Mr. Whitworth is a former Mayor of Matador and has served the community in various offices. He is a charter member, past President and past secretary of the Matador Lions Club, member of Odd Fellows Lodge, a former Scoutmaster and former president of the Motley County Singing Convention. He is a member of the Masonic Lodge, Scottish Rite and Shrine. He is a long-time member of the First United Methodist Church which he has served as Sunday School teacher, choir director and is on the Administrative Board. He is a veteran of World War I and a former Commander of Fleming Post American Legion.

Although born at Silverton in Briscoe County, Mr. Whitworth was reared at Flomot where his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Whitworth were early pioneers. After attending school at Flomot, he also attended Matador High School and the old Seth Ward School at Plainview. In 1917 he coached football at Matador.

After his return from military service in World War I, he was employed at the First State Bank in 1924, and has retained his duties there since that time. He is presently assistant Vice President.

Mr. Whitworth and Miss Margaret Caswell of Bullard were married in August, 1925. She had come to Matador to teach expression in the schools, and still holds that position.

### Matadors Swamp Bulldogs 26 to 0

The Amherst Bulldogs fell victim to the Matador Matadors in a district grid battle 26-0 Friday night in Amherst.

First quarter, both teams had a hard time finding the handle on the football but Matador pushed ahead in the second quarter when quarterback Bill Barnhill sprinted 16 yards for a touchdown. He sent a flying P.A.T. strike between the goal posts, giving Matador a 7-0 halftime lead.

In the third stanza, Barnhill sliced through the Bulldog line and scored with a 16 yard dash. The conversion run was stopped short.

Barnhill's third trip across the Amherst goal line came in the last quarter when he scampered 12 yards to paydirt and his kick was true. Fullback Smitty Smith

zoomed in for the game sealing touchdown from 8 yards away to pad the Matadors' victory to a 26-0.

Matadors' offense played the game most of the night with 22 first downs, while Amherst had 6 first downs. Showing good team effort and power, an aggressive Matador defense shackled the Bulldogs throughout the game and picked apart their pass defense as Amherst was able to complete only five out of 19 attempted passes. Barnhill had the most yardage production with 192 yards on 23 carries. Smith got in on the bonanza as he carried 18 times for 115 yards. Green, 90 yards on 16 carries and Martin 40 yards for 8 carries.

The Matador Matadors will meet the Lazzbuddie Longhorns here Friday night at Burleson Field for the Homecoming football game at 7:30 p.m. During halftime activities, Matadors' Football Sweetheart will be crowned.

# Old School Formerly Courthouse

(From Matador Tribune files, issue of October 25, 1954)

TIME has shifted the scenery and the actors on Matador's school stage in the past 60 years. (now 73 years ago.)

The first one-room school house was about the present location of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home (now Seigler Funeral Home) but Matador was growing in those early days and more room was needed. The small community pooled its resources and began construction of a large frame building on east

Dundee near the present foundation of the old high school building.

It was during the period of construction that the Old Southern Hotel was used as a school house. Desks and pupils were moved to the 2-story building on a site now occupied by the Matador post office. The temporary quarters were icy cold in the winter months, but all available funds were being put into the building and no improvements were made on the old hotel.

## Former Courthouse.

The hotel had previously been used as a courthouse after the first courthouse burned. Later county records were moved into the Moses Dry Goods building on the corner of Main and Dundee now occupied by Bob Stanley Pharmacy.

The pattern of history was repeated in 1944 when the courthouse again burned, and the county purchased the former Luckett building on the same corner. The building was used as a courthouse until construction was completed

on the present county building. The property now belongs to the Mackson estate.

During the vacancy, the old Moses building was used for all community gatherings, and church services were held in it by various denominations until they were able to build churches.

So the scene changes from the cold wooden building in the picture to Matador's modern school plant — to warm brick buildings with steam heat, hot lunches and school buses. Learning was dear in the days of the picture.

The building, originally was the Old Southern Hotel, and was located on the present site of the Matador Post Office.

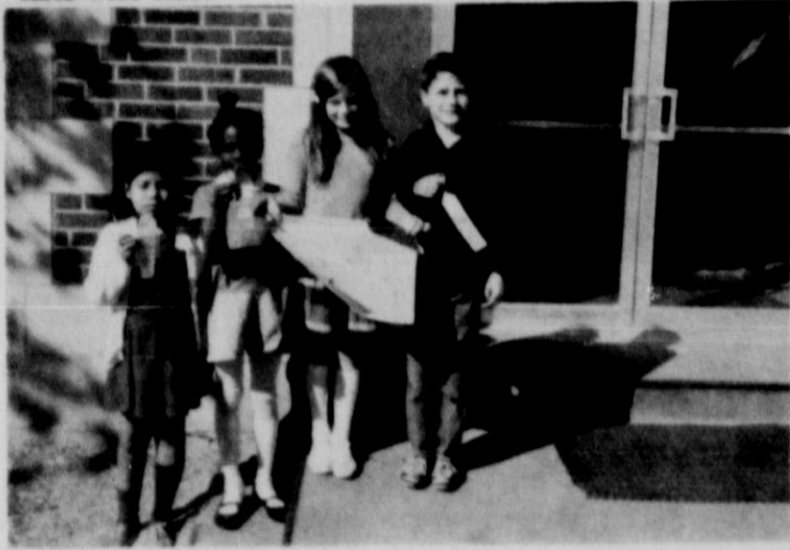

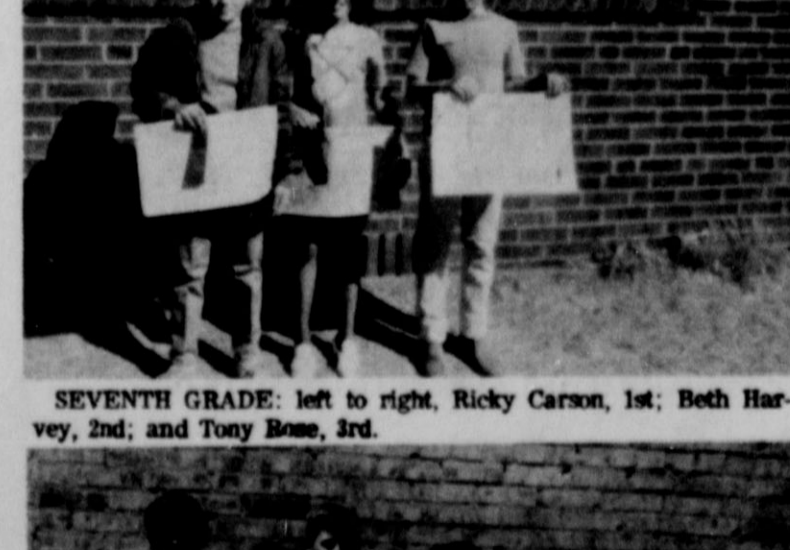

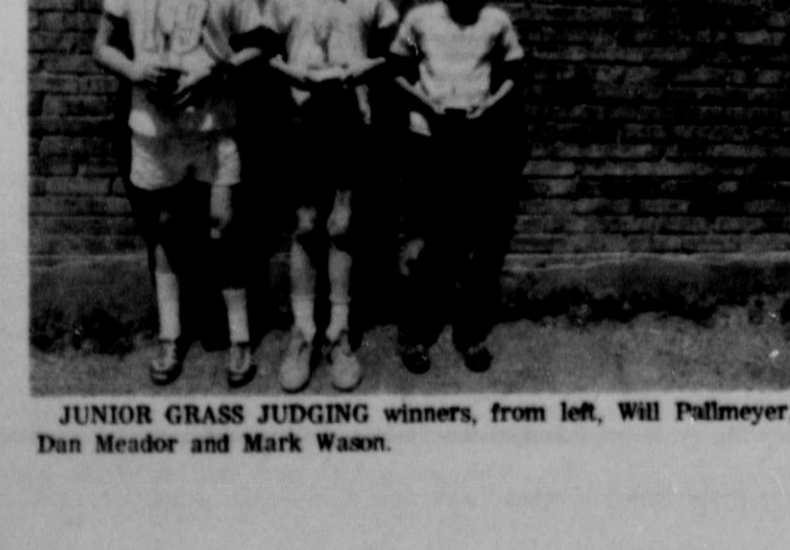

The small grains test has been planted in the north part of Matador on the Northfield road, with 60 varieties included in the 1971-72 test. Oats were planted on Oct. 5; wheat on Oct. 6; barley, rye and triticale on Oct. 7; and emmer and spelt on Oct. 12.

The north half of the entire plot was fertilized with 20-50-0 Zipp and the south half unfertilized.

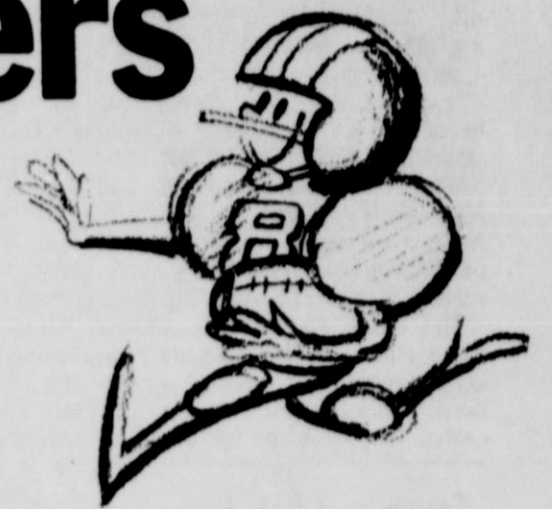

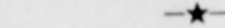

### Veteran Telephone Operator Tells Of Rewarding Years Serving Public

Remember when you once picked up a telephone, a voice, rather than a dial tone greeted you. "Number please?" was as familiar to some of us then as the sound of a jet engine is now. It was a way of life that recalls to us a more personal communication with one another.

Back in 1947, Inez Bailey was one of these voices when she joined General Telephone in Matador as a switchboard operator. She is still with General Telephone and has more seniority than any other Brownfield operator. However, when she started she didn't think she would last very long.

Laughingly she tells of the times when free circuits were rare and long distance calls were difficult to place and a happy long distance customer was just as rare.

"Some people were nice, but some really blamed us for the circuits being busy. One man in town yelled at me and I couldn't help it, I just had to let him know he was being unreasonable. He called my supervisor in a fit of anger, but the next day he had my name and delivered a box of candy to me. However, I thought my days as an operator were over."

They were far from over and Inez Bailey became a heroine and is credited with saving the life of a Flomot, Tex., woman. A newspaper clipping tells the story of Mrs. Joe Speer, who was alone at home in an area that had an eight-party line served from Matador. If any one of the lines was off the hook, none of the other telephone subscribers could be reached. Mrs. Speer was stung by a wasp and suddenly was unable to breathe. She reached her telephone and dialed. She lost consciousness after explaining her problem, but she failed to hang up the telephone, making it impossible for Mrs. Bailey to reach any of the sick woman's neighbors.

"I firmly believe after that experience that it is possible to reach another person's subconscious," the veteran operator says.

ator says, "because I repeated over and over for her to hang up her telephone. I just wouldn't give up. She finally did and I called her nearest neighbor who went over immediately to help. Right afterward a doctor who was visiting only eight miles away from the dying Mrs. Speer tried to place a call to his home. I told him to rush over. He did and saved her life."

Mrs. Bailey was commended afterward for the faithful service rendered beyond the requirements of her duties.

While in Matador, Operator Bailey served as an office instructor for seven years. "I helped train the new operators? Most of them were young people and I really enjoyed that," she said enthusiastically.

How does she feel about men becoming telephone operators? "They are very good. We've had some in Brownfield and they are excellent workers. I also like the students who work here part time and carry a full load of studies in school. You just have to admire them for their ambition and ability to work hard."

Mrs. Bailey has many memories of her years with General Telephone, but perhaps the most memorable is right after the big Lubbock tornado. "I had just returned from vacation and was exhausted

and didn't even know about the disaster. When I came to work that next morning there were hundreds of people trying to place calls. Our office was the closest one with Lubbock telephone service. The operators were told to work as long as they could during the emergency. We did. We were tired, but we felt as if we were helping a lot of people, so that made up for it."

What are the requirements for a good telephone operator? "I think you have to have a sense of humor and a compas-

sion for people. Most of our operators have these attributes and that is what makes them so great to work with."

Times have changed and the telephone service has changed, too. It is computerized, rapid and plays a most important part in our business and personal lives. We no longer hear Inez Bailey say "Number please?" but it is comforting to know that she is there behind that dial tone when needed, along with thousands of other dedicated telephone personnel just like her.
