## Annual Weather Report

NOTE: The following information was submitted by Don Baxter. This is the annual report, he received from the National Weather Service.

Precipitation averaged 6.24 inches above normal for the region. The range was from 16.09 inches above normal at Spur to 0.84 inch below normal at Morton. Despite below normal precipitation for the period February through May, copious amounts during the remainder of the year resulted in the well above normal averages.

The trend toward lesser amounts of

snowfall of recent years was slightly reversed during 1991 as the area average of 5.5 inches was the most since the near twelve inch average of 1988.

At Lubbock there were 51 days with thunderstorms, slightly above the long term average of 45 dating back to 1947. Hail was only reported on four days. The growing season of 215 days lasted from March 28 to October 29.

Blowing dust was reported on 19 days for a total of 41 hours slightly up from the 17 days and 36 hours of 1990, but well below the 44 year averages of 35 days and 136 hours.

The weather across the Texas South Plains during 1991 turned out to be slightly cooler than normal but much wetter than the long term averages.

Temperatures averaged 0.3 degree below normal and ranged from 1.2 degrees above the long term average at Lubbock to 2.5 degrees below normal at Brownfield.

Maximum temperatures averaged 1.0 degree below normal and ranged from 0.5 degree above normal at Lockettville and Lubbock to 2.8 degrees below nor-

mal at Spur. The highest temperature of the year was only 102 and that was recorded at Morton and Seminole on June 19th, Seminole again on June 22nd, Muleshoe on June 28th, Levelland on July 11, and at Paducah on July 20.

Minimum temperatures averaged 0.4 degree above normal and ranged from 2.0 degrees above normal at Lubbock and Matador to 3.8 degrees below normal at Brownfield. The lowest temperatures of the year occurred on November 3rd and Tulsa reported 3 below zero that morning for the coldest.

The major project this year for the Old Settlers Directors is the 55 year old 'pavilion', or 'Tabernacle' as it was called in the early years.

The building is all wood and the years of weathering by West Texas weather has taken its toll on the landmark.

All our ancestors have sat in and around the Pavilion during the heat of the day and then danced the hours away, as the fiddler struck his first and last cord.

My grandparents, Daisy and C.D. Bird were part of the first couples to start the 'picnic' held each year around the Roaring Springs Falls area.

In 1937, C.C. 'Columbis' Haile of Spur and president of Old Settlers, helped in the purchase and moving the 'Tabernacle' from the Spur Fair grounds to Roaring Springs for the reunion.

Some of the men involved in the disassemble and reassemble were Chic Russell, Red Mitchell, and Tutt Garnett, (according to Tribune files).

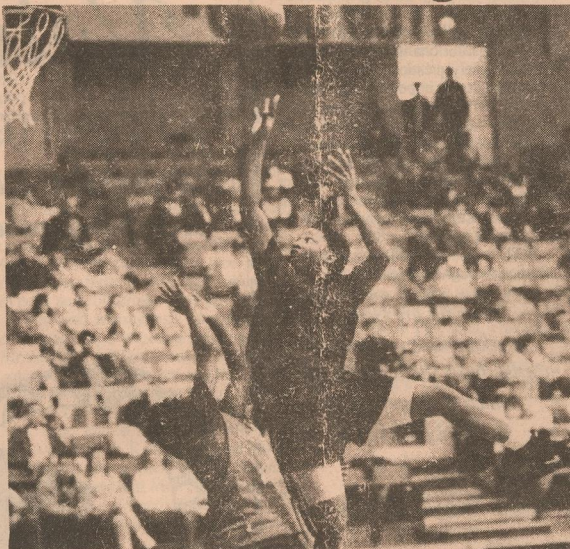

## Kathy Mangram Starting To Take Charge In College Basketball Action

practice, but we were ready for them." So far this season Mangram is Howard's third-leading scorer, averaging nine points, and third leading rebounder, averaging six boards per contest. She's also averaging two assists and three steals per game.

Kathy Mangram has come a long way since her post playing days at Motley County High School.

Now Mangram is a starting guard for the Howard College Lady Hawks. She is one of the reasons Howard is ranked No. 12 in the nation and carries a 15-3 overall mark and 5-0 Western Junior College Athletic record.

For four seasons Mangram was a starting post player for Motley County, averaging 18 points per game. When she came to Howard last season, HC coach Royce Chadwick decided to move the 5-foot-9 sophomore to guard.

Last year as a freshman, Mangram saw limited playing time on a team dominated by sophomores. She was more of a defensive specialist. This season she won a starting position and has been the catalyst in Howard's strong performance in conference play.

Take for instance last week in Howard's 8-68 win over No. 4 New Mexico Junior College. Mangram played what Chadwick called "her best game at Howard."

Mangram and Desiree Wallace were saddled with guarding NMJC's top scorer, Nicole McCrimmon. McCrimmon finished the contest with 27 points, but Mangram and Wallace did their jobs well in the first half. McCrimmon scored just two first half points as Howard took a 36-26 halftime lead.

Mangram capped a good all-around game by hitting seven of 11 shots from the floor and three of four from the line for 17 points. She also contributed game-highs of 14 rebounds and four steals.

"We knew New Mexico was ranked fourth in the nation and that we had to play well," said Mangram. "Coach had us hyped. It really might have not shown in

"One of the biggest improvements about Kathy is that she's shooting 48 percent from the floor," said Chadwick. "Last year she shot 46 percent but she only attempted 60 shots. At this point she has taken 103 shots. She's taking charge. She's quick, she can jump and she shoots and handles the ball exceptionally well."

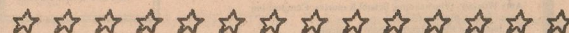
Though she has started to blossom offensively, Mangram admits that her first love is still playing defense. "I'd rather play defense than offense. I just feel more comfortable playing defense, I love basketball, I don't mind hustling," said Mangram.

Mangram said handling the ball was the biggest adjustment for her in making the switch from post to guard. "I knew I was probably going to play guard because I wasn't tall enough to play post," she said. "I wasn't used to handling the ball that much. It scared me because I didn't know how my dribbling was going to be. I get rebounds because I'm used to blocking out from playing post."

Chadwick gives all the credit to Mangram. "Kathy did it, me and Lisa (assistant coach, Lisa Chadwick) didn't do anything," he said. "Kathy has worked hard. When you work hard you improve quickly."

Chadwick likens her for formed Howard All-American Kim Robinson, now at the University of Texas-Arlington. "She's not a three-point shooter, she's a lot like Kim. It's hard to guard her because she's so quick. She's not as verbally bossy as Kim but she is physically bossy," aid Chadwick.

"Kathy never says anything, but when she gets the ball you know what she's thinking. She has really made herself a big time player."

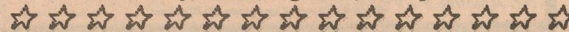

### West Texas Utilities Files Law Suit

Abilene, Texas --- West Texas Utilities Company today filed a lawsuit in Travis county to protect rights to property taxes it will pay to the state's new county education districts (CEDs). WTU said it will pay its \$9.8 million in taxes, including \$4 million to CEDs, by the Jan. 31 deadline.

"The lawsuit is not being filed to deny necessary funds to the school districts, but to protect the rights of the company and its customers if the tax is declared unconstitutional," said Jesse Turner, area manager. "Property taxes are an expense that goes into the cost of the product or service for any business and eventually are paid by customers."

"Because payments made without filing this suit would be considered voluntary payments by the Texas courts we have been forced to file a protective suit to reduce the risk of paying double taxes. We realize that the schools need the funds. That's why we do not want to withhold the taxes pending a court decision," said Turner, area manager. WTU joined a number of other Texas companies in the action.

Cases now are pending before the Texas Supreme Court, raising questions

about the legality of the Texas school property the law passed in 1991.

The new law groups school district into county education districts (CEDs) in an attempt to ensure a more equitable distribution of school taxes. Property owners must pay 1991 school taxes to both the previously existing school districts and the new CEDs, with the majority of the taxes allocated among the CEDs.

The constitutionality of the new law has been widely questioned, and the Texas Supreme Court is expected to decide the issue in early February. If the court decides that the county education districts are unconstitutional, tax payments already made to those districts may be considered "voluntary" and not subject to refund or credit. If the court rules that the tax is constitutional Turner said WTU will drop its lawsuit.

### TEXAS OUTDOOR WRITERS GIVE ANNUAL AWARDS

Just returned from the annual meeting of the Texas Outdoor Writer's Association held this year in Killeen. I was pleasantly surprised to have my radio version of Southwest Outdoors selected First Place in the Outdoor Radio category.

Winning first place for sharing information is not as financially rewarding as winning a high dollar fishing tournament, but it was nice to be recognized by one of the largest professional outdoor groups in America. Funny how getting that certificate made the long drive back to the Panhandle so much shorter than the trip down to central Texas.

**PHIL DUROCHER**, the new dynamic Director of Inland Fisheries for the Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPW) Department, announced several "proposed" changes that will affect anglers in this region.

The minimum size limit on flathead catfish in all Texas lakes will increase from 9 inches to 23 inches. Durocher wants to protect the long lived flatheads until they reach breeding maturity. The goal of 'maximum sustained yield' cannot be achieved if the slow growing flathead is harvested when he only weighs one-third of a pound.

Closer to home, a major change at LAKE MEREDITH is the TPW proposal to place a 12-15 inch slot limit on smallmouth bass! Public hearings on all proposals are being scheduled for March 2-6 in 39 cities across Texas. Closest hearings are scheduled for Amarillo and Lubbock, exact dates and time will be announced later. If approved, the proposals will go into effect Sept. 1, 1992.

**PLAYA PETE** wonders how many smallmouths below 12 inches must be killed while the young walleye are protected. PETE is looking for another solution that will protect both smallmouth and walleye.

## Safety When Handling Wild Pigs

NOTE: This article is issued from the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service.

Contact with certain wildlife species carries with it the risk of your coming into contact with any number of disease organisms. As a current illustration, wild pigs are susceptible to two serious swine diseases: swine brucellosis and pseudorabies. Humans can get swine brucellosis through handling infected tissues of wild pigs. Hunters are at risk when they dress wild pigs. It is recommended to take the

following precautions when handling feral hogs:

1. Always wear disposable plastic or rubber gloves when handling wild pig carcasses. Avoid direct contact with blood.
2. As soon as possible, wash hands with soap and hot water after handling wild pigs.
3. Burn, bury, or sanitize soiled rubber gloves and properly dispose of wild pig carcasses.
4. Whenever meat from wild pigs is to be eaten, it must be thoroughly cooked.

### The Christian and Work



Work. Work is not only an honorable endeavor, it is also ordained of God. Work provides the necessities of this life; it allows the ability to help others and it fulfills our basic purpose for being alive. Proverbs 6:6-11 shows us that an occupation (or job) is necessary. But what kind of job should we have? Skilled or unskilled? Blue collar or white collar? Manual labor or desk job? For the Christian, there are three basic questions to be answered about our occupation.

IS IT HONORABLE? Any occupation that is contrary to principles of morality, decency and spiritual truth as revealed in God's Word, is not the occupation for one who professes to be a Christian.

DOES IT HINDER SPIRITUALITY? The concern of the Christian is to "seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness." Any kind of job that would deter us from that purpose is not worth having - regardless of other benefits. If an occupation, or even a specific job, allows ungodly people to wield an influence in our lives that takes us away from assembling with God's people most of the time, that job is not worth the cost. If a job stifles our growth and deadens our appetite for the things of Christ, we need to find another way to earn our bread.

DOES IT PROVIDE SATISFACTION? To just "get by" in a job will not bring satisfaction; and it shouldn't. The Lord intends for us to work and live in such a way that we will have peace of mind. See Ecclesiastes 2:24. Any occupation will have some drawbacks, but if there is no sense of achievement that brings satisfaction, that occupation is the wrong one for you.

In our jobs, whatever they be, we need to be able to work, as Christians, and be of optimistic spirit. For that will give us the faith and hope to live daily for Christ: on the job, and off.



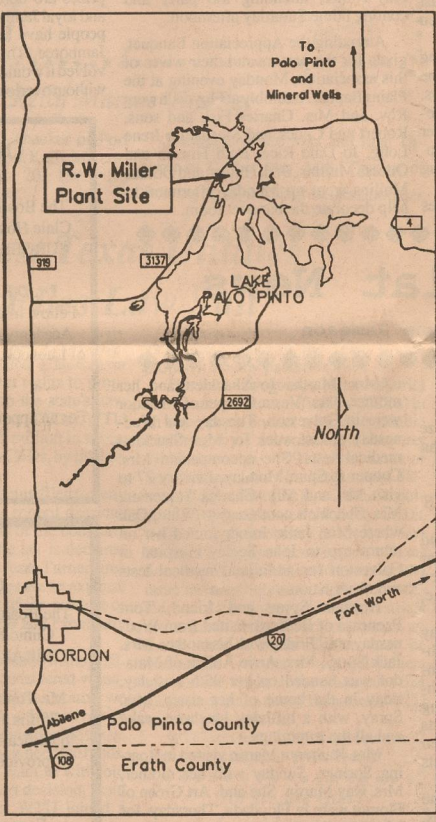
