### Christian Attitude Toward War Explored by Speaker at Banquet

Attitudes toward war, and specifically the Christian's attitude formed the nucleus of an address here Thursday night by Dr. Fred Howard, Bible professor at Wayland Baptist College, Plainview.

Dr. Howard was guest speaker at a "Gentlemen's Evening" banquet held by El Progreso Study Club members for their husbands and other guests, in the basement of First Methodist Church.

In his discourse on "Moral Issues of the Day," Dr. Howard centered his remarks on the issues involved in wars through the centuries and reviewed conflicts of the early Christian churches.

The subject was in keeping with the club's course of study for the year, Action or Apathy.

"War is evil," he declared, "but some things are worse than war. Today's concept is that war is the lesser of two evils."

As justification for the early historical and Biblical wars, Dr. Howard explained that they had to be waged by a "just" authority, for a just cause, with a just intention, and justly waged.

He pointed out that slavery is worse than war, and declared, "...we ought to know more about communism, with relation to our present situation."

Mrs. L. B. Campbell, president, welcomed the members and guests and introduced Rev. Gene Joplin, pastor of the First Baptist Church, who in turn, presented Dr. Howard.

A special feature of the program was music by Miss Nancy Traweck, with self accompaniment on her guitar.

Organ music in the church sanctuary was by Mrs. Frank Pohl, as the attendants assembled. Invocation was by Furman Vinson, and Rev. John Fitzgerald, Methodist pastor, gave the benediction.

Attractive table decorations featured a musical motif, and replicas of lamp posts. Mrs. Campbell expressed appreciation to the decorations and menu committees.

### Notaries Public Filing Date Set

Qualified Notaries Public desiring appointment for the new term beginning June 1, 1971 and ending June 1, 1973, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1 and May 15, according to an announcement by Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr.

He said any person not now a Notary Public, who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term, should apply to the County Clerk before May 14, where the required application forms may be obtained.

Dies emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State.

## Ten Will Travel To Regional Meet

Coach Stan Irvine will accompany 10 boys, who are eligible to run in the preliminaries in the regional meet, April 23, to Lubbock. If they place in the top nine of any event they will compete in the finals April 24.

Coach Irvine feels that the team has good chances to place in at least six of the nine events entered. The boys participated in four major track meets, Jayton, Hale Center, Sundown and Jayton district meet, and brought home eight trophies which they gave to the school, and a number of individual medals which the boys keep.

The 440 yard relay team, or the sprint relay team has run against 35 class B schools and 15 class A schools and have remained undefeated. The 440 team broke the record time set in the Jayton meet, with a 45.2 time which was .8 seconds faster than the meet record. The mile relay team has run against 35 teams and lost only to 2.

The team has been working hard these last few weeks to prepare themselves for the regional meet. The meet will be held on the track field on the Texas Tech

campus and the public is invited to attend.

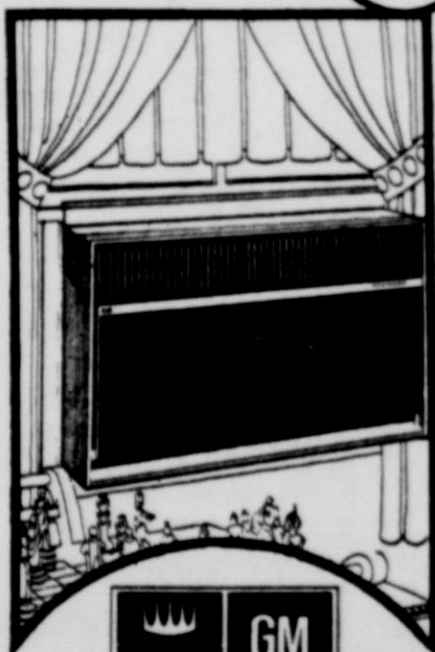
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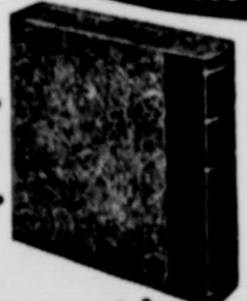
