Voters Reject Schools Merger

DICKENS YOUTH ATTENDS 4-H CITIZENSHIP SHORT COURSE

David Warren of Dickens returned recently from Washington, D.C. where he participated in a Citizenship Short Course at the National 4-H Center.

He was one of 56 4-H members from Texas attending the week long session. During the summer more than 5000 teenage 4-H members from throughout the United States take part in the training sessions which are conducted by the National 4-H foundation in behalf of the Cooperative Extension Service of the State Land Grant Universities and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The course is designed to provide insight into individual responsibility for citizenship and to develop skills and knowledge that help young people relate their role in society to their community, their nation and their world. Discussion and seminar sessions feature topics of interest to youth and methods of dealing with problems through positive action.

The young people had a chance to see democracy in action and to study their American heritage through field trips to historic sites, the White House and Capitol Hill.

One of the highlights of the day on Capitol Hill was a visit with Congressman Graham Purcell and Senators Lloyd Benson and John Tower at a reception which the Texas 4-H Delegation hosted.

According to David, the most interesting feature about the short course was working together with 4-H members from other states, about specific ways in which young people can take action and design projects that reflect their concern and interest in citizenship. David will be available to 4-H Clubs in this county and neighboring counties to tell other 4-H members about the trip and show slides of the sights the group visited. He will also be glad to present his program to other civic groups interested in learning more about the Citizenship seminar.

The Texas group traveled by chartered bus from Brian, Texas, and spent their first night at Pine Bluff, Arkansas. On Friday night they were in Nashville, Tennessee, where they attended the "Grand Old Opry."

Other stops were made in Roanoke, Virginia, Petersburg, Virginia, Atlanta, Georgia and Jackson, Mississippi. One of the interesting points of the trip was a cruise down the Potomac River. This group was accompanied by 4 adult leaders, one of whom was Mr. Tom Davidson, the State 4-H leader of Texas.

David was surprised on one of the group sightseeing trips to meet two classmates from Patton Springs High School where they will all be Juniors next year. Randy Lawson and LeAnn Humphries were visiting the Smithsonian Institute at the same time the 4-H group was there. David knew his friends were in town, but had not believed he would see them since both groups were busy with their own activities.

David is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Warren of Dickens, former residents of Matador. He feels the trip was an experience he will never forget, and hopes that other 4-H members in the area will consider applying for the trip next year. He said that the information and knowledge he gained from the discussion groups will enable him to understand better what it means to be a responsible citizen.

Flomot Turns Down Proposal 98 to 47

VOTERS in the Flomot Independent School District, Saturday rejected a plan to merge the district with Quitaque and Turkey, by more than two to one. Flomot voted 98 against the proposal and 47 for.

The other two districts voted overwhelmingly in favor of the merger. Turkey voted 273 for and 4 against and Quitaque voted 186 for and 12 against.

Opponents of the highly controversial plan said Flomot would have assumed more than a fair share of the combined bonded indebtedness.

The plan would have required busing students from the three districts to a completely new school facility north of Flomot and south of Turkey and Quitaque.

An advantage of the proposed consolidation was \$600,000 state "incentive aid" which residents of the three districts hoped to receive.

Previously Loran Denton, superintendent of Turkey Independent School District, had said the "incentive aid" funds would be used for new construction or to pay off debts.

It has been declared that the amount of bonded indebtedness of Turkey and Quitaque is much greater than that of Flomot.

Four counties were involved in the Saturday election, Quitaque district in Floyd and Briscoe Counties, Turkey in Hall County and Flomot in Motley County.

Escobar was pronounced dead on arrival about 9:30 p.m. Thursday at Crosby County Hospital at Crosbyton.

Department of Public Safety officers said the car in which Escobar was riding traveled about 500 feet and rolled over four times after hitting the median.

Felix Ramirez, 43, of Route 1, Afton, a passenger in the car is in fair condition at Crosbyton County Hospital where he is being treated for lacerations, abrasions and bruises.

Escobar's body was taken to Campbell Funeral Home in Spur before being transferred to Amarillo.

The Escobar family lived in Roaring Springs during the late 1950's and early 1960's and Alfredo Jr., was employed at the Tribune during 1961 and part of 1962. The family later moved to Amarillo.

Voting Privileges Given 18-yr. Olds

VOTING privileges are now available to registered voters who are under 21 years of age. The announcement was received last week by Sheriff, Tax Assessor - Collector J. D. Spray from Texas Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. The new voters may cast ballots in all city, county and state elections, as of July 1, 1971.

Prior to that time, the 18, 19 and 20-year-olds could vote only in federal elections in Texas.

The notice reads as follows: This is to formally notify you that persons 18, 19, or 20 years of age, who are presently registered to vote for federal elections only, may now vote in all elections in your county and other political subdivisions.

The 26th amendment to the United States Constitution, which lowered the voting age to 18 in all elections, has been duly ratified by the state legislature, as prescribed by the Federal Constitution.

The Federal Register in Washington, D.C. confirmed July 1, 1971, that this new amendment went into immediate effect. The United States Constitutional Amendment over-rides Article VI of the Texas Constitution insofar as it requires an otherwise qualified voter to be 21 years of age to be eligible to vote.

Thus as of July 1, 1971, any registered 18, 19 or 20 year old may vote in any election - federal, state, county, city or any other political subdivision.

Persons who turned 18 years of age after the close of the regular 1971 registration period, may still register for the current voting year.

The certificate is effective for any election held 30 days after registration.

It is not necessary to segregate these late registrations from any other age classification on the list of registered voters. Also, do not stamp any of these registration certificates "For Federal Elections only."

office of the County Judge of Motley County.

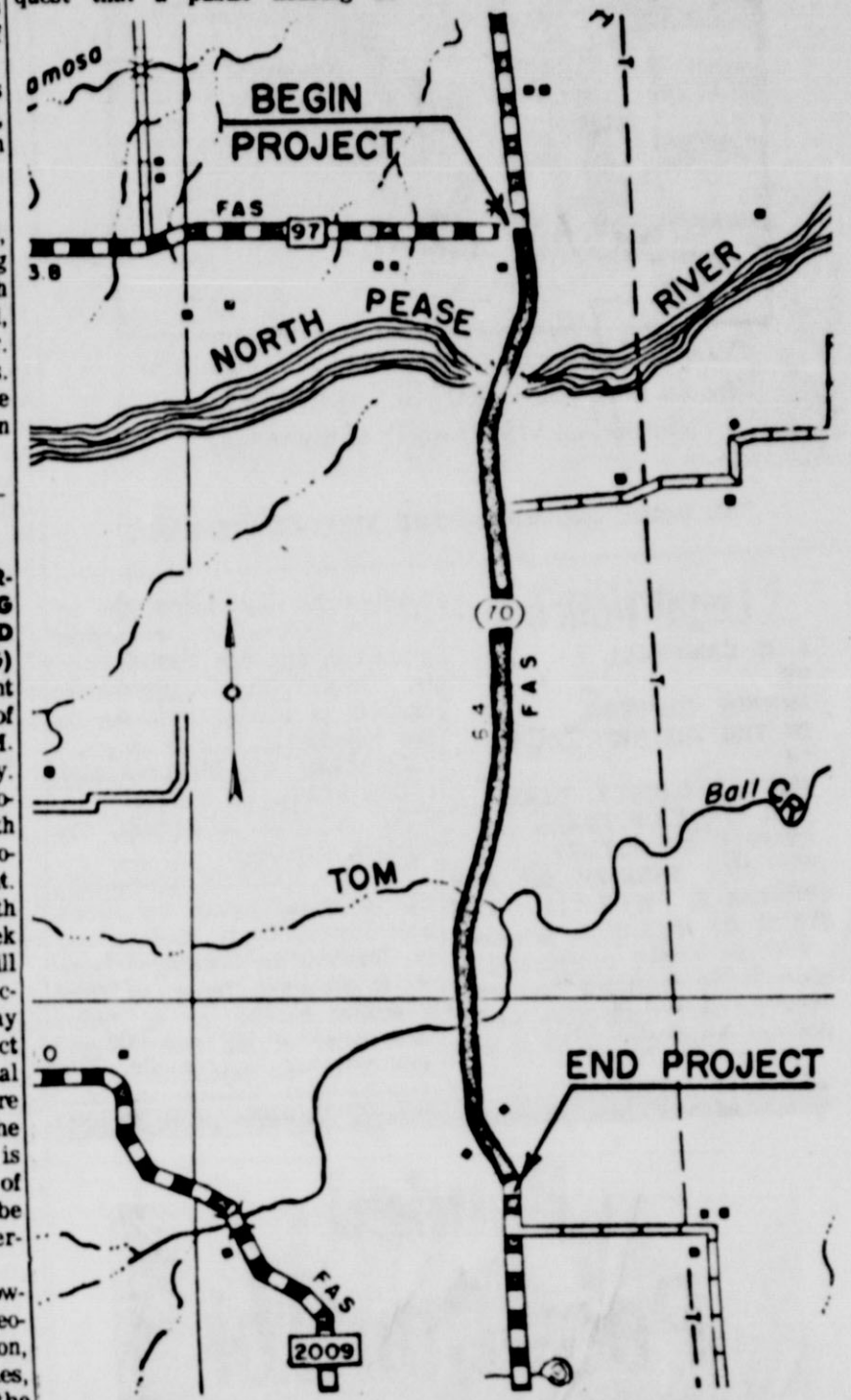

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

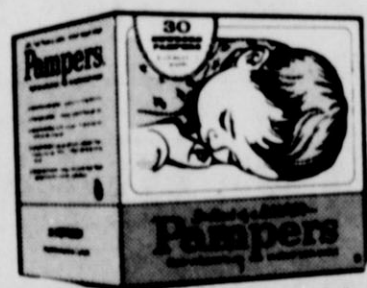

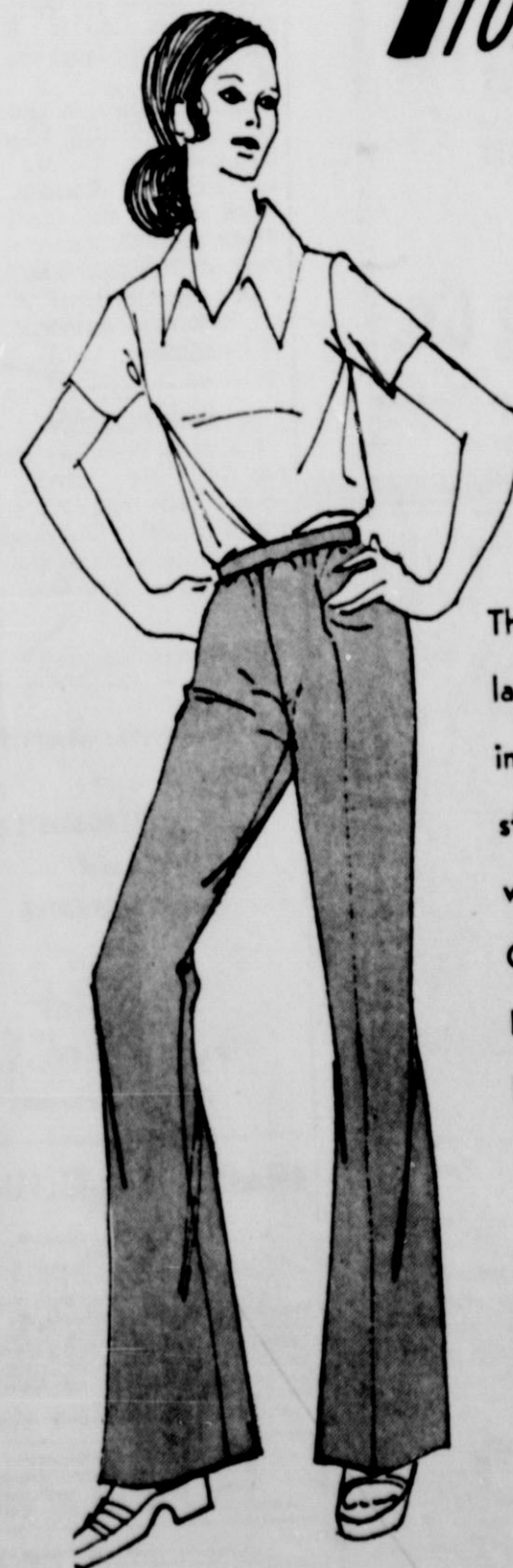
