## Cancer Checkup Urged By Lions Club Speaker

Early detection of cancer is possible by means of examination and check-ups at regular intervals, Matador Lions Club members were told at their scheduled meeting January 15, at the First United Methodist Church. Mrs. Marie Linson, R.N. with the Rolling Plains Health Care Services presented a program on the subject together with a film which explained procedures used in the diagnosis

and treatment of cancer.

The film and literature distributed by Mrs. Linson dealt chiefly with colorectal cancer (cancer of the colon and rectum), described as "one of the most curable forms of the disease."

"Colorectal cancer is second only to lung cancer in terms of incidence," according to the information prepared by the American Cancer Society. "Currently, more than 126,000 new cases develop; and about 60,000 people die from the disease each year...with early diagnosis and prompt treatment, about three out of every four of these lives can be saved."

Over 93 percent of cases occur after the age of 50, and it occurs slightly more often among women than men, the film and literature revealed. Mrs. Linson who was introduced by Lion Larry Hoyle, program chairman, urged her listeners to follow these guidelines to detect early symptoms. "You may need to have tests done earlier and more frequently. After all, they are your best insurance for detecting colorectal cancer when it may be easily cured by prompt treatment."

The program followed an enjoyable meal prepared and served by Lion Walter Jones. Boss Lion Van Francis presided and led the club in applause to Lion Jones for the meal. Announcements were made that the date for the Father-Son annual banquet had been tentatively set for February 14 with Lion Forrest Campbell as chairman; and that the Lions Show, usually held in the spring, will be postponed until a stage is available.

Also announced were the winners of the Lions Christmas Lighting contest: In the residential category, Leslie Taylor home, 1st, Matador Ranch Headquarters, 2nd, and Lewis Bostick home, honorable mention. In business places, the Grade School building was judged 1st and Don's Conoco station, 2nd.

Lion Frank Pohl served as recorder and introduced the only visitor, Mrs. Linson, and announced that 24 members were in attendance.

## Spring Lawn Weed Control

It won't be too many weeks before some of the summer lawn weeds begin to germinate and grow. Some of the common ones are crabgrass, chickweed, sand bur, henbit, and timothy.

One of the easiest ways to take care of these weeds is to put down a preemergent herbicide that kills them before they come up. One of the problems with using preemergent herbicides is, of course, they must be applied before weed germinates. If they are applied too late and the weed has sprouted the chemical will not be effective and will not provide any control at all. In this part of Texas the "rule of thumb" date for the application of a preemergent herbicide is March 1. This means that if a preemergent herbicide is applied about March 1 most years it will prevent annual weeds, but once in a while spring

comes a little early and the weeds could well germinate and be up before March 1.

Perhaps one of the best ways to approach spring weed control is to consider a two pronged attack. The first step is to kill the weeds about March 1; all the weeds including the winter weeds and if it has been an early spring, those annual weeds that may have already germinated. One of the best chemicals to do this with is glyphosate. Some of the brand names are Roundup, Kleenup and Dooms Day, follow label direction.

The next step is to immediately apply one of the preemergent herbicides to its label directions. There are a number of preemergent herbicides sold under several brand names and they all last about the same length of time. Compare the price and buy one that costs less for the area to be covered.

**New Highway Director**  
William M. (Mel) Pope formally of Motley County, is now in charge of highway operations in the 17-county Lubbock area district of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Pope, 55, took over January 1st as District Engineer for District Five which is headquartered in Lubbock. Pope succeeds Ben Alley who retired December 31, 1984.

"One of the Departments main goals over the next several years will be the completion of I-27 including the section through

Lubbock," said Pope. "When that project is finished, it will allow motorists to drive from the south loop in Lubbock to Amarillo without having to make a stop.

The Lubbock section will help relieve traffic congestion, and that is important to commerce in the city," said Pope.

Meanwhile the highway department is not going to forget people in the rural areas. "We will continue our maintenance effort throughout the district," said Pope, "which is aimed at adding to the safety and comfort of highway motorist."

Pope has been Assistant District Engineer in Lubbock since December of 1982. He was District Maintenance Engineer for ten years. Prior to that, Pope held positions of Engineering Assistant and Resident Engineer in the Brownfield Residency.

Pope was born and raised in Motley County, Texas and graduated from high school in Flomot. In 1951, Pope received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering from Texas Tech University. After completing military service with the U.S. Army, Pope began work for the Texas Highway Department in 1955 as an engineering assistant in Brownfield.

Pope is a member of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers and served as President of the South Plains chapter in 1981-82. He also participates in activities of the Lions Club.

Pope and his wife, Betty, live in Lubbock. They have five sons.

**Library Notes**

We welcome the following new 1985 Friends of the Library members: Mr. and Mrs. Howard Edmondson, Doris Simpson, Sallye Day, and Wesley Day. We thank Winifred Lee for her volunteer services to the library last week, and we appreciate the periodicals given by Glenn Woodruff.

This is Annual Report time for local libraries all over the State of Texas. Your local library staff has been tallying statistics for this Report during the past few weeks in an effort to apply for continuing System membership in the West Texas Library System and in the Texas State Library System.

System membership brings many benefits to Motley County Library including administrative and collection development consulting services. The System also matches our local budget for book funds each year. It provides a film projector and filmstrip projector for our local library in addition to a revolving film circuit of 22 films a month. Our local library also may order advance-booking films through the WTLS.

As a member of the Texas State Library System, Motley County Library was eligible to apply for \$60,000 in Library Establishment Grants during the first 3 years of its existence. As we qualified for these grants, we were able to purchase books, a

computer, other equipment, furniture, shelving, and computer programs with the \$60,000.

The Library's Annual Report statistics show that Motley County was the source for \$4973 of the Library's expenditures in 1984. Other sources are as follows: State Grant Funds \$11,560; Donations \$2,066; Copier Income \$268; Book Fines and Projector Rentals \$212; Book Replacement Funds \$49; and Interlibrary Loan Postage \$47.

During 1984 the Library checked out 8383 books. The computer had 416 users during the year. In the audiovisual department 75 film showings were held with 5,439 viewers.

Of the 1890 reference questions received, local staff answered 1,811. Library programs were attended by 576 persons during 1985. Interlibrary loan requests filled during the year for Motley Co. Library patrons by other libraries throughout the nation numbered 172.

Seven hundred thirty-seven registered library users were recorded for 1984.

The Library's collection includes 7,302 cataloged books, 1,826 uncataloged paperback books, 13 microfilm reels, 12 cassette tapes, and 57 computer programs.

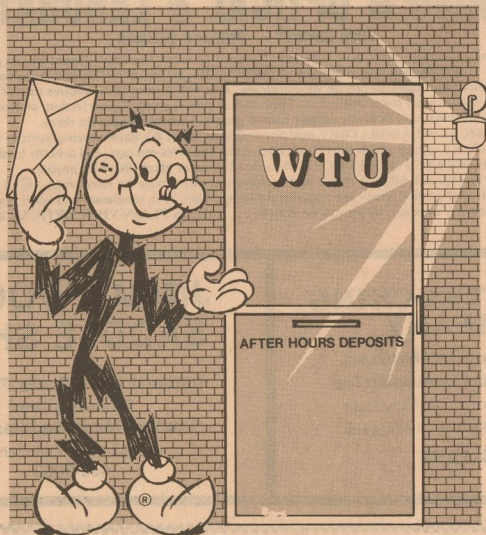

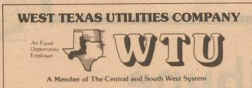

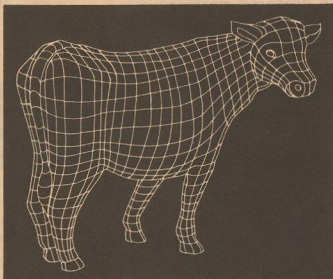

### Finding of No Significant Impact

The Reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement are as follows:

**WATER IMPROVEMENTS** - Health and safety hazards currently exist due to inadequate fire protection and inadequate domestic water. The proposed project should eliminate those health and safety hazards. Construction activities will produce certain amounts of air and noise pollution, however, the effects will be short term and low intensity.

An Environmental Assessment respecting the within project has been made by the above-named City of Matador which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Assessment is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying upon request in the office of the City Secretary between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

### Public Comments on Finding

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City of Matador, to the office of the undersigned. Such written comments should be received at City Hall on or before February 18, 1985. All such comments so received will be considered and the City of Matador, will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

### Release of Funds

The City of Matador will undertake the project described above with Community Development funds from the Texas Department of Community Affairs under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Matador is certifying to TDCA that the City of Matador and Gary Lancaster in his official capacity as Mayor consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental assessments, decision making and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval the City of Matador may use the Texas Community Development Program funds and TDCA will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

### Objections to State Release of Funds

Texas Department of Community Affairs will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following basis: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the certifying officer or other officer of applicant approved by TDCA; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections to the release of funds on basis other than those stated above will not be considered by TDCA. No objection received after March 8, 1985 will be considered by TDCA. The Chief Executive Officer of the City of Matador is Gary Lancaster, Mayor.

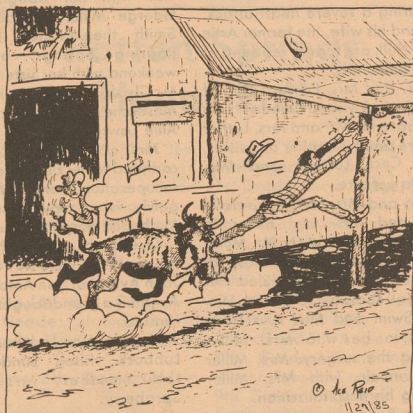
