-distance directory assistance, customers using AT&T to make long-distance calls, and businesses with more than one line.

An interstate directory assistance charge of 50 cents per call with a two-call allowance for each billing period was approved for AT&T, the nation's only provider of interstate directory assistance service. To obtain the two-call directory

assistance allowance, the customer must make at least two interstate calls during each billing period. If the customer makes one or no interstate calls, the allowance would be one or zero respectively.

The FCC also ordered AT&T to reduce its interstate long-distance rates by approximately 6.1 percent.

At the same time, the FCC approved interstate end user access charges of \$6 per line for businesses with more than one line.

All of the changes became effective May 25.

## Dr. Pina Sturdivant To Study In Egypt

Twelve professors from colleges in the Southeast will spend three weeks in Egypt June 9-30 in a special program sponsored by Duke University's Islamic and Arabian Development Studies Program. Among them will be Dr. Pina Sturdivant, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.P. Sturdivant of Matador. She is a 1956 graduate of Matador High School. She is Assistant Professor of Communication Arts at Johnson C. Smith University in North Carolina.

The participants are affiliated with the program as Outreach College Coordinators. Most are graduates of the Summer Program in Arabian Studies for College Teachers given at Duke in 1981 and a Refresher Symposium given at Duke in 1983.

The participants come from the faculties of colleges in five southern states, Georgia, Tennessee, South Carolina, North Carolina, and Virginia.

The Egyptian program is a natural sequel to the earlier summer program. The study course in Egypt is financed by the National Council on U.S. - Arab

Relations. It will embrace an intensive course of study at the American University in Cairo, including lectures on Islamic and Arab affairs as well as Egyptian history.

The course, concentrating on political and economic problems of Arab development, will be taught by members of the faculty of the American University in Cairo.

It will include field trips to historic sites and museums and will allow time for individual research. The study-four in Cairo will be supplemented by a second Refresher Symposium for the group to be held at Duke in 1985.

Official figures just released by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service show 1983 cotton production from the 25 High Plains counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, at 1,346,450 bales of 480 pounds net weight.

That is slightly above the 1,285,600 bales grown in 1982, but far below the 2.3 million bale five-year production and just over a third of the record 3,522,000 bales harvested in 1981.

The payment-in-kind acreage reduction program reduced planted acres for the year to 2,486,800, the lowest since 1970 when the 25 counties seeded only 2,277,000 acres. Subsequent abandonment in 1983, the result of both drought and hail come to 371,300 acres or almost 15 percent of planted acres.

Average yield on the remaining 2,115,500 acres comes to 305.5 pounds per harvested acre, considerably better than the 259 pounds per acre average recorded in 1982. The ten-year average yield on the Plains through 1983 is 314.3 pounds per harvested acre, down almost 120 pounds from the ten-year average through 1973 and the lowest 10-year average since 1958. The all-time record for the 25 counties, 513 pounds, went on the books in 1965.

Gaines County, with 164,800 bales, led the area in total production for the third consecutive year. The High Plains yield per acre title in 1983 goes to Castro County where farmers averaged 413 pounds.

The chart below shows 1983 planted and harvested acres, yield per harvested acre and total production in 480 pound net weight bales for each of the 25 PCG counties.

## Reports



AUSTIN — We have recently heard Ross Perot speak on two separate occasions expressing his views as to the problems in education in our state. I saw many people from around the Texas Panhandle at both the breakfast and luncheon which Mr. Perot addressed. I also had the opportunity to visit with Mr. Perot for some of the recommendations of the Select Committee on Education. I found Mr. Perot to be a very persuasive speaker, but, unfortunately, many of the things he brought out regarding our education system just are not representative of our schools in the Texas Panhandle.

Within the 29 counties I represent, there are 89 school districts, representing all types, from rich schools to poor schools and large schools to small schools. We believe our schools and teachers do a much better job of teaching our young people than many of the other schools throughout the state of Texas. I think some of Mr. Perot's comments are unjust and are not typical of the schools we have.

Mr. Perot commented that Texas has perhaps the worst school system in the entire world. I do not believe one can compare our school system to other countries when those countries provide an education for only 10% of the children. In Texas we have that freedom for all our young people. Mr. Perot stated that the typical school has 40 clubs and all they do is sell cookies and make trips to Belgium and Hawaii. I do not know of any school in my senatorial district that ever took a trip overseas or has even half the clubs that Mr. Perot estimates.

Mr. Perot strongly criticized vocational education and made it appear that the only vocational courses we have today are bicycle repair and pottery. He also criticized vocational agriculture to a great degree. I believe this is a program which has a very important role in our public school system. From the ninth through twelfth grade level, 44% of all the children in our public school system are enrolled in some form of vocational training. Currently, in the ninth through twelfth grade we have a 30% drop-out rate. It is my fear if the state funding for vocational education is eliminated, we will probably see a 50% drop-out in our

public school system. I believe this is taking a step in the wrong direction.

We must realize that not all young people will be college graduates. Two-thirds of the jobs available today require technical skills and we will fight to maintain state funding for vocational education.

I strongly support Mr. Perot's recommendations that we must go back to the basics in education and increase emphasis on the grade school levels. We believe it is at this point where young people should learn how to read, write and master basic mathematics. We cannot wait until they are in high school to teach them these skills.

Regarding the funding of these programs, Governor Mark White has presented his tax proposal and if the entire package is approved it will be the largest tax increase in the history of this state. I realize we taxpayers are under tremendous financial stress at this time and would certainly appreciate your comments and views regarding the tax increases.

Of great concern to me is being asked as your State Senator to go to Austin and vote for all of these tax bills, and then to tell the people by doing this we will improve the quality of education in this state. At the same time, they are eliminating many of the valuable programs and are telling the school districts if they want to keep those programs they will have to pay for them on the local level. This means I will have to come back to the Texas Panhandle and tell our schools they, too, will be in the position of having to raise property taxes as well. I find that difficult to accept.

We commend Ross Perot and the Select Committee on Education for the job they have done and the leadership they have shown. However, we feel some of the recommendations of the Select Committee will be very damaging to our rural schools and will force property taxes to rise.

Education is something that means a great deal to me since I am the only member of the Texas Senate who has taught in the public school system. We are concerned about having quality education in our 89 school districts.

Thank you for your time. We would appreciate any advice or suggestions you could give us.

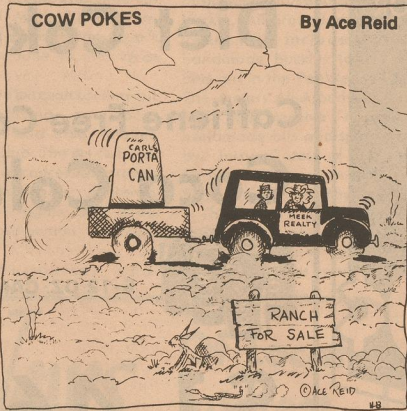

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
