# Cleanup In Progress Following Tornado

The clean up of debris and demolished buildings following the May 1 tornado that struck the south part of Matador has been in full swing since last Wednesday, and city, county, and school officials have been in contact with state and federal officials to inquire about receiving aide for the victims.

Officials visiting the city last week included State Senator Ray Farabee, State Representative Foster Whaley and U.S. Representative Jack Hightower, among other agencies.

Mayor Gary Lancaster said Monday that Governor Mark White has been asked to

contact President Reagan and request that a national disaster area be declared here. Lancaster said, "If Matador is not declared a national disaster area, our chances of receiving federal and state aide may be slim, officials cite the small number of persons whose homes were completely destroyed by the twister as one of the reasons not to declare the disaster area, but if they could use a percentage figure based on the population, the chances would be better."

Residents are urged to write State and U.S. Representatives and Governor Mark White to

encourage them to see what aide is available. Those include U.S. Senator John Tower, U.S. Senator Lloyd Benson, U.S. Representative Jack Hightower, State Senator Ray Farabee and State Representative Foster Whaley.

Also in Matador to offer aide following the storm were the Red Cross, the Salvation Army and numerous donations of food, clothes and other items from area towns, as well as clean up crews, fire department member, and medical crews who arrived within a short time after the twister to offer their services.

### BIRTHDAY PARTY SET

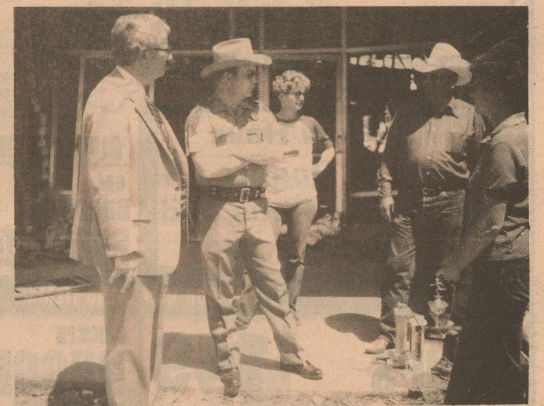

### TORNADO

While the golfers were enjoying late afternoon playing, Matador was assailed by battering winds preceding a vicious tornado which struck just as some of the golfers reached home and prevented them from seeking shelter.

One foursome, unaware of the storm included Howard Edmondson, Marvin Patton, Greer Willis and Mike Hoyle, riding in the Hoyle car from Springs Ranch to Roaring Springs, where Mike left the group to join his wife, Virginia for other activities with relatives in R.S. The remaining three, driving Mike's car, reached Matador just as violent winds blew in (or out) the windows of the vehicle. The men, crouched on the floor of the car, escaped injury although Howard later discovered that his boots were full of glass.

Syd and Gerald Pipkin arrived home just in time to join her mother, Mrs. Malcolm Garrett of Lubbock and the Pipkin's young daughters, Amy and Leigh Ann in crowding into a closet at their home. When they emerged later, it was to discover the entire front of their home had blown away, in addition to other damage.

Laverna and Frank Price arrived home just as the tornado struck and barely made it to the basement in their home and without time to get to the home of her mother, Mrs. Clovis (Addie) Murphy to check on her. They, with Truitt Read were the first to reach Mrs. Murphy after the storm, and convey her to Central Plains Hospital in Plainview, where she was treated for multiple cuts and bruises and broken pelvic bone. Her home was demolished and she survived by crouching beneath her dining table.

These are but a few of the experiences related in the aftermath of Matador's most devastating disaster. Many will be the stories that will be recalled as time goes by.

and serve hot meals to the victims, volunteers, clean up and repair crews, officials and our staff. Approximately 740 people were served meals in the five days following the tornado.

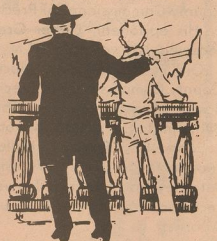

## Campbells Attend EMT Workshop

Joyce and Kirby Campbell attended a Workshop on Farm Rescue Management and Extrication on May 4-5. The workshop was sponsored by South Plains Emergency Medical Services and was held in cooperation with the Wolfarth EMS and Fry Equipment Co.

The workshop provided specific information on rescue procedures to be used in the farm environment. Part of the workshop was to teach rescuers how to keep from becoming victims themselves, because unless EMT's are farmers themselves, they may be unaware of special hazards to which they could be exposed when called to the scene. The workshop covered pre-planning for agricultural accidents, equipment construction and operation, hazard recognition and control and extrication and removal of the victim from the scene.

The Campbells reported that they received training in extrication from tractors, cotton strippers, combines and chemical hazards.

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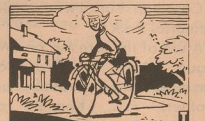

For the third consecutive year, silver available in the U.S. has been surplus to domestic industrial needs, totaling some 150 million ounces over the three years.


For silver to remain \$3.50 above the average for 1982, experts report that more than 100 million ounces had to be stashed away by speculators and investors.

Industrial demand for silver is down. During the fourth quarter, 1983, consumption of



silver at 27.7 million ounces was down 6.4 percent from the third quarter, according to the Bureau of Mines.

It's also reported that to meet the extraordinary investor demand, net imports of silver reached a record level of 148 ounces, or some 23 million ounces above the previous high of 125 million ounces in 1974.
