

# **History Of Catholics** In Motley County

The first regularly scheduled weekly masses for the Catholics of Motley County were in the mid-50's. They were held at the Old Settlers Pavillion at Roaring Springs. The coming of cold weather put an end to that experiment.

experiment.

Father Noordman from Spur rather Noordman from Spur continued working with the people and secured the transfer of Motley County from St. Alice's, Plainview, to St. Mary's, Spur. In 1959 St. Mary's was formally erected into a parish. Matador became a mission station. Father Hammond secured the American Legion Hall in Matador for Sunday masses.

Legion Hall in Matador for Sunday masses. In early 1961 permission to use the Legion Hall for mass was withdrawn. The Bishop of Amarillo felt that the Catholic community of Motley County was a viable mission and applied to the Catholic Extension Society of Chicago for funds to purchase property for its use. In 1962 these property for its use. In 1962 these funds were received and a half-block in north Matador was bought. This was the former home of Mrs. Bess Patton. The old house was altered by the parishioners-part to serve as the church and the rest as the hall. In October, 1962, Bishop Morkovsky blessed the mission of

Our Lady of Guadalupe, Matador. Since that time mass has been celebrated each week in Matador.

In 1964, again with the help of the Catholic Extension Society, a new church was built in Matador. The Bess Patton house continued to be used as the parish hall until 1972 when it was torn down and replaced with a metal building matching the church building

matching the church building-thanks, also, to Extension.
In June, 1983, the Diocese of Lubbock was erected. This resulted in the realignment of parishes and Our Lady of Guadalupe, Matador, along with St. Elizabeth's, Paducah, became missions of St. Mary Magdelen, Floydada.

Since 1981 the parish has Since 1981 the parish has been fortunate in having the Mercedarian Missionaries of Berriz (three of whom are stationed in Spur) working in the parish with adult education and other teaching duties. The Catholic Community of Our Lady Catholic Community of Our Lady of Guadalupe is very proud of Sister Audelia Bustamante. She is a granddaughter of the pioneer Catholic family of Frank Morales of Roaring Springs. She is a Franciscan sister teaching in Jubback
