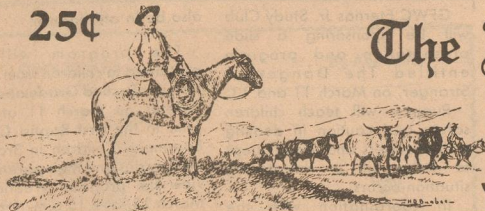

MC School Bond Money Okayed By Attorney General

Motley County School Superintendent Charlie Johnson was notified Tuesday that the \$550,000 in school bond money for the rebuilding of the school has been cleared by the office of Texas Attorney General Jim Maddox and the school district should receive the money by Tuesday of next week.

Johnson was contacted by the school board's financial consultants, Kidder, Peabody and Co. on Tuesday of this week and told the money had been cleared and was on its way.

The school board will now advertise for bids for construction of the school building. "We haven't quite got the plans for the school finalized," Johnson said. "About the middle of April we should be

able to open bids and construction should start sometime after that."

On January 23rd, the Motley County school board of trustees met to open bidding for the \$550,000 in school building bonds. Underwood, Neuhaust and Co., Inc. won the bid with 8.237817 per cent effective interest rate. However, all public bonds must be cleared by the Attorney General, thus the school did not receive clearance on the \$550,000 until this week.

The Motley County school was destroyed by a tornado on May 1, 1984 and school students have been attending classes at various locations in Matador this school year. With luck the students should be going to a new school next year.

New Funeral Directors Announced For Matador

Dee Mynatt of Seigler-Mynatt Funeral Home announced that since March 1, 1985, Mr. Paul Gray is associated with the firm, living in Matador. Mynatt said, "It has always been our intention to have someone at the Matador funeral home, but we have been searching for the right person. We believe we have that person in Paul Gray."

For 30 years (1953-1983), Gray was associated with National Casket Company. During that time the company changed its name to Simmons Casket Company. Among the positions held by Gray with National was that of District Manager. In 1983, Gray joined the staff of Resthaven in Lubbock and was with that firm until recently.

Gray, the son of a Nazarene minister, served in the U.S. Army during World War II and was educated at the Northwest Nazarene College in Nampa, Idaho. He is married and he and his wife, Rose, will be living at the

funeral home in Matador.

Gray said of his new assignment, "Rose and I are looking forward to living and working with the people of Matley and Cottle counties. We intend to make this our last stop and plan to become active and involved in community and area events."

Senior Citizens' Dream Finally Comes True

A "dream come true" was realized by the local Senior Citizens organization with the recent ground-breaking for a Motley County Senior Citizens Center which is currently under construction north of the courthouse on the southeast corner of Stewart Street.

The structure is financed through a grant of \$110,000.00 from the Texas Department of Community Affairs, and involves no increase in city or county taxes, it was emphasized by Mrs. L.B. Campbell, who, with Mrs. Roy G. Hobbs served on a Community Improvement and Development committee in working to obtain the grant.

The background and proceedings to get the grant for Motley County were explained by Mrs. Campbell, Thursday at a meeting of GFWC El Progreso Club and Mrs. Hobbs outlined future tentative plans which include a ribbon-cutting ceremony and open house upon completion of the building. Blueprints of both interior and exterior were displayed.

"We could not have succeeded in obtaining this grant without the help of many people," both women declared. "We hope that the citizens of Motley County will use the facility for community gatherings."

Maintenance will be under the supervision of the local Senior Citizens, and donations will be accepted for the use of the building, according to Mrs. Hobbs. The local organization plans to hold bake sales and use other resources for this purpose. Facilities of the 2400 sq. ft. building include a fully equipped kitchen, large meeting area, storage closets and rest rooms. There also will be a portico at the entrance.

"This has been a dream which has become a reality for our senior citizens, and they are making many plans for the future use of the building, which we hope others will share," Mrs. Hobbs said in her talk, which followed Mrs. Campbell's remarks.

Much time and effort and trips to Austin and Lubbock were involved in contacting various agencies in the attempt to secure the grant, Mrs. Campbell said.

"Action began in 1982 when the Matador City Council appointed a five-member Community Improvement and Development Committee. South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) provided us with assistance in setting up a plan of action which included surveys and town meetings. We became aware that community blockdevelopment grants were available and contacted the engineering and consulting firm of Barber, Brannon and Traylor of Tyler and Lubbock. Their representative, Kay Howard was a great help to us in making the application for a water drainage and paving grant which we received. She also assisted us in our application for the Senior Citizens Center for Motley County," Mrs. Campbell said.

Before the grant could be obtained, she explained, a charter for the local Senior Citizens organization had to be provided. The charter, dated Oct. 10, 1978 was located, and working with Mrs. Campbell and Mrs. Hobbs were Mrs. D.C. Baker, president, and Mrs. Dowell Garrison, secretary, of the Senior Citizens, and Sonny Russell, a member of Caprock Development of SPAG who went with them to meet with the Regional Review Committee in Lubbock. "Our proposal was for

\$220,000 to build and equip the center," Mrs. Campbell explained. "Frances (Mrs. Hobbs) and I attended many area-wide meetings of the Texas Department of Community Affairs with full endorsement of the city and county to represent them. The city appointed Frances and the county appointed me."

The State Review Committee first ranked Motley County 15th, although the Regional Review Committee had given this county 2nd place in priority, Mrs. Campbell said. "After discussions by the RRC, we were ranked 6th with full funding. However, in the final analysis, we were placed 7th, with Crosby County being 6th (and fully funded). Crosby County Judge

Robert Work contended that we could build for considerably less (than applied for) and out of \$878,907.00 we received funding of \$79,709. Sonny (Russell) called Representatives Whaley and Farabee to intervene in our behalf, and metal buildings were considered.

"On June 13, 1983 we were notified by the Texas Department of Community Affairs that Motley County had been granted \$110,000 for the Senior Citizens Center. Now, that we could see the reality of the center, application was submitted to SPAG Council on Aging." However to participate in this funding, Senior Citizens had to have a permanent building to be eligible for

This meeting will be held Monday, March 18, 1985 at 7:00 P.M. at the Fire Station in Matador which is located east of the courthouse on Dundee Street. The meeting is open to anyone wishing to attend; and Rodney Williams, Chief, hopes to you will attend.

The agenda will include the following: Welcome and Introduction of Guests; Matador Tornado; Warnings Systems; Radio Communications; Weather Spotting; Cooperation with National Weather Service and neighboring counties and cities; Safety Precautions; and Disaster Plans.

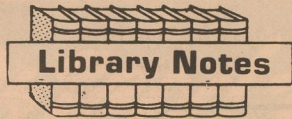
Motley County can be mighty proud of their volunteer fire department. I live on Main Street and I am constantly amazed at the response when the fire siren sounds. The men seem to come

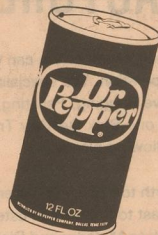

"Mrs. Baker has submitted a title IIIB again this year. Funds available in 1984 were \$717,752, but for 1985 only \$600,000 is allotted in this program," Mrs. Campbell explained.

In addition to the grant received by the county for the Senior Citizens Center, the city of Matador has received three grants--for paving, tornado relief and water lines in northwest Matador. Government funds in the amount of \$65 million in HUB (Housing and Urban Development) grants have been allotted for 1985.

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



PESTICIDES

The time of year most Restricted Use Pesticides are used is coming up very soon. The laws that regulate the sale and use of these pesticides is becoming more and more strictly enforced. I believe this year all businesses selling restricted use pesticides will be asking for the buyer's Certified Applicators Certificate number. They can not sell these pesticides without recording the buyer's number.

If you have been certified to use these pesticides but no longer have your number, there are forms available at the County Extension Agent's office, to replace your certificate. If you have never been certified and will be needing to purchase restricted use pesticides, you can pick up a booklet and

application test, also at the County Extension office.

The booklet and test are printed in very simple terms and do not require a lot of time to complete. You may also call and we will mail them to you, if you wish.

HEIFER SHOW

Those owning land in the county, or youth eligible for the show, may show one or two heifers in the annual Heifer Show in conjunction with the Motley County Jr. Livestock Show, to be held March 25. 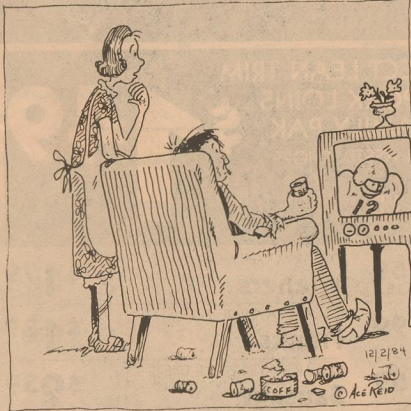

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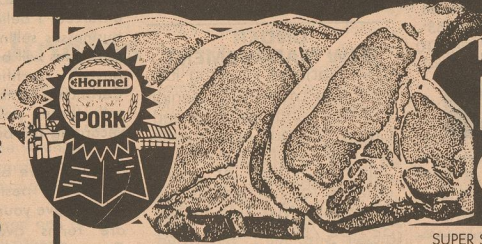
