

Who Did What to the REA?

The Supreme Court March 13, 1957 declared unconstitutional these phases of the REA Law inacted in 1937.

The Supreme Court held that the REA could not:

- 1. Service the farm of the man who lives in town.
- 2. Service an oil well pump in the country for an oil company whose principal office is in the city.
- 3. Continue to serve a house in an area annexed to a city.
- 4. Continue service to many inhabitants of towns such as Lone Star, Marble Falls and many others that exceed 1,500 inhabitants.

The Texas Legislature, the spring of 1957 restored and enlarged these benefits.

House Bill No. 547 - (Leroy Saul's bill) would permit the REA to:

- 1. Serve the farm of a man who lives in town.
- 2. Service an oil well pump in the country for an oil company whose principal office is in town.
- 3. Continue to serve in an area annexed to a city without a franchise from that city, and may serve there forever. (NO TIME LIMIT.
- 4. Continue service to many inhabitants of towns such as Lone Star and others that now exceed 1,500 inhabitants.

HOUSE BILL NO. 547, PASSED BY THE 55TH LEGISLATURE APRIL 30 1957, CURED UNCONSTITUTIONAL PHASES OF THE STATUTE UNDER WHICH THE REA HAD BEEN DOING BUSINESS SINCE 1937. IT RESTORED EVERY BENEFIT AND ENLARGED OTHERS.

Let The Facts Be Known

Rep. Leroy Saul, member of the state Affairs Committee and chairman of the Sub-Committee that wrote HB No. 547, piloted its passage from the full committee by unanimous vote and from the house by a vote of 128 for to 10 against.

This action came within 47 days of the Supreme Court ruling which crippled the REA.

Many REA folks believe that benefits obtained, including Saul's amendment which was accepted by Rep. Alonzo Jamison, author of HB No. 547, were the maximum ones which could have been obtained from the 55th Legislature.

Many vital services of the REA are still available today because of the helpful interest Rep. Saul took in this matter. The provisions he opposed were those canceling a city's long-established right to control its own streets and alleys.


