

Motley Singers To Hold Meeting

A JUNE meeting of the Motley County Singing Convention is scheduled here Sunday, June 15, it was announced this week by President Bruce Martin.

The meeting will be held in the American Legion building, with singing starting at 10 o'clock. Traditional basket lunch will be served at noon, Martin said.

Prominent gospel singers over a wide area are scheduled to attend, as has been the custom over more than three score years since the singing group was first organized at Whiteflat. Motley County Singing Convention is the county's oldest organization.

For close to half a century the singers and patrons of singing met at the various community in the county, frequently under brush arbors in pioneer days.

After the American Legion building was acquired the singers were invited to make it their permanent home. Two meetings (June and October) are held annually.

Local residents are invited and urged to attend Sunday, bringing adequate lunch for the large number of visitors expected here.

Moss Well Down 4303

INTEREST was centered late yesterday on the E. E. Moss & Sons wildcat drilling test one mile west of Roaring Springs which had reached a depth of 4303 feet Wednesday morning. A report yesterday afternoon said drillers had reached a "break" in the hard substance which had slowed progress of the bit.

The well, known as the No. 1 Omar Parks, received a drillstem test over the weekend at a depth of 4025 feet when it was believed favorable formation had had been reached. Drilling was resumed as soon as the test was completed.

The depth of the well is approximately that at which production is expected.

10 Photographs Honor Former District Judges

ANOTHER DISTRICT JUDGE now looks down from the walls of the District Court room in Motley County's courthouse. The newest picture of former District Judges is that of Judge Alton B. Chapman of Amarillo, now Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, 7th Judicial District. It was Judge Chapman who secured the pictures of former District Judges and paid for the framing, when he was District Judge of the county after the new courthouse was completed.

Judge Chapman served the district as judge longer than any of his predecessors. He served for 20 years (1937-1957) until elected to his present office. Previously he was Dickens County Attorney from 1930 to 1935 and Dist. Attorney of the 110th Judicial District from 1935 to 1937.

Judge Chapman experienced difficulty in obtaining pictures of some of the pioneer District Judges, but he did not relax until the nine men who had previously held the office were honored. The District Court room is now a small "Hall of Fame" paying tribute to the judges who had served since the county was organized. Judge Chapman's picture is the 10th to hang from the walls.

Paducah Ex-Mayor Claimed by Death

Paducah has lost its leading citizen, E. N. Elzie Jones, former mayor and private banker died at 1:30 Tuesday in Richards Memorial Hospital. Double pneumonia was ascribed as the immediate cause of his death. He had been placed in an oxygen tent after entering the hospital Monday. He was 63.

Jones was a rugged individualist. He had been a member of the city council 16 years and had served as Paducah mayor for 4 years after being elected on a "write-in" ballot. He was not re-elected in the April election because he refused to allow his name on the ballot.

Perhaps no man in the southwest has helped the "little man" financially more than did Elzie Jones. He made loans of all kinds from a few dollars on to a sewing machine to \$100,000 to finance a business enterprise.

He made loans on the basis of character rather than collateral and is credited with backing many men who later became wealthy. He made loans to all races and creeds and many times paid taxes on property and skipped payments when clients met with disaster.

Elzie Jones loved life. His keen, analytical mind was quick to probe the depth of a business question or uncover the humorous aspect of a situation. He lived modestly and fully, shared (Continued on back page)

"I recall I had salt-ripened bread as hot rolls and remember how they seemed to enjoy the cooking. 'Pitchfork Kid' asked me for the recipe. He was then 'batching' on Croton. He was a real cowboy and a true friend to his clan."

Figures Show County Buying Power Strong

ACCORDING TO THE FIGURES published recently in the Lubbock Avalanche, Motley County makes an impressive showing in per capita buying power derived from farm income. Even when compared with the plush "pink Cadillac farmers" of the fabulous irrigated Plains area, Motley County per capita buying power outranks half a dozen counties in the 16-county territory. The figures are from the Sales Management magazine, which the Lubbock Avalanche quotes with permission, and which the Tribune quotes from the Avalanche without permission.

The survey shows the 16 counties to have a buying income approaching three-quarters of a billion dollars and retail sales near half a billion dollars.

Motley County does not make an impressive showing anywhere except in the per capita buying power (\$1,655 for every man, woman and child). The county is shown to have 3300 population, the smallest in the 16-county area. It is shown to have 1000 families and is tied for lowest place with Yoakum County.

The total family income was given as \$5,463 and the total gross farm income for the county was listed at \$4,398,000 (excluding only Gaines County).

Total retail sales in Motley County were listed at \$2,439,000. The people of Motley County spent \$708,000 for food, \$53,000 for eats and beverages, \$80,000 for general merchandise, \$60,000 for apparel, \$239,000 for furniture and household appliances, \$370,000 for automobiles, \$349,000 at the filling stations, \$427,000 for lumber, building material and hardware and \$100,000 for drugs.

Million Extra Income
The survey shows that Motley County has more than \$1,000,000 extra income other than farming, for a total of \$5,463,000. Effective buying income is explained as the amount of money people retain after payment of state and federal taxes.

Social Security Uses Couple Check Plan

Most married couples in the Lubbock area now receive their monthly social security payments in the form of one check for both people, according to John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock social security office. The change from individual checks to combined checks is part of a nationwide plan to improve service with a cash saving.

Under the new combined check plan banks and post offices have about 1,700,000 fewer checks to handle during the first of the month rush period and for that reason are able to give better service. In addition, the social security trust fund is saving about \$1 million a year in the cost of postage, check stock, envelopes, manpower, and other supplies and equipment.

Mr. Hutton pointed out that most couples in this area find the combined checks satisfactory and convenient; however, if there is any reason why such combined checks would result in an inconvenience, it is possible to receive them separately upon request.

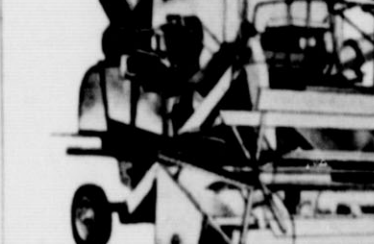

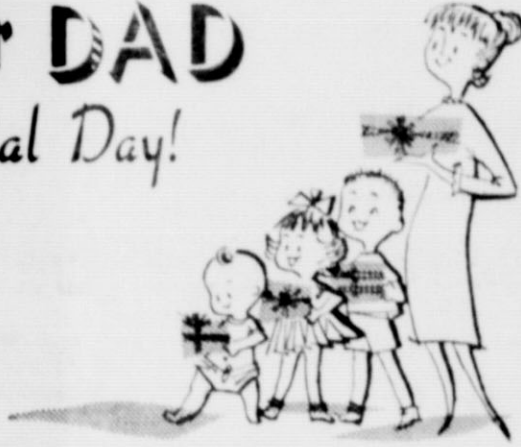

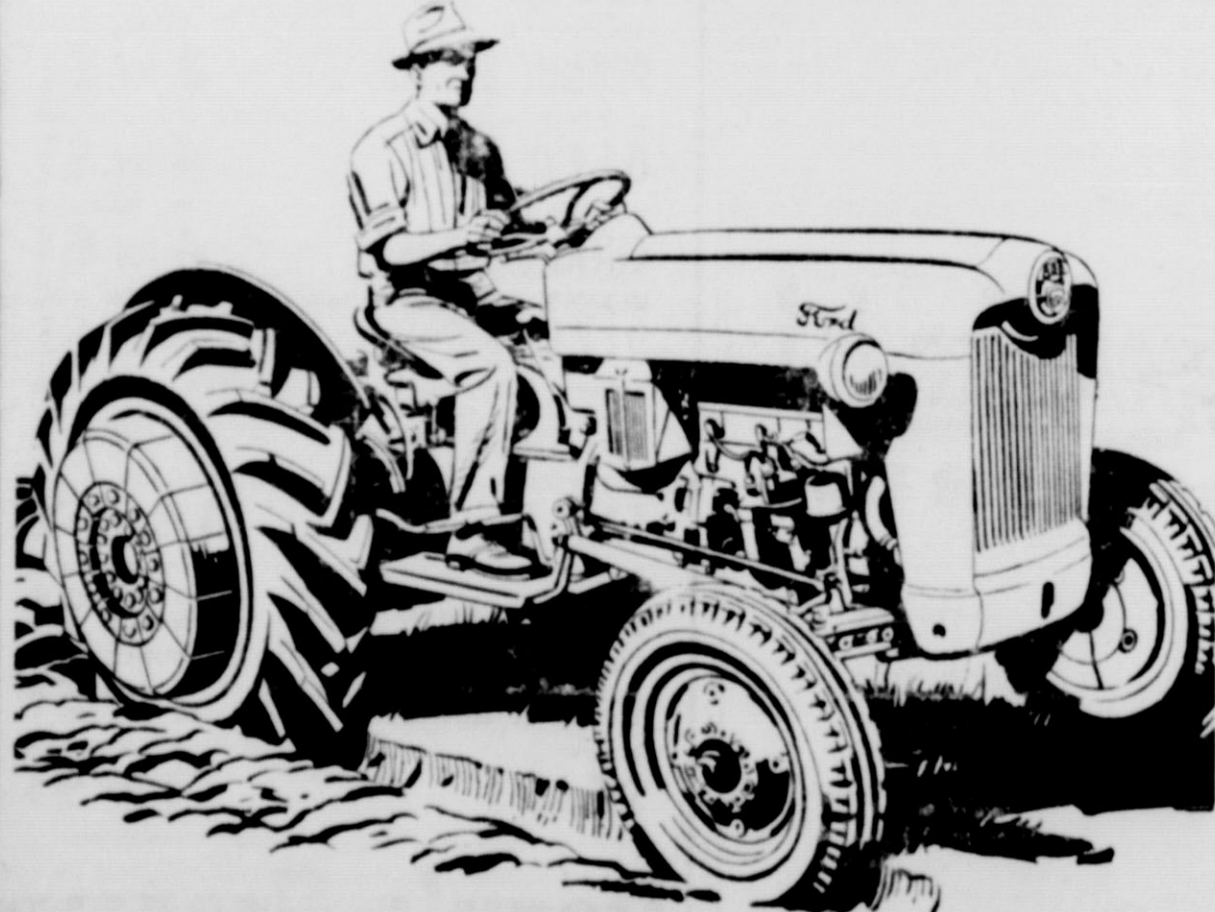
