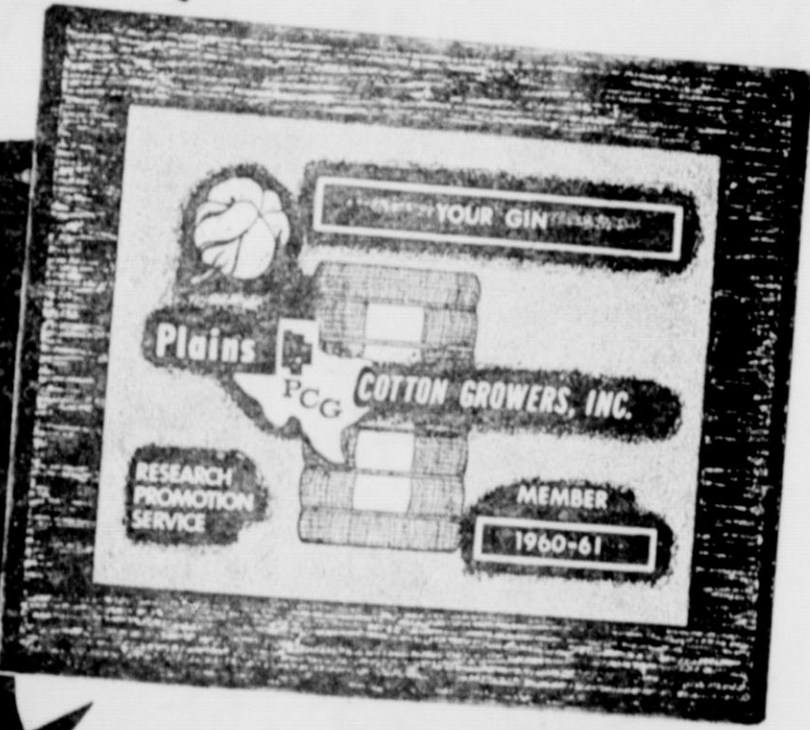
Others present were Mesdames Lois Martin and Sam Ross.

They took refuge at Smithville near Houston, then continued to San Antonio where they remained with friends until Friday.

In a letter to Randall Whitworth, former resident Vernon "Prof" Doss of Fredericksburg told of that town being filled with refugees from the storm. Upon his return home Tuesday morning he reported that Edna was flattened and that his clinic was the only business house standing intact. His home also escaped damage.

"Farm crops loss (the letter continued) is around \$20 million. They haven't made a crop in three years due to drought, rain and storm. Business people, as well as farmers are destitute."

survey shows 46,005 homes destroyed or damaged in 18 hard-hit Texas coastal counties. It is estimated that 205,000 persons are either homeless or their homes are damaged.

"We could pay the \$227 out of funds on hand," Gilbreath said, "but I don't want to do it. I want to make it on a county-wide basis with everyone having a part in helping the victims of the hurricane and the Galveston cyclones."
