The Volleyball tournament in Flomot, March 21-22-23 was declared a success with twenty teams competing for the championship honors.

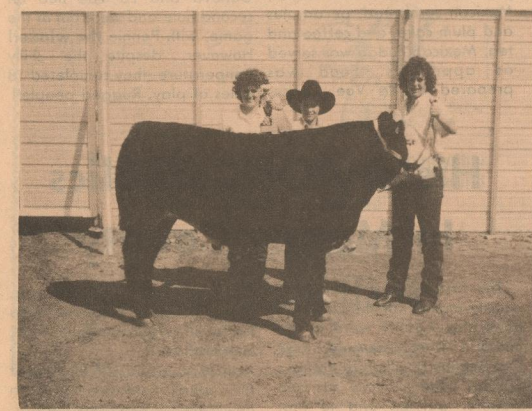

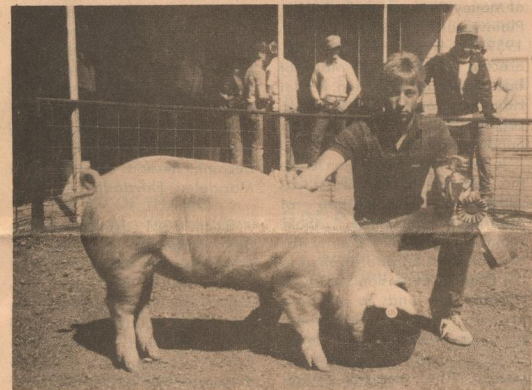

Speaking at regular meeting of the Matador Lions Club March 19, at the United Methodist Church, Mrs. Stocco outlined the many services available through the SPEMS, which embraces 15 counties in the region, including Motley County. She also showed slides illustrating the program of emergency medical services, such as heart attack and accident victims.

With Mrs. Stocco at the meeting was Mrs. Kirby (Joyce) Campbell, clerk/receptionist of the Motley County Clinic, who is a member of the Regional EMS Coordinating Office Board composed of representatives from all cities, counties and hospitals, working to upgrade the health care and services which they provide.

Boss Lion Vann Francis presided at the meeting, and the two guests were introduced by Lion Frank Pohl, serving as recorder. Lion Larry Hoyle, program chairman, presented the speaker.

After leading the club in applause to Lion Walter Jones for the meal, Lion Francis

announced the calendar project which the club is sponsoring and urged the members to help get birthdays, school activities and club and civic meetings and projects listed on the calendar.

The president also announced the dates, May 3-4 for the Lions District 21-2 convention which will be held in Plainview, and urged members to attend. School Superintendent Charlie Johnson reported that bids will be opened in three weeks for construction of a new school plant. Lion Francis also announced that the club will sponsor a boy and girl to attend the Farm Bureau's Citizenship Seminar in Waco this summer.

Further plans for the club will be to elect a Lions Queen at the Junior Class play, in event this entertainment is staged, this year.

History Day Photographs On Display At Bank

On March 27 an interesting collection of photographs taken by Jack Robertson at "History Day at the Ranch" last fall will be on display at the First State Bank in Matador. The sesquicentennial project of the General James Smith Chapter of Daughters of the Republic of Texas featured many Motley County residents, and some of their pictures are included in the thirteen enlarged photographs.

Coming from the Silverton area, Robertson is the son of the late Jack Robertson and Mrs. Robertson. In his business, R Photography of Floydada, he is assisted by his wife, Allison, who takes care of the secretarial duties and art work, including repairs, retouching and restoration.

When asked in an interview on the job about his personal preference of the types of pictures he takes, Robertson said, "Next to portraits, I really like taking landscapes, being outdoors, using creativity with nature."

As he and his be-awoned subject traipsed down the side of a creek where plum bushes were blooming, he continued, "The

best time to take these outdoor pictures is early in the morning or late in the evening, when the glow of the sun on the horizon makes what we photographers call 'sweet light.' The term sweet light became reality, as he positioned the young woman so that the soft waning rays of the sunlight made a halo surrounding her hair and dress.

The use of sepia, or brown tones, gives his work a timelessness, whereby the modern pictures look as if they could be old. His eye for detail and his penchant for capturing the spirit or character of a subject will be revealed in this collection.

Young in years, but old in experience, Robertson has gained his expertise by taking classes at Southwestern in Weatherford, Oklahoma, LCC and Texas Tech, Lubbock, working at a photo lab and in a camera store. He is an accredited member of Texas Professional Photographers Association and Professional Photographers of America.

This traveling collection will be on display at the bank for two to three weeks. Don't miss it!

The club will meet at 1:30 p.m. on April 22, at the home of Mrs. Stearns for a business meeting before leaving for Canyon State Park.





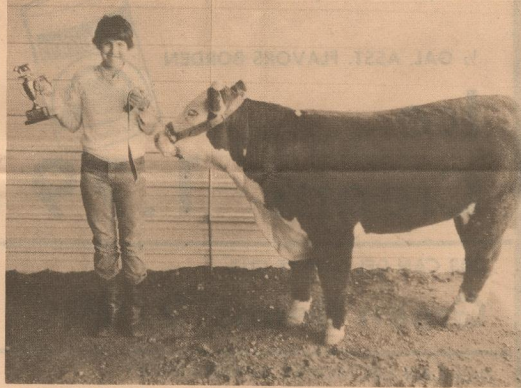

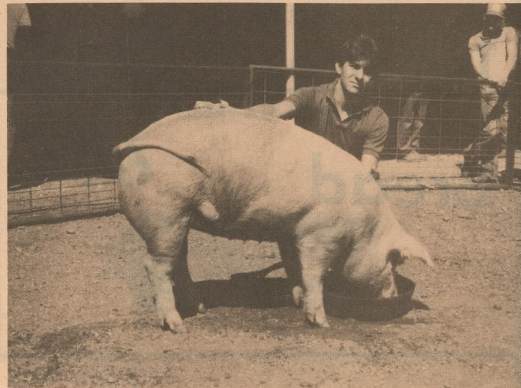

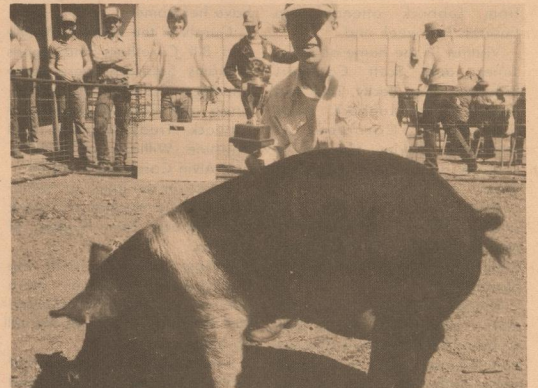

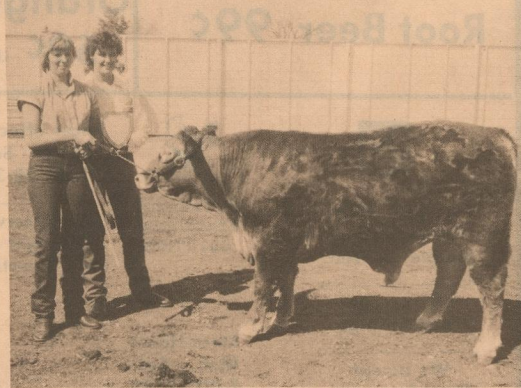
