

Stanley McDonough Presents Program To Garden Club

Matador Garden Club met Monday afternoon at Summit Savings Community Room for a program on Western Beauty, presented by Stanley McDonough of Canyon, Game Warden with the Texas Wildlife Department. His talk featured outdoor Western beauty in drawings and sculpture.

A native of Matador, he lived here the first 23 years of his life, and as a youth, spent much time on the Stearns ranch with the late Alvin Stearns and with his father, who was Motley County Game Warden for a number of years. Stanley is the son of the late Donnie and Lewis McDonough. He has lived in Canyon the past 25 years.

A self taught artist, Stanley works with pen and ink and bronze sculpture but prefers bronzes because of their durability. He brought several pieces of these for display as he talked and explained the intricacies of sculpting. He became interested in clay modeling as a child, and in 1973 started sculpting and doing his own casting. He has bronzes in private collections throughout the United States, and photographs of his work have appeared in magazine articles and advertisements.

In a question and answer session, he explained that each edition of his work is limited to 23, and that he arrived at this figure to allow one each for his family (wife and two children) above 20 which, he said, was as many as he wished to cast.

"By that time, you are really tired of an edition and are ready to go on to something new for a subject."

Among the bronzes which the artist displayed was his first work, an Aoudad sheep such as those which roam Palo Duro Canyon. This was mounted on a mesquite stump. He has returned to this subject, and is currently in the process of making a pair of Aoudads fighting, which he brought to show the various stages of the work from initial wax model to casting in bronze. His other subjects center on such western themes as steer roping and bronco busting. However, one of his most popular works is "Racehorse," for which he received his highest price by a wealthy woman horse breeder.

Mrs. Alvin Stearns, president, opened the meeting for a business session and roll call, with Mrs. J.D. Craven as program leader. Roll call was a show of snow-covered landscape pictures made by the members.

Mrs. W.N. Pipkin, hostess for the meeting, served refreshments of individual cheese cakes with cherry topping, fruit cake, sugar cookies, nuts and party mix and coffee from a table covered with a white embossed nylon cloth over pink and centered with an arrangement of red tapers, greenery and miniature red hearts.

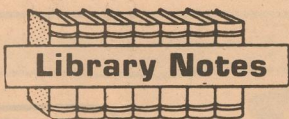

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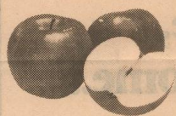


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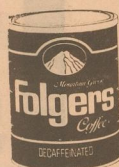
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Fashion Show Set

Farm, ranch and agri-business women can display their fashion and sewing skills at the Natural Fibers Fashion Showcase to be held at the Southwest Farm and Ranch Exposition in Fort Worth on March 9.

The showcase demonstrated what beautiful finished products come from cotton, wool and mohair—all Texas agricultural commodities, says Mary Streit, Motley County Extension Agent-Home Economics.

The extrants will compete for first, second and third place awards in four divisions: custom sewn garments, knitted and crocheted garments, coordinated mother and child ensembles and former grand award winners. A fifth non-competitive division gives seamstresses an opportunity to show off garments sewn for a family member.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

Each garment entered in the show must be made of a

minimum blend of 50% cotton or 50% wool and/or mohair, says the home economist.

Contestants must be 18 years or older, and actively involved in farming, ranching or agri-business; or be a member (or member's spouse) of an agriculture-related organization such as Extension Homemakers Clubs, Young Homemakers, Young Farmers, 4-H Leader Association, producer association or auxiliaries and tractor pullers' clubs.

"We hope that a number of women representing Motley County agriculture will enter the showcase," says Streit.

Sponsors of the event include the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Southwest Hardware and Implement Association and Progressive Farmer.

Entries must be submitted by February 20. Contest rules and entry blanks are available at the county Extension office and from Extension Homemaker and Young Homemakers clubs.

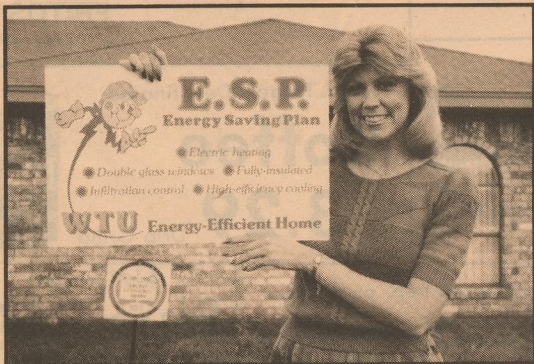


