Mavericks Conclude Outstanding Season

LOCKNEY fell before the Matador Mavericks on Oct. 23, to give the local eleven their fifth win of the season. Lockney went under 28-8 and completed the Mavericks 1967 season. Only loss was a two point victory won by Crowell.

Compiling an 8-0 lead and holding the home boys scoreless was mainly how the story was told in the first quarter. Johnny Thompson provided the icing to a Matador march with a four yard dash. Stanley Thompson ran the extras. It was in the initial quarter that the Lockney team realized that they were in for a long night. The traditional ground attack was put to good use, as only one pass was thrown on Matador's side. There wasn't such a thing as a one man team, as both teams defense and offense, played outstanding ball.

In the second quarter it was much the same story as both clubs scored. Kenneth Marshall plunged one yard off right tackle to make the score 14-0 in favor of Matador. But Lockney bounced back to stay in the ball game. The half-time score was Matador 14 Lockney 8.

In the second half, again Red scored twice and the hustling defense held Lockney to only their first half score. Kenneth Marshall rammed the last yard to stretch their lead to 20-8. In almost all cases when Lockney's offense got the ball they were forced to give it up in downs or through errors.

Keeping the scoring even, Johnny Thompson sliced through the left tackle's hole to hit paydirt for his second touchdown. Bill Barnhill faked the run to his left halfback and hid the ball on his hip, and ran unsmothered into the endzone for the extras.

The Mavericks were constant during the season with their good hard hitting, to show the ability of their coaches, J. E. Edwards, Pete Davis and Charles Meador. The majority of the players this year were eighth graders, but the reserves saw some action, so next year might prove to be just as rewarding.

In the first period the Matadors controlled the ball, but were unable to push in for a score as they fumbled on the Lockett 25 yard line. The Matadors then held the highly rated panthers to a scoreless quarter.

The Panthers took control of the second quarter as they scored on an 8 yard run, a 25 yard pass, and a 20 yard pass to take a 22-0 half-time lead.

During the third stanza Matador kept grinding out yardage for a number of first downs, but a couple of fumbles set the Panthers up for 8 points.

In the final period Lockett scored 6 as the Matadors' defense tightened. The offense then put a sustained drive together for 6 points with Joey Meador going the final 12 yards.

Joey Meador rushed for 143 yards, followed by Mark Hill with 38 yards.

On defense, Mark Timmons had 11 tackles, Darrell Cruise 9, Don Cox 7, Joey Meador 6, Jackie Bynum 6, and Darrel Marshall 5.

Winter Makes Formal Bow On Texas Panhandle Stage

Rain, Snow and High Winds Hit On Wide Front

WINTER hit the Texas Panhandle stage Sunday morning in a bow for attention on the weather scene, and stayed around for two impressive days as a massive storm swept several central states.

Almost continuous high winds out of the north and northeast pounded the Panhandle as the mercury flirted with freezing here. Light rain mixed with snow started late Monday and continued intermittently all day Tuesday.

Fuel dealers were hard-pressed as the storm increased and the chilling winds drove the passive summer warmth from homes and places of business.

Total moisture here was 52-inch according to Bob Stanley's rain gauge, and he recorded a 32 degree of mercury sometime early Tuesday, during one of the high wind squalls. Lockney received 2 inches and Paducah 1.15 inches to top reporting stations in the Panhandle.

One of the freakish aspects of the storm was the almost constant variations of the temperature. At one time Tuesday Matador was 15 degrees colder than Amarillo. Most of the day Lubbock was reporting colder temperature than Amarillo.

Since this area has not had a killing frost, it is believed that freezing temperature for the short time did not affect vegetation, due to the rain and snow that was falling at the time.

Tragic feature of the storm as it swept to the southeast was the loss of life and more than five million dollars property damage in Mississippi when two tornadoes appeared out of the Gulf of Mexico.

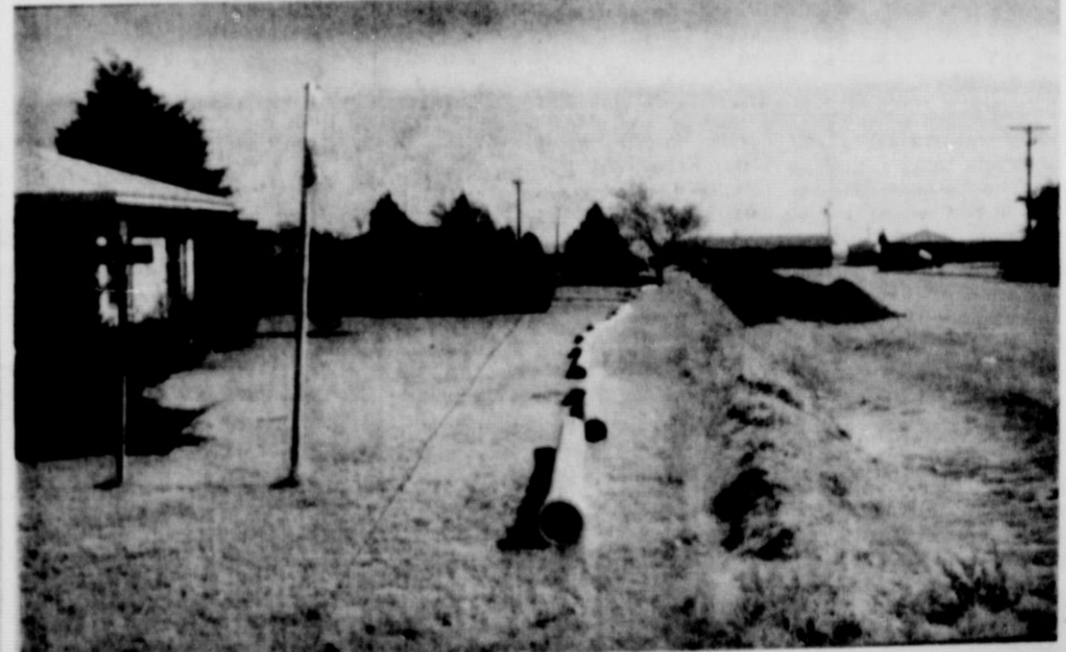

County Accident Summary Released

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Motley County during the month of September, according to Sergeant Floyd Etheridge, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no persons killed, two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$2,650.00.

The rural accident for this county during the nine months of 1967 total of 19 accidents resulted in no persons killed, 25 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$60,653.00.

Traffic wise, the month of October signals the beginning of the most deadly season of the year. From past experience, the last three months of the year most double the number of deaths occurring during the three months of the year.

The Sergeant listed factors which these three months more deadly (1) October and longer nights. These extended hours of darkness with dangers otherwise visible during the daylight hours (2) increase in traffic due to conveying school children, ball games, harvest wagons, trailers, and the holidays. (3) clement weather conditions. These factors in varying degrees coupled with high speed accidents that would not occur during the daytime.

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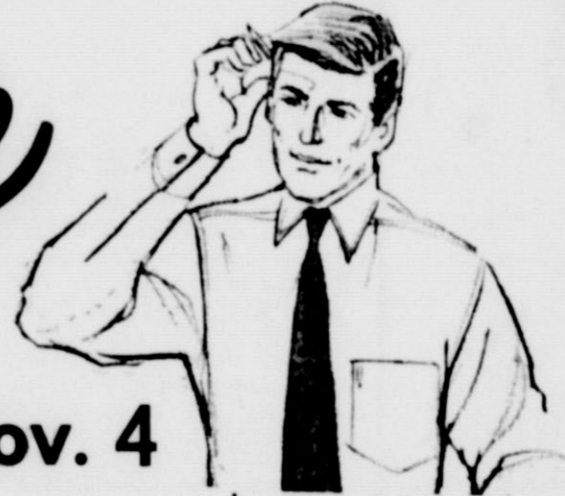
