He became ill and asked Doyle Cooper to take the controls. About 12:35 a. m. morning Fireman and Brakeman Raldo also in the cab, said he went to sleep.

The train was brought to a stop at Springs at 12:50, with the crew, Floyd Hodo, and Rex Reynolds, and S. Stanley, of Matador, removed and an inquest held before Justice of the Peace D. Mitchell.

The body was transferred by the funeral home to where funeral services were held.

Watson had been a railroad man and resident of Quanah, 47 years. He was born in Mills County, Oklahoma, a member of the Church of Christ.

Moss & Sons Start New Wildcat

Referendum on Wheat Quotas Scheduled For June 20; County to Have Five Boxes

WHEAT marketing quotas referendum voting places have been announced by Ben Edwards, chairman of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee. The election on the 1959 wheat crop quotas is scheduled for June 20.

Voting places are as follows: Flomut, Webb's Grocery; Northfield, Lane's Grocery; Whiteflat, Dixon's Grocery; Matador, courthouse basement and Roaring Springs, Bresselton Implement Co. Eligible voters may cast the ballots at the polls in their community between the hours of 8 a. m. and 7 p. m.

Farmers eligible to vote are those who in 1959 will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain (except those who are participating in the 1958 feed wheat program).

Feed wheat participants are permitted to grow up to 30 acres of wheat for use only on the farm where grown, without being subject to marketing quota penalties.

Two-Thirds Vote
 At least two-thirds of the farmers voting must approve the marketing quotas, if they are to remain in effect for the 1959 wheat crop and if price supports are to be made available to farmers who comply with their allotments. The support price will not be less than \$1.81 per bushel, of 75% of parity.

Farmers who exceed the larger of the farm allotments of 15 acres, will be subject to a marketing penalty of 45% of the wheat parity price on their excess wheat if the excess is not stored or delivered to the Secretary of Agriculture, the excess acreage will not be considered in setting future allotments.

If quotas are not approved by two-thirds majority, the quotas will no longer be in effect, and wheat price support will be about \$1.20 per bushel or 50% of parity.

"Pitchfork Kid" one of the best known and most colorful old-time cowboys ever employed on the Matador Ranch, no longer sleeps in an unmarked grave.

Fred I. Hale of Amarillo also a pioneer cowboy on the Matador Ranch and a close friend of "The Kid", has found the grave in Amarillo's Llano Cemetery. Mr. Hale was in the Tribune Monday He said he had heard of this newspaper's interest in locating the grave of William Pardlow (Pitchfork Kid) and went to the cemetery and began searching. Four years after he started he found the grave. The plot was bought by Frank Mitchell in 1919, the year "The Kid" was killed in New Mexico, reportedly in an accident when he fell from a load of hay.

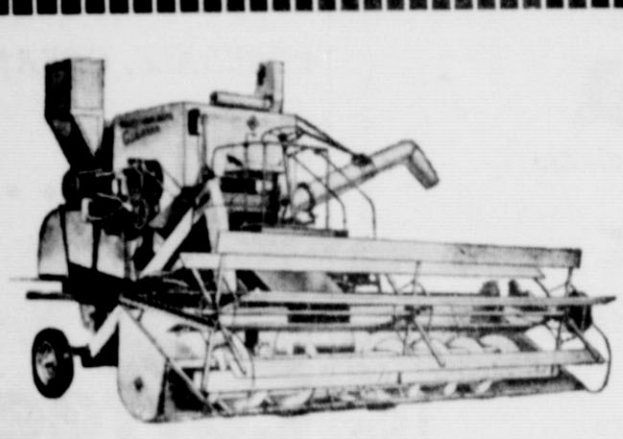

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


the state governor in 1957. He was also chairman of the House temporary Rules Committee, which adopted the Code of Ethics for the House in 1957, chairman of three of the temporary committees appointed by

the Speaker in 1957, and has served on the following permanent committees since his first election in 1952: Chairman, Conservation and Reclamation; vice-chairman, Rules; vice-chairman, Labor; member, agriculture; member, State Affairs; member, Appropriations; member, Transportation; member, Elections; and member, Highways and Roads.

Regarding his announcement, Saul said his platform will be:

1. Ground water belongs to the owner of the land and therefore must be kept free of state or federal control.
2. Those who have not kept faith with the public must be removed from positions of trust and responsibility.
3. The same economy that the intelligent farmer and businessman uses in running his affairs can and must be extended to state government.
4. Local self-government is our tried and proven way of life. Any further trends toward further centralization in state and federal must be ploughed under.
5. An education second to none for every child.

"I've tried to make you a good hand as Representative, and now I'm asking you for a promotion," Saul said. "I'm running on my record, not promises for the future. I urge you to check my record in detail and then decide for yourselves whether you want to promote me to the senate."
