Burial will be in East Mound Cemetery with Seigler Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Mrs. Garrison passed away about 10 p.m. Tuesday, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Bernice Daffern. She had been in failing health for several years and suffered a stroke two weeks ago.

The former Bertha Eudora Day, Mrs. Garrison was born November 21, 1887 in Erath County and died November 9, 1971, having attained the age of 83 years, 11 months and 18 days.

She was 17 months of age when her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Elbert A. Day, came to Motley County and settled in the Whiteflat community. She lived the remainder of her life in the county. She was married to Coke D. Garrison on June 15, 1904. He preceded her in death, August 26, 1938. One son, Raymond, also preceded her in death. She was a longtime member of the First Baptist Church and faithful in attendance as long as her health permitted.

She is survived by three sons, Dowel Garrison of Ruidoso, N.M., C. D. Highlight of Matador Ex-Students and Teachers 1971 Homecoming was the "Randall's Day" program which was presented in assembly Saturday afternoon, with Lucretia Edwards Campbell, president and John M. (Sonny) Russell, vice-president in the principal roles as commentators.

When the curtain was opened, a lone figure (Russell) sat at center of the stage, pecking out a letter on a typewriter, which he inserted in an envelope, together with a stick of chewing gum, and other miscellaneous items. The figure was identified with appreciation from the audience of exes, as J. R. (Randall) Whitworth, known affectionately by all his friends as "Rat," whose letters to far corners of the earth have stamped him as a one-man Chamber of Commerce, and earned for him the title of "Mr. Matador," and the undying gratitude of those whom he has remembered.

Mrs. Campbell and Mr. Russell, at opposite ends of the stage, then read excerpts from many letters of tribute to Mr. Whitworth, received from ex-students and teachers who were unable to attend the Homecoming. These included messages from Donna Williams Nelson of McMinnville, Oregon, and Major General Maurice Reilly, at the Pentagon. A letter from Rayworth Tilson of Lubbock was read which especially summed up the sentiments of everyone.

Personal tribute was paid Mr. Whitworth by several who came to Homecoming because of the program. These included Jack Robinson of Arlington, Texas, retired Lieutenant Colonel in the U. S. Air Force.

Orville Kuykendall of Lubbock, who played football here during Harvey G. Stanford's years as coach (1932 - 1935) revealed some interesting and humorous incidents which had occurred, and introduced Coach Stanford, who spoke, and added to the mirth with further comments regarding
