Dads-Sons Receive Disguised Message

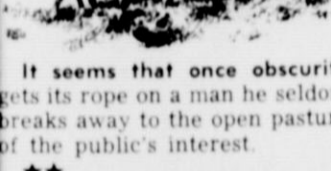

2nd Racer Gets "The Treatment"

Have you ever tried to get your car up to 136 miles per hour in 10.08 seconds ET (elapsed time)? You would need to make a few changes and you would probably need the services of local body expert David Badgett.

Tuesday he worked on a second racing car in order to help it attain more speed. He performed the body work for Don Hardy Racing Engineers of Floydada. The car was a 1966 Chevy II, being prepared for Kelly Chadwick, also of Floydada, who owns and drives the racer.

The new car looks like a conventional model but that is where the resemblance ends. Everything else is changed. The engine is removed and a 700 HP Chevrolet Engine installed. The tires are 10.75x15 with 10 1/2 inch tread, only there is no tread. They are smooth and carry six pounds of air.

Heavy iron braces upholstered in soft rubber protect the driver. Only one passenger has room as all the seats are removed. The driver wears a seat belt and shoulder straps.

You would also need to make some more changes in your present car to get the high speed, such as having an adjustable engine and front wheels. The fuel is alcohol and nitro. The cost of this new car is estimated at \$8,500.

Kelly Chadwick will drive the car in Houston this week end and about March 1, he will race with the top ten cars in the nation at Long Beach, California, and will tour the United States this summer.

David Badgett's ability to create changes in car bodies is well recognized, as is the extremely fine quality of his work.

The Matador boys and girls basketball teams capped their season's conference play Tuesday night with a 98-63 win for the boys and a 60-43 victory for the girls over Flomot here.

Charles Meador with 35 points and Pete Richardson with 32 led Matador in scoring 62 points the second half as they pulled away and increased their scant 36-30 half time advantage to the final 98-63 rout. This was Meador's best game and raised his point per game average in district play to 21.1 and Richardson's to 20.3.

Ruby Storey poured in 32 points to lead her team.

Monday night the Matador cagers won one and lost one when they met the Estelline Cubs in the local gym.

The girls handed first place in the district round robin to the Estelline girls as they fell 61-44 in the wake of a 32 point shooting wave by Estelline's Jane Helm. Ruby Storey canned 20 to take top scoring honors for the losers.

The boys, however, had one of their season's best nights, as Meador with 32 and Richardson with 26 paced them in caging the Cubs 92-62.

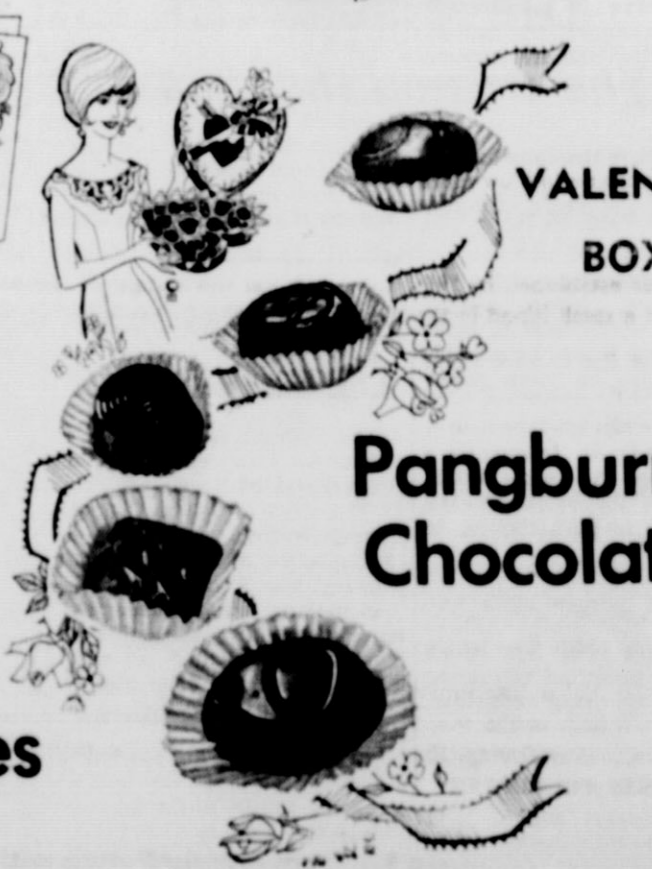

From these checks, it was noted that weevil population can be reduced to 1.10lb that of untreated fields by the time the diapause program starts. Fleahoppers are also controlled by early treatment, and there is less chance of a bollworm buildup as no control work is done during the time beneficial insects are on the buildup, normally in mid growing season. The first recommendations for 1966 are that farmers wait until after May 15th to plant, thus depriving early emerging weevils from a food source. Apply two early season control applications at a 5 to 7 day interval and before squares are 1.3rd grown. Efforts are being made by local organizations to offer this service at a very nominal cost. Additional information will be presented at the meetings which will be held the last of Feb. and first of March.

Like Huck Finn, Holden wanders around without ambition or creed, rejecting school and having school reject him. But no matter how harsh the rejection, Holden can not get along without the world and the people in it. For people are Holden's world. He hates being alone; he cannot live alone. The title itself is an allusion to Robert Burns' line of poetry, "if a body kiss a body coming through the rye." The kiss is changed to catcher. The significance of this title is almost the central idea of the book, because Holden is "always on the side of the underdog, the down-trodden, the young, standing there on the edge of the cliff in the field of rye, catching the little kids before they fall over the edge into the abyss of adulthood."
