

The Legend Of Chimney Creek Dugout

(Editor's Note: This research article is written as a sesquicentennial project for the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, General James Smith Chapter.)

On a small winding stream then known on maps as Jones Creek, a nester selected a cove protected from the north by a large bluff of sandstone, and began to build his dugout. Using an unusual amount of skill, he laid three walls and a fireplace wall, using a chisel to cut the rocks as needed. The large sandstone rocks of the fireplace formed a rather intricate archway, the masonic key, and was built to last, withstanding gravity and the elements for eighty or more years.

Located conveniently a few feet in front of the dugout, a shallow well was dug in the sandy soil and lined with jagged sandstone rocks. Nearer the top of the bluff, crude limestone rocks made a small enclosure for a smoke house, or a storage area in which to cache supplies. To the north, barbed wire was wrapped around a limestone boulder to fence off the little homestead, protecting it and the garden area from curious cattle, both his and the Matador's, that came to water and graze at the nearby creek.

The settler planted crab-apple, pear and pecan trees to the west and in front of his home, in the sub-irrigated sandy soil above the spring-fed stream.

The first names the records can give this settler's family, or the ones who followed the first, are James and Maggie Fields. And therein lies the legend of Chimney Creek.

As it was told to Edna Leonard Waybourn by her father, J. Frank Leonard, the Fields family was having a difficult time, living a hand to mouth existence in keeping themselves and their two young daughters fed. One day, Fields was reduced to chasing rabbits for food. The rabbit he was pursuing headed for a hole. Thinking he had the animal cornered, Fields quickly stuck his hand in the hole. Before he knew what had happened, a rattlesnake bit him on the hand.

Some say the bite was fatal, and the young widow sold quickly and moved on. Others say the bite was enough warning to Fields, and he decided to clear out of an inhospitable land. Either way, it was Frank Leonard, having filed on 160 acres near the Fields claim in 1898, who bought from James and Maggie Fields, Patent No. 346 granted by the State of Texas. Leonard paid \$250 for the 78 acres on January 19, 1903, but on July 29, 1904, sold this claim and his other holdings to the Matador Land and Cattle Company for \$1,967.55.

Leonard, coming from the 2 Buckle Ranch in Crosby County which had fallen on hard times, had been dayworking for the Matadors at \$1 a day. When he began to work full time for the ranch, his family lived at Mott Camp in the log cabin.

The Leonard family never lived at the dugout, according to Edna, although Frank would sometimes go down and spend a night there. Perhaps he was "proving up," as many other hands did for the Matador ranch. Since foreign owned companies were forbidden to buy school lands, employees were set up as nesters, and financed by ranch funds. When the title was proven, then the ranch bought the land from him.

Edna recall Frank built a shack in front of the dugout, and often brought the family on outings to

pick fruit or nuts from the orchard or have a picnic by the creek. The children played in front of the sandstone bluffs, daring each other to run under the rugged boulders that sometimes crashed to the ground.

One of the daughters, Ruth, scratched JFL above the fireplace hearth, and carved the figure of a saddled horse with the JFL brand on it, above a spring upstream on the Mott, just south of the confluence of Mott and Chimney Creeks.

Edith, a daughter who was six years older than Edna, recalled that the Matadors would not allow Leonard to fence his holdings which would cut their cattle off from water at the creek and used harassment, threats and violence (others say, even to the point of bringing in hired guns from Colorado) to pressure the nesters into selling out.

The dugout roof was made of sod held up by cedar tree poles. Edith remembered when it leaked, they would throw another shovel of dirt on. In the absence of lumber, a cowhide would have sufficed for a door, the only source of light except for the fireplace, tallow candles or kerosene lanterns.

In the bend of a lonely little creek, where sounds echo off the Colorado sandstone bluffs, a

chimney, valiantly defying time and the elements, marks the grave of more than one man's dreams. Although the site is officially known as the Fields-Leonard dugout, the name Chimney Creek says it all.

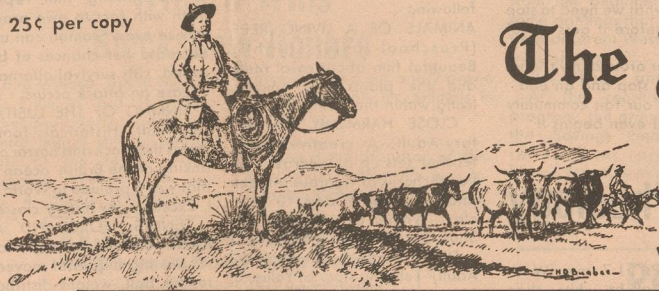

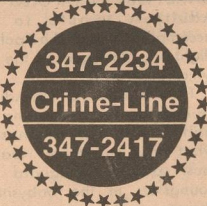

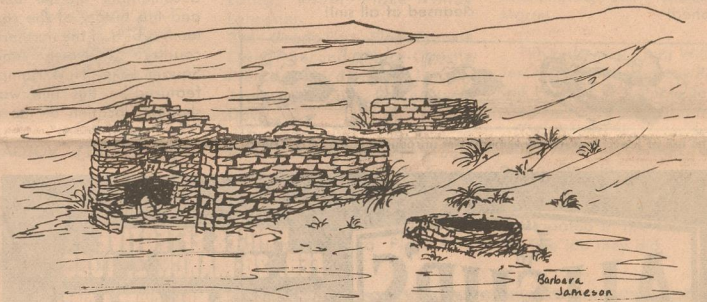
FLOMOT VOLLEYBALL TOURNAMENT

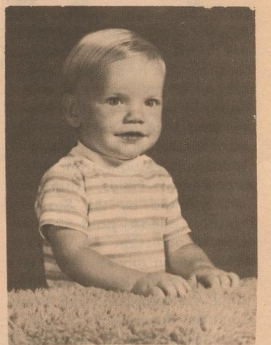



THERE'S STILL TIME TO SOIL TEST

It's not too late to collect soil samples for testing to determine fertilizer needs for this year's crops.

Collecting soil samples now and getting them tested can help you get a jump on the spring rush at soil testing labs.

Once fertilizer needs are determined, you can place your orders. Again, by ordering early, you can avoid the spring rush. Also, fertilizers usually cost more in the spring when demand is greater and supplies tighter.

With fertilizer at hand, farmers can begin application when field conditions permit. This minimizes spring planting delays of tight dealer schedules and reduces the potential for moisture loss just prior to planting.

For more information concerning soil testing, contact the county Extension Office.

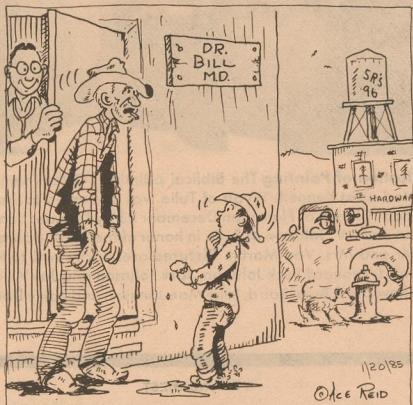

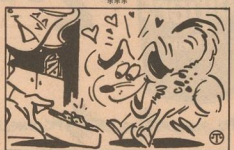

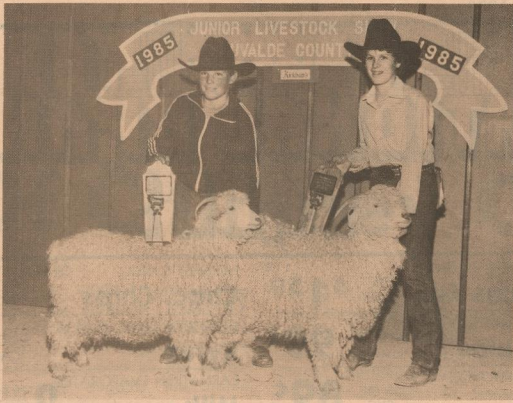
