House Reviews Bill Supporting Creation Exposure In Schools

A bill requiring public schools to give the same exposure to the theory of creationism that is given to the theory of evolution was introduced into the Texas House of Representatives last Thursday by the Honorable Mike Martin (r) of Longview.

The creationism theory supports the notion that the earth and its inhabitants were created by a supreme being. Evolutionists contend that the earth and its inhabitants are the result of accidents and adaptive processes that have shaped them over the ages.

Martin's spokesman, Gregg County GOP Chairman Wayne House, said

that the bill addresses all sides of the issue and should be satisfactory to both sides because it provides that the theories be taught without reference to any religion or religious writings.

House, an instructor of Biblical studies at LeTourneau College in Longview is credited with much of the research work and writing that went into drawing up this bill.

The two men feel that this legislation is necessary to provide an academic climate wherein students have an opportunity to examine available scientific data and make up their own minds about which to accept or reject. They

agree that there is scientific data to support both sides but oppose the idea of teaching evolution

Reagan Brown touched the hearts and pocket books of many Muleshoe and Bailey County residents when he proclaimed "We have got to get a profit for our farmers" at the 31st Annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet Friday night.

Agriculture Commissioner Brown said he wanted to "stir up" those present into being proud they were Muleshoe citizens, proud they were Texans and proud they were Americans. Brown stressed the good things available and abundant in American such as talent in the youth and the farmers ability to feed

New Check Writing Policy Seems To Be Working Here

Acting Chief of Police, Jerry Hicks says there has been a "noticeable difference" in the number of bad checks written in Muleshoe since the new check writing policy was enforced about a month ago.

"Judge Linda Huckaby and I feel the number is slacking off a little bit," he said, adding this may be due to two reasons: "Those who write bad checks tend to back off when forced to produce identification and businesses are refusing more checks."

Hudge Huckaby stated she had not filed "nearly as many checks since the policy was enforced" as before.

Asked whether or not this new policy would be effective enough to eventually bring bad check writing to a halt, Hicks stated: "We will have to adapt our program as we go, but we

to stick with it. It hurts the businesses and the community."

"It is more work for the businessmen," said Ms. Huckaby, "but I think they realize the importance."

Area businesses which have handled a large amount of worthless checks hold differing opinions on the policy's effectiveness and the community's acceptance.

Ronda Logsdon, manager of Gibsons, stated the bad check traffic had slowed down considerably and it was definitely more work for her and her employees.

The problem she has encountered is the "Irritability of customers" resulting from having to produce a driver's license when paying by check.

But Ms. Logsdon has found a partial solution to this by establishing a check file for return customers. Once a customer's check is

Functional considerations can easily lose out to "looks" in the competitive mood of the marketplace where more than 125 companies compete for the consumer's dollars. Fortunately some cookware is BOTH -- functional and good looking.

To find cookware with function and beauty, remember your "physics" -- just the basic laws.

To do a good job of cooking, cookware must conduct heat quickly and evenly without hot spots. Certainly metals conduct heat more efficiently than others: cooper is best, and aluminum is next best. Steel and iron generally are poor conductors of heat but stainless steel used in combination with other metals such as copper or aluminum is very satisfactory. Porcelain-clad steel does not distribute heat very evenly. However, thick cast-iron pans can spread heat as evenly as thin copper ones, mainly because iron retains the heat so well.

Metal isn't the only consideration, either. Durability and cleanability are major concerns, too. Cooper tarnishes easily but is easily restored. On the other hand, if the tin lining wears away, copper can react with acidic substances to cause potentially harmful health effects. Aluminum is vulnerable to pitting and discoloration, but aluminum poses no

known health hazards. Stainless steel is both durable and easy to clean. Cast iron requires special seasoning and cleaning procedures to keep it in optimum shape.

Here's a word about cookware coatings: Porcelain enamel coatings have pros and cons. These coatings are used on iron, steel and aluminum pans. They are fairly easy to keep clean, but then can be marred by metal spoons or scouring pads. Also, thin layers may chip easily and may be subject to crazing (streaking) due to thermal stress. Non-stick coatings some come in several types. The better ones resist damage, but many of these finishes probably will have a shorter life than the pots and pans they're bonded to.

Make sure any pot and pan you buy has a flat bottom -- for even, more efficient heating. Also, be sure it has a tight-fitting lid and good balance so it doesn't tip over.

Some types of cookware make better sense when bought "by the peice" than by the set. When choosing cookware, be especially careful about a "set" with a "decorator look." Consider your needs and how frequently you may use a piece of cookware. A variety of cookware may be the best "recipe" for your kitchen. For example, you might choose a cast-iron skillet for frying, an inexpensive aluminum kettle for boiling water when you need a large amount as for spaghetti, and one or two of the best saucepans you can find. This grouping will probably meet most of your cooking needs.

Add a few pieces of non-stick cookware in a price line you can afford and your functional needs will be met.

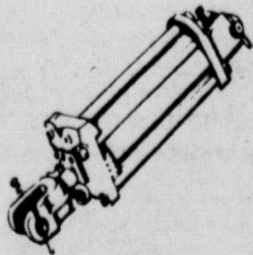

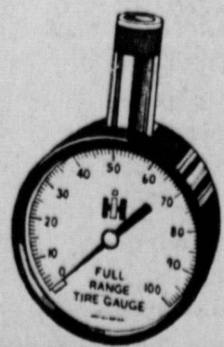

**Public Notice Of
Tax Exemption Deadline
April 1st, 1981
GENERAL HOMESTEAD**

If you qualify for a residence homestead, you will be entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of the homestead for school tax purposes. In other words, if your homestead has a market value of \$20,000, the exemption will reduce the market value to \$15,000. This is the figure against which the assessor will apply the assessment ratio, producing the assessed value. The assessed value is the figure on which the tax rate is applied to generate the tax bill. If the market value of your home is \$4,000, the exemption will reduce the market value to \$0. In this situation, your exemption will be \$4,000. The amount of an exemption which you receive cannot exceed the market value of your homestead.

The school homestead exemption is available to the general public as long as valid applications are filed with the school district by April 1, 1981.

ARE YOU OVER 65?

If you are 65 years of age or older, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of your residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only and you must apply for the exemption before the end of the rendition period April 1, 1981.

You may not receive both a \$10,000 over-65 exemption off the market value of your homestead and \$10,000 disability exemption (discussed later). If you are qualified for both, you must choose one or the other.

ARE YOU DISABLED?

If you are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption, you are entitled to receive an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of your residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only.

"Disabled" for purposes of this exemption means either that, because of physical or mental disability, you are unable to engage in any substantial gainful work; or that you are 55 years of age or older and blind, and by reason of the blindness are unable to engage in your previous work.

If you are receiving disability benefits under the Federal Old Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance Program administered by the Social Security Administration, you will qualify as long as you apply by April 1, 1981.

If you are receiving disability benefits under any other program, you will not automatically qualify. You must still meet the definition of disability stated above and apply before the end of the rendition period.

You may not receive both a \$10,000 over-65 exemption off the market value of your homestead and a \$10,000 disability exemption. You must choose one or the other.

property taxes. This exemption can be applied to any property -- not just a homestead -- that is owned on January 1.

Depending on the percentage of your disability, you may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,000 of the assessed value of any property you owned on January 1 of the year in which you apply.

In order to qualify, you must be a Texas resident and fill out an application annually at the tax office.

You must designate only one property to receive this exemption, regardless of the number of jurisdictions in which you apply.

You are required to present documents stating the percentage of a service-connected disability from either the Veteran's Administration or a branch of the armed services.

Depending on what type of exemption is sought, proof of marriage, death or age may also be required.

ARE YOU A FARMER OR RANCHER?

In addition to the exemption described above, qualified farmers and ranchers may enjoy another form of tax relief.

Two amendments to the Texas Constitution permit agricultural and open-space land to be taxed generally at its productivity value instead of market value. These provisions are effective only if applications are filed with the tax office by April 1, 1981.

For agricultural land--The land must be currently devoted principally to agricultural use to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area.

The land must have been in agricultural or timber use for at least five of the last seven years.

Also, for open-space land valuation, a valid application must be filed each year during the rendition period on a form provided by the tax assessor.

Under open-space land valuation, there is no requirement that the land be owned by a natural person. Land owned by corporations or partnerships may qualify. The agricultural or timber use need not be the primary occupation or source of income of the owner. A sworn statement is not required.

Under both provisions--the agricultural use valuation and the open-space land valuation--the tax assessor has the sole authority to determine whether the applicant qualifies.

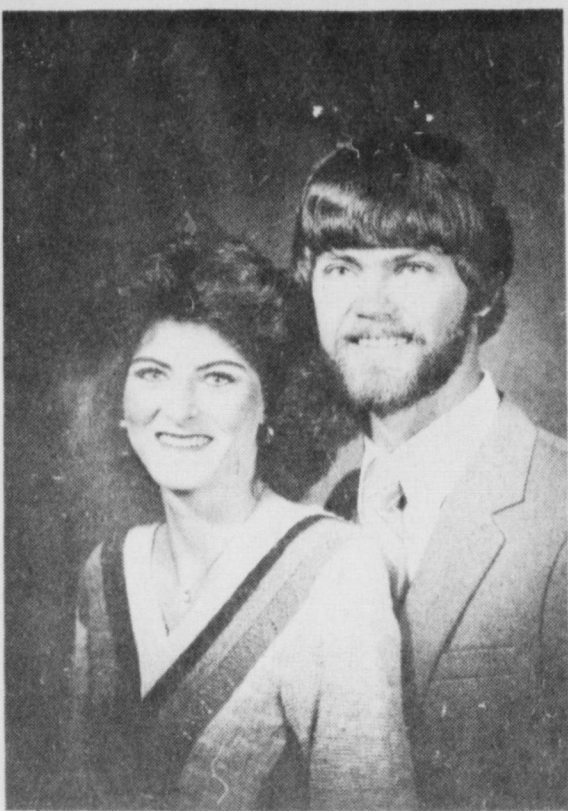

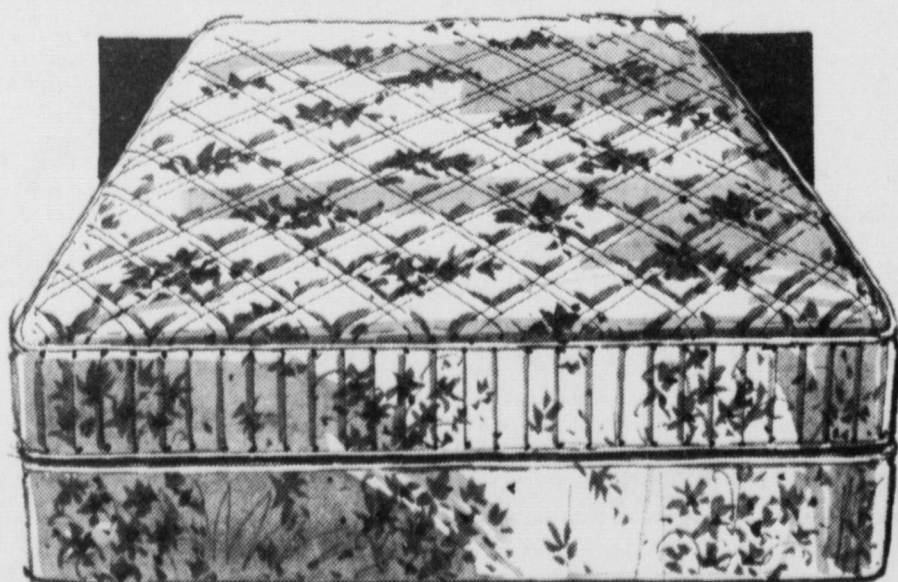

 theories only in the schools.

They also feel that the exclusion of factual material relating to creation theories is a serious threat to academic freedom.

Martin believes his bill has a good chance of passing because it calls for a non-religious and balanced presentation of factual evidence. He cites growing numbers of serious scientists supporting creation theories as an indication that he has the support necessary to push his bill through the legislative mill.

The bill is identified as H.B. 1901 and has not yet been assigned to a committee for study. Similar bills are pending in about 20 other states. Polls indicate that the public favors the teaching of both theories, and a lawsuit has been filed seeking to force the teaching of creationism alongside evolutionism in California schools.

Although freshman legislators generally have a tough time getting anyone to pay attention to their bills Martin said he will push until he gets the support he needs to get his bill passed.

 The dryland wheat, however, is showing moisture stress, has little growth and is turning blue in color. Some dryland is starting to blow and is covered with sand and the soil moisture is depleted.

The only vegetable being planted in this area to Tanksley's knowledge is potatoes of which about half has been planted. "We are some 20-30 days from the planting of corn and some maybe planted early."

He anticipates cotton will have the largest acreage in the county.

Tanksley reminds people of this area that over the last 10 years the average freeze date is around April 11. He cautions homeowners planning gardens not to be too anxious about planting until after this time.

"The crop production minimum temperature in degrees at the four inch depth for planting corn is 50, cotton 65, sorghum 55, and soy beans, 70. Hardy vegetables such as onions, cabbage, and potatoes can be planted once the soil temperature is 45-50. Warm season vegetables of tomatoes, beans and peppers need a 60 degree temperature before planting.

"Generally," said Tanksley, "the Bailey Agriculture producers need to make a good crop this year not only to benefit the farmer, but also to stimulate the economy. If another crop disaster occurs in the county, lots of people will suffer. A number of farmers will have to go out of business."

Tanksley concluded by stating that area people should be hoping for more rain and higher prices for "until rainfall is received, the farming picture cannot be too bright."

 million bushels of corn were relocated in West Texas.

Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA) recognized the potential damage to local grain markets and began last December appealing to USDA to establish a sales policy for this corn that would not disrupt the grain market in the High Plains area. Such policies have not been implemented.

CCC contends that the corn will not be sold for less than 105 percent of the national average call level for reserve corn and then not below the market price. An exception is made for the corn that is going out of condition or will not grade "number three or better." It is doubtful that much of this corn will grade number three or better when it is loaded out because of breakage in handling. CCC can, by claiming this exception, sell all of the grain at discounted prices.

Almost one million bushels of the corn had been sold, mostly to West Texas buyers, by March 15. This was corn that graded "sample" grade when it arrived at the storage destination. It was sold on a bid basis at prices not less than CCC determined the local market price to be, less their normal discounts for sample grade grain. These prices were determined after the government paid the transportation and relocation costs. The government's cost of grain and transportation was not used as part of the sale price formula.

Grain prices have steadily deteriorated in the High Plains area since the corn was moved in. Grain buyers have anticipated that

the entire 52 million bushels would eventually be released with the area, probably at discounted prices. Now CCC is basing their pricing formula on this area's depressed prices. During this same time, prices in the rest of the country, especially the corn belt, have strengthened. GSPA contends that CCC does not allow for the strength that would have developed in High Plains Markets if the relocated corn had not been available and in competition with locally grown grain.

This corn, according to GSPA, should be sold only for export. If it is sold for domestic use, it should not be sold for less than the current market price in the area in which it was grown, plus freight and relocation charges. Anything less creates an artificial marketing situation that will weaken the market prices in the High Plains area even while the rest of the nation, especially the area in which this corn was grown, will experience stronger prices.

The volume of corn that

was relocated in West Texas, is more than half as much as the combined corn production of West Texas, Eastern New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle in 1980 -- enough to completely wreck the High Plains grain markets.

GSPA has requested the assistance of area congressmen to work with USDA in finding a more equitable way to dispose of CCC relocated corn.

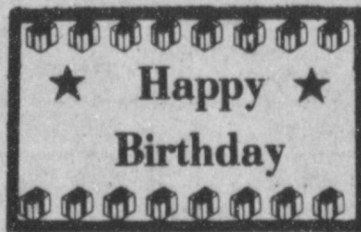

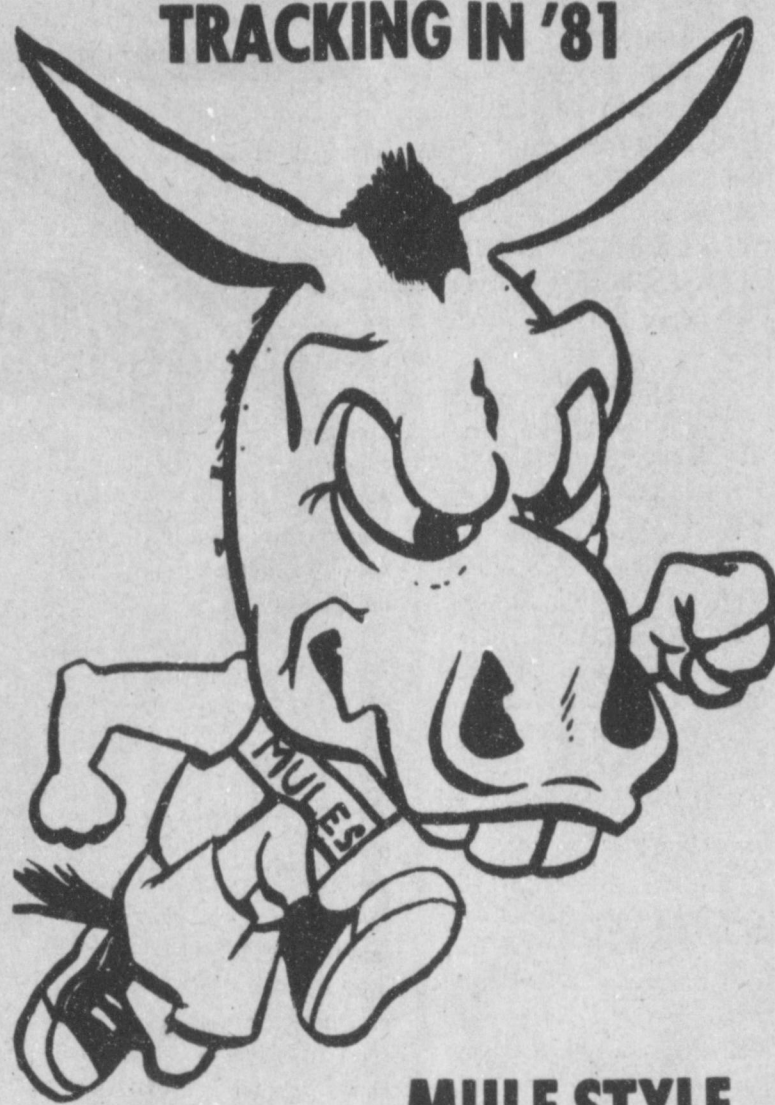

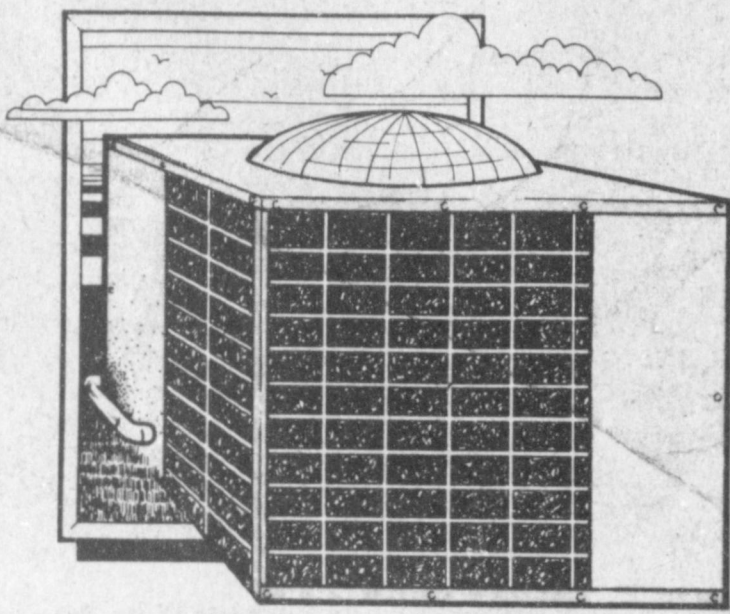

Taxation Based On Farm and Ranch Use

Taxing farms and ranches according to their agricultural use rather than their fair market value can mean substantial savings to farm families on the death of the landowner.

Savings in estate taxes can be as much as 50 percent for those that qualify, said Dr. Lorence L. Brayence at an Estate Planning Seminar held recently at Texas A&M University. The seminar was sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System.

The opportunity for farm and ranch families to reduce their estate taxes came about with Internal Revenue Code Section 2032 A enacted in 1976. The law

set forth provisions for special use valuation for farms and ranches. Purpose of the provision was to help family farms survive financially and not be taxed out of existence, noted Brayence, a Texas A & M professor of accounting.

For an estate to qualify, numerous requirements must be met:

1. The property must be used actively for farming or ranching.

2. The owner or a close relative must be actively involved in working the property.

3. The owner must have some "risk" involved or have an "economic interest" in the operation.

4. The property must pass from the decedent to

a close relative.

5. It must be owned and used for agricultural purposes at least five years before the decedent's death.

6. The owner or a close relative must be paying self-employment tax and must work the land full time or do all the necessary work if less than full time.

In addition to these re-

quirements, there are numerous other factors involved in establishing a farm or ranch estate for special use valuation, noted Brayence. A landowner that is interested in this special IRS treatment of agricultural land should contact his tax lawyer or accountant for further details.

sponsoring solar bills and to members of the TENRAC solar committee, Wallace said that the "development of solar power in the state of Texas is important both to the state's short-term and long-term interests in providing a secure energy base for all of its citizens."

Wallace, in his letter, offered his support to sponsors of the legislation and committee chairmen who will be conducting hearings on the solar proposals.

Bills relating to the use of solar energy in the current Legislature are: franchise tax exemption,

property tax exemptions, solar easements, solar in state structures, licensing of solar installers, state loans for solar, and standards for testing.

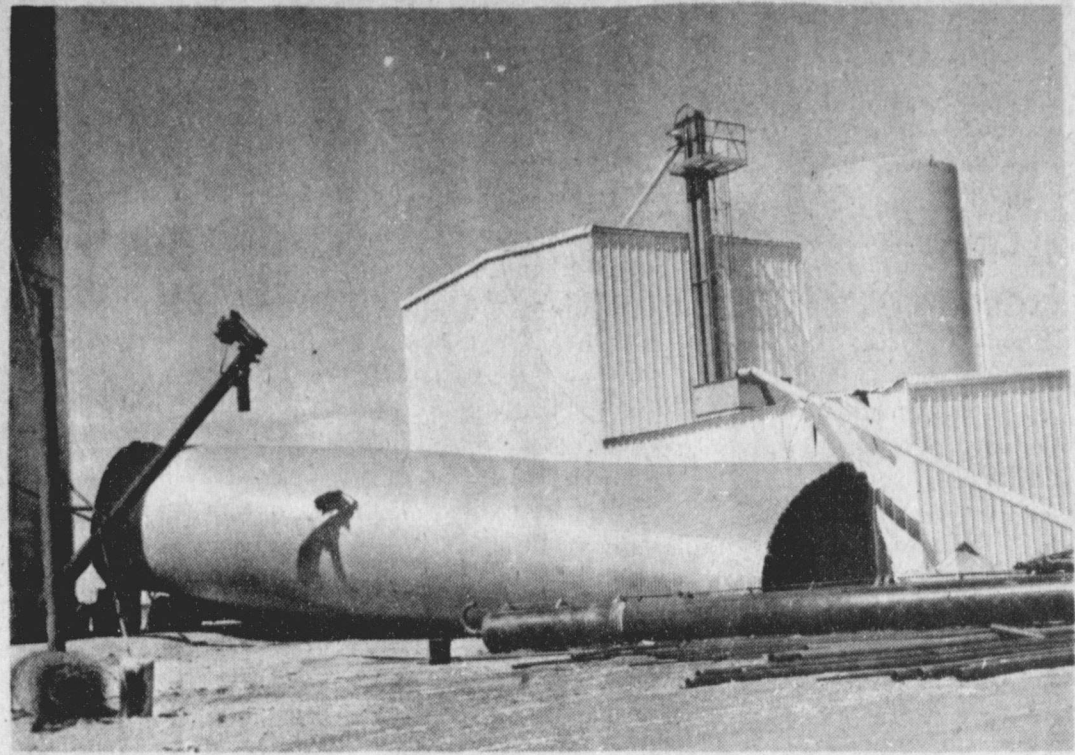

**Cattlemen have every right
to look sour after the debacle
last spring which ended with
the unceremonious collapse of
the market. However, cat-
tlemen may be able to begin
trading in those grimaces for at
least a partial grin. The cattle
market in 1981, according to
Oklahoma State University
market analyst Dr. John Ikerd
may well see a reversal in the
offing which could be more
dramatic than the recovery of
last summer. Dr. Ikerd believes
that the only dark cloud
presently hovering over the
cattle market is the general
state of the economy - but
even that has bright spots.
Beef will not be under as much
pressure this year as last, he
says, by surpluses of pork and
poultry. Also, feedlot
placements are down, causing
some cowmen to cut herds
because of drought and
financial reasons, reducing the
supply of beef. Dr. Ikerd is
even willing to put a number
on his predictions: \$90 per
hundredweight for feedlot
finished cattle by late Spring,
1981.**
