Boyd Long of Roaring Springs is Winner Of Scholarship for Cotton Production

College Station, (Special) — For the second straight year a Motley county 4-H club member, Boyd Long of Roaring Springs, has been named a winner in the Statewide 4-H Cotton Production Program. Last year Kenneth Reed of Quitaque was a state winner. Boyd will receive a \$200 college scholarship.

Boyd is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Long and has completed nine years of 4-H demonstration work. He is a senior in the Roaring Springs High School and next fall plans to enter Texas A & M College.

The cotton production program is supervised by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the awards are provided by Anderson, Clayton Company of Houston, longtime donor of the scholarships, said Floyd Lynch, state 4-H leader, who made the announcement.

During the time Boyd has been a 4-H member, cotton has twice been a major demonstration. His 1957 crop consisted of 5 acres. Like most farmers, he faced the problem of too much

TWO BIG RANCHES MOVING CATTLE TO NORTH RANGES

CATTLE from two large Motley County ranches are on the move to northern ranges. Red Lake Cattle Corporation Tuesday shipped about 1,000 head to Sterling, Colorado. The Matador Ranch tomorrow will ship about 1700 head of yearlings from Russellville.

The Matador Ranch yearlings will go to Wendte, South Dakota, according to Seth Sager, manager. The shipment will require from 34 to 40 cattle cars.

John Stevens, manager of the Red Lake Cattle Corporation said Tuesday he was shipping the "tag end" of last year's calf crop to Colorado. He said he had previously shipped 500 head to Sterling.

Rust Showing In Some Wheat Here

FARMERS in Motley County will receive over \$700,000 during 1958 for their participation in the three soil bank programs, according to Tommie Moore, ASC office manager here. The total acreage is 43,184 and represents 36% of the county's total 117,218 acres in cropland.

The gross income (estimated) to county farmers from the three programs is \$709,676. The county's cotton reserve program has a total of 11,068 acres for which farmers will receive \$317,670. It represents 31% of the county's total eligible acres. (24,000 acres eligible and not in soil programs).

Wheat acreage reserve has a total of 4,387 acres, affects 57 farms and represents 37% of the total eligible wheat acres. Total payments for wheat will be about \$53,400.

The county has 27,728 acres in the conservation reserve. The contracts affect 210 farms and this year farmers are due to receive \$338,581 from this program. This is a long-range program and commonly called the soil bank. Most contracts run 5 years or 10 years.

Rust in Wheat

Mr. Moore said the county's promising small wheat crop (Only 5500 eligible acres) is beginning to develop rust in many fields.

The wheat looks exceptionally good. Although it may be affected by rust, it has, in most instances, been extremely valuable in the grazing of livestock.

Motley county now has 556 farm according to the ASC office records.

Phone Coop Funds Receive Approval

The Tribune Monday received two telegrams from Washington advising that the Rural Electrification Administration had approved a \$245,000 loan to the Santa Rosa Telephone Coop of Vernon.

One telegram from Congressman Walter Rogers said the miles of new lines in Texas and Oklahoma and provide service for 66 new rural subscribers in Cottle and Motley counties.

Another telegram from Jim Boren, Senator Ralph Yarborough's administrative assistant, said substantially the same thing.

The Tribune has no information concerning the Santa Rosa Telephone Coop of Vernon and how it proposes to serve Motley County.

Former Cattleman Harry H. Campbell, Publishes Book on Early County History

Harry H. Campbell, founder of the fabulous Matador Ranch, and is recognized as one of the great pioneers of the Southwest.

The book is privately printed by the Naylor Company of San Antonio and is only about 70 pages, including numerous pictures from the Campbell collection. It retails for \$5. The Tribune has ordered a supply which is expected within a few days.

Mr. Campbell has written an accurate history of the founding of the Matador Ranch and the early history of the county. With few exceptions the book deals with personalities and incidents before the turn of the century.

A retired rancher, Mr. Campbell is the president of the First State bank here. Only 500 copies of the book are being printed. Mrs. Campbell typed and arranged the book.

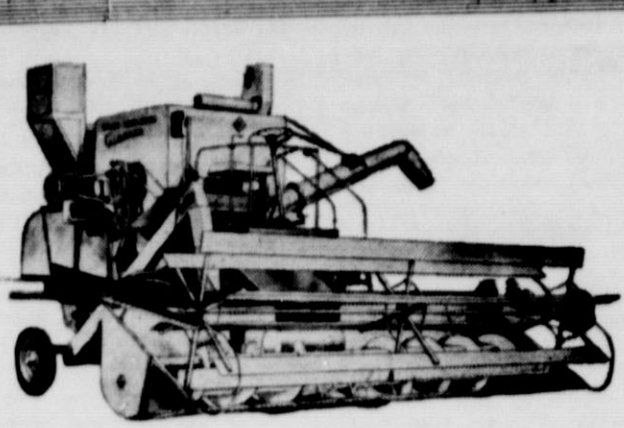
