County In Path Of More Oil Interest

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following feature is taken from the front page of the *Quanah Tribune-Chief*, issue of February 8, accompanied by a map tracing the Palo Duro Basin across Motley County. Declared as offering new production possibilities is a 110-mile stretch (10 to 15 miles wide) reaching from the Frederick Field in Oklahoma to the Birnie Field northwest of Matador. The map shows proven production in the Childress (Kirkland), Hardeman and Wilbarger Counties in Texas. The Palo Duro Basin, as shown by the map, includes all of the county from a point south of Matador, to a place south of Memphis in Hall County. It includes the towns of Matador, Childress, Quanah, Crowell and Wellington. Hollis and Frederick are included in Oklahoma. The map was reproduced from the *World Oil Magazine*.

Excerpts from the lengthy article are by Curtis Stevens, Editor National Petroleum Bibliography, Amarillo, Texas.

"Set for the big play is the eastern portion of the vast Palo Duro Basin of Texas and Oklahoma, a little-known region which has drawn scant attention for years, and which has recently jumped into prominence as an area offering new opportunity for oil finders.

"Drawing operators from four districts, and still round out a three-year campaign which has put some 75% of the area under lease, the basin is showing an accelerated tempo of activity. Staked or underway, are tests in Childress, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Hall, Motley and Wilbarger Counties. Across the line in Oklahoma are tests in Jackson and Tillman Counties.

Twelve rigs are active over the eastern basin area and 1962 will see many more as five-year leases demand evaluation and the findings of geophysical surveys and exploratory wells are applied.

"Creating the surge of interest and touching off the extensive leasing campaign, have been new discoveries in the central portion of the eastern basin, the first evidence of sizeable reserves away from basin flanks. Held back for years by lack of productivity indices due to its tiny central fields and comparatively few test wells, the basin has suffered the fate of other provinces condemned to wait for the big discovery before active development can begin.

★ Lists Birnie "Field" "With fields like Conley and Kirkland pointing the way, however, the basin now offers productive possibilities along a 110-mile stretch extending in an east-west direction from the Frederick field of Tillman County, Oklahoma, to the Birnie field of Motley County, Texas. For operators in much-drilled North Texas, West Texas, Panhandle and Oklahoma, it adds a five-thousand square-mile area of relatively untested sediments, vital for the development of new reserves.

Pets (principally dogs) are being poisoned in north Matador, according to owners reports.

Other dog owners are warned to be on the alert in helping apprehend those responsible for the poisoning, which also may be a dangerous bulldog belonging to the children of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Williams died Monday after being conveyed to veterinarian George Westbrook at Paducah, who diagnosed the dog's death as resulting from strychnine. About six dogs are reported to have died from poison during the past week.

It is thought that the poison might be put out for skunks and in that instance, dog owners should be warned in the vicinity.

This is the third straight year in which McAdoo has defeated Matador in the bi-district contest. McAdoo will play Higgins

in the second round of regional tournament at Canyon, starting at 7:15 Friday evening.

Jill Scaff led the Matador scoring with 25 points while Gayle Hardy counted 26 for McAdoo. Cherri Barton scored 13 and Ann Garnett 4 for the Matadors. Winter Encore

Winter has made a dramatic encore across most of the nation in the past three days, completely erasing signs of an early spring in the Panhandle. Wild plum picking is going to be slim in this area, as is the picking of any kind of fruit.

The mercury dropped to a chilly eight degrees early yesterday morning after a great mass of frigid air swept across Texas. Summer-like days had prevailed through most of February, bringing fruit trees into full bloom and causing grass to make the valleys green. One official reading of 92 degrees was reported from Childress last month.

But old-timers shook their heads. It was too early for spring. We would lose the fruit crop, they declared.

Weather forecasters saw some snow for the South Plains area as the cold air moved southward, but they were mistaken.

Dry, cold skies prevailed here but south and east the front produced freezing rain, sleet and some snow, resulting in many accidents and in some instances bringing traffic to a snail's pace.

Parked Car Rammed In Highway Oddity

Two Whiteflat men, Joe Zarate, 19, and his brother, Conrad Zarate, 24, were injured in an accident on US Highway 70, about two miles west of Matador Sunday morning.

Time of the accident is not known. Dr. J. S. Stanley said he was called about 5:20. First report was that two men were injured, one free of the car. When an Eudy-Seale ambulance went to the scene only one, the elder brother, was in the car.

Sheriff Jinks Wilson said it was necessary to turn the car over to get the man out. A large part of his scalp was hanging over his left eye and Dr. Stanley said more than 40 stitches were required in treatment.

★ Joe Zarate did not receive treatment until about 1:30 Sunday afternoon. In a dazed condition he had hitched a ride in the opposite direction and had to return from Floydada. He was re-

leased after minor treatment.

Joe Zarate was driving the car which struck an automobile parked off the pavement. The other car, which bore an Oklahoma license, had been driven here by David A. Tillman of Oklahoma City. After experiencing car trouble he had left the vehicle about 24 hours previously. Both cars were declared almost a total loss.

Al Watson, manager of Wylie Station at the intersection of Highways US 70 and State 70, said there was a lull in the traffic from 2 until about 5 p. m., and it is believed the accident may have occurred between 4 and 5 a. m.

Sheriff Wilson said Highway Patrolman F. E. Johnson of Paducah who investigated the accident, filed charges against Joe Zarate for driving while intoxicated.

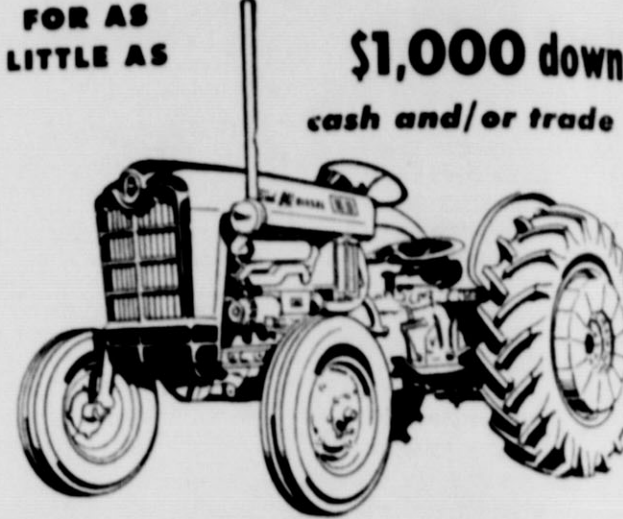

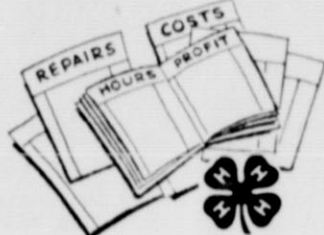

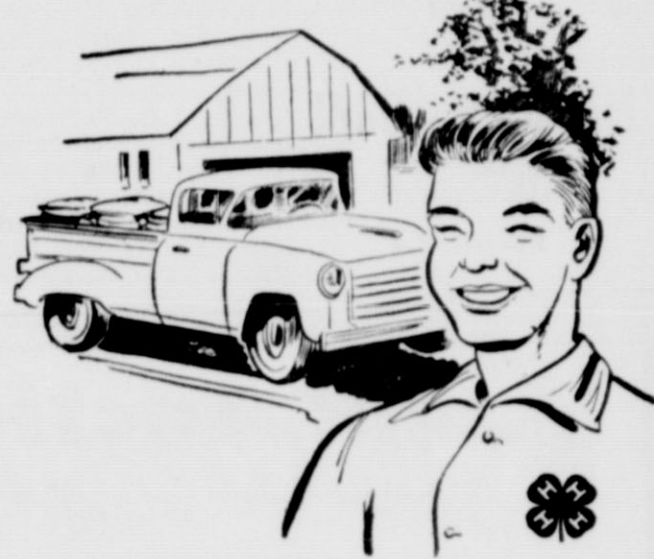
