Power Firm Granted "Cut" In Rates Here

MOST ITEMS IN THE COST OF LIVING are going up, but the price of electricity in Matador is going down. The decrease is small. West Texas Utilities Company's District Manager T. A. Shahan of Childress and Local Manager Freddie Welling met with the city council Tuesday night and received permission for the power firm to adjust its rates (according to its franchise, the power company must receive the council's permission to raise or lower rates, or make any adjustment).

The schedule of revised rates was approved. Similar schedules have been approved in Abilene and San Angelo, and are being followed through the 49-county area served by WTU.

"The revised schedule," Shahan said, "is designed to provide a new low rate for electric heating during winter months. 1. liberalization of the winter heater rate. 2. reduction

First Bale Is Ginned

FIRST REPORT of a bale of 1959 cotton being ginned in Motley County was received by the Tribune about 6 p. m. Monday. The cotton was grown by J. W. Pritchett of the Barton community, on irrigated land.

It was ginned here by the West Texas Gin. Ernest Elliott, manager of the gin said Mr. Pritchett brought 2200 pounds of seed cotton (snaps) and received a 600-pound bale and 1,080 pounds of seed.

Mr. Elliott said the bale would probably be placed in the load. He said he would grade the bale as 1-inch strict middling.

A premium made up among Matador business and professional firms amounts to about \$165.50.

The first bale is approximately one week later than the first bale reported in 1958.

The wells were quit at shallow depths.

The Birnie Ranch well was reported yesterday to be in the neighborhood of 8,700 feet and coring.

Observers believe that the prospects continue excellent in the Roaring Spring field.

Leasing of land north of Matador is continuing at good prices, although much of the land is already under lease, according to reports.

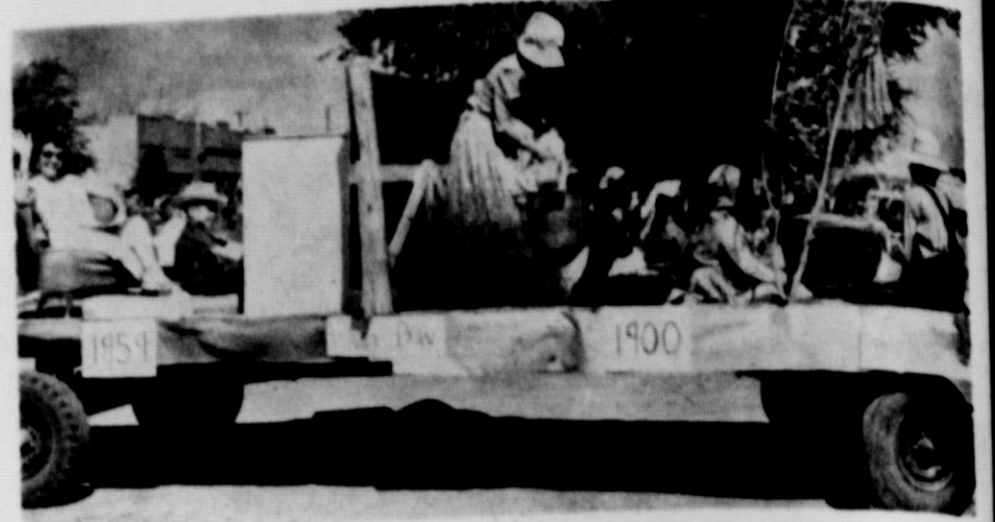

works both upward and downward, becomes effective in the rate not now carrying fuel clause when the company's average cost of fuel is less than 8c or above 14½¢ per million BTU—the normal value of 1,000 cubic feet of gas.

Last year the company's average cost of fuel was 16.6¢ per 1,000 cubic feet of gas. Before the new fuel adjustment would become operative at 14½¢, the company would absorb another 6.2% increase in the cost of fuel.

"It is not probable the fuel adjustment would be applicable to commercial and residential customers before 1962," Shahan said, "and that if and when it becomes operative, the bill will be negligible. A 10% increase in the cost of fuel to the company would add only 2¢ per month to the average residential customer."

Last year the average Matador customer used 258 KW hours per month, and the average bill, including water heating, was \$7.23.
