Melancholy harps echo beyond the unknown frontiers of my soul. A year is approaching its death throes. Yet time, the eternal mother has no delirium, no bereavement. I am ashamed of myself. A native Texan, I have lived up the better part of a lifetime without growing Blue Bonnets. If this thing works out like the seed packet describes, I think I will have solved a personal question of why the Blue Bonnet is the Texas state flower. Texans have always been resourceful; able to make a pretty showing with the minimum amount of effort. So any day which I feel is good Blue Bonnet weather, I will open the packet, scatter the seeds where I want the Blue Bonnets to grow, dust off my hands and seek a chair to rest and relax. The responsibility from that hour will rest with Texas soil, rainfall, sunshine and magnificence. Another splendid feature of my variety of Blue Bonnets is: once I have spent my effort in gardening they will not require replanting the following year, but will return from their seed without further care. A caution on the envelope appealed to me: "Do not cultivate."

Workers For Drive To Be Named Soon

Plans are being made to start an all-out campaign to raise funds for a Matador Community Chest during the early part of 1949, according to Forrest Campbell, Community Chest chairman.

Direct solicitation will be made by Community Chest workers to obtain funds. The goal set for the drive is near \$4,000, Campbell announced.

"The main objective of the Community Chest is to broaden the number of contributors to at least 500 persons, and to give a greater number of people a chance to share in giving to various organizations," Campbell said. Funds from the Community Chest will be allocated to organizations that Matador has been contributing to for a number of years. Besides funds for national organizations there will be a fund set aside for local community use.

The Community Chest committee was picked from the Matador Lions club at a meeting in December. They are: Forrest Campbell, chairman; Tom Hamilton, secretary; and Howard Traweck, Dr. J. S. Stanley, and Elmer Stearns, directors. Application for membership in the National Community Chest of America has been made by the local group, Campbell stated.

Workers for the drive will be picked by the committee at a meeting which will be held soon.

Two national public subscription organizations, The Red Cross and the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis have refused to participate in Community Chests. Leaders here in the plan believe the organizations may be influenced to entertain a more considerate view.

Matador will be among the smallest cities in the nation to adopt the Community Chest plan of regulated contributions. Each request for funds will be reviewed by a permanent board of local citizens. One of the cardinal ideas behind the Community Chest is the opinion of thousands that the contributor has a right to know how his money is spent and what percentage of it benefits his community. He has a right to know what percentage of his money is spent in needless bureaucratic-type administration; to know the exact amount which finally reaches the cause for which it was contributed.

The Community Chest is under absolute control of local citizens. The plan may be changed in any manner to better serve the purpose for which it was organized; abolishing needless year-round solicitations.

The Matador Community chest will include all of the Matador school district. Original thought among local leaders was to embrace the entire county, but advice from other communities using the plan was that chances for success would be better if confined only to the community.

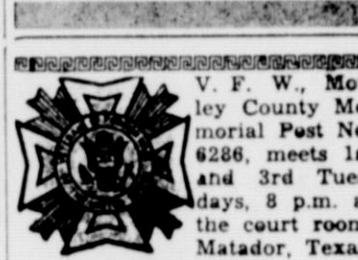

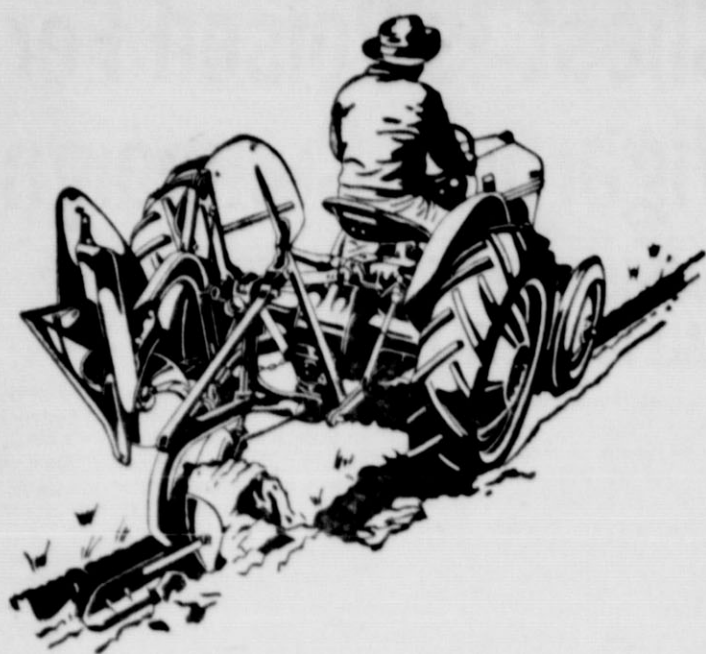

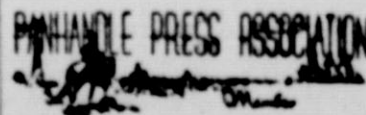
