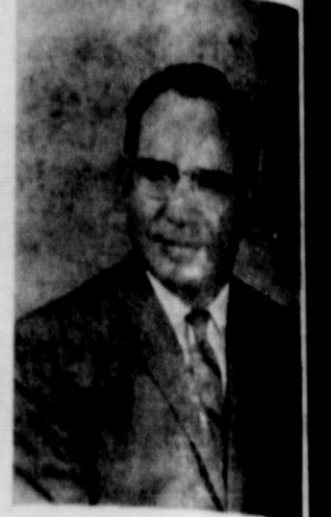

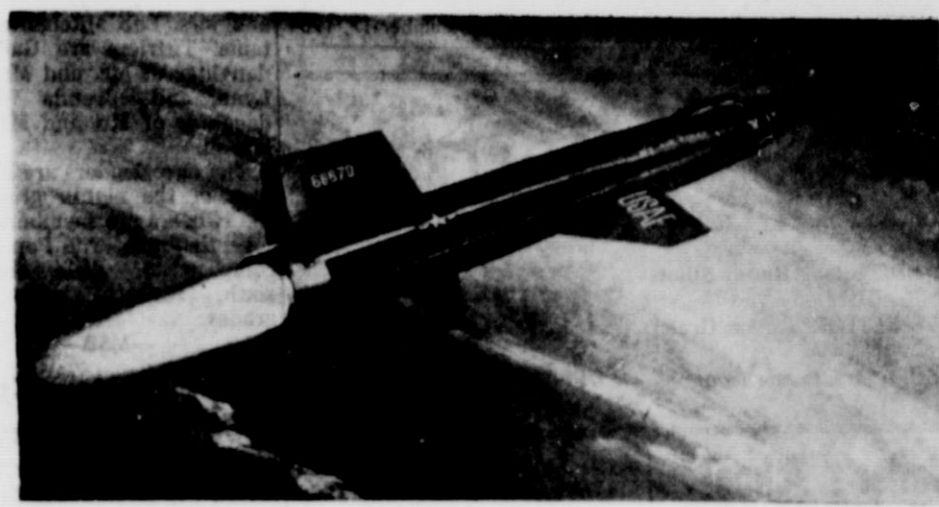

### County Agent PALLMEYER SAYS:

The application of sufficient fertilizer of the proper type is now accepted as one of the most profitable practices in crop production. Motley County soils vary greatly in their ability to supply nitrogen and phosphorus, with the soil test remaining the best single guide for determining the amount and grade of fertilizer used.

Now is the time to test soils where wheat and other small grain to be planted. Information blanks which should accompany the sample are available for the asking.

Livestock scales in the county were tested the week of Aug. 17. As a convenience to ranchers of the county, a regular schedule for testing will be followed in the coming years. A representative of the Texas Dept. of Agriculture, Weights and Measures Division will be in the county each August to test scales. This will give the owner time to have any repair work needed before weighing time, and insure that scales are in proper working order. Owners who want their scales tested each year are requested to notify me. Others will be notified to determine if they want their scales checked. There is a \$10 fee if the scales are sealed as OK, but no charge if they are rejected. Owners should clean around the scales before they are checked so they will be in top operating order.

A new Ruelene "pour on" formulation, RUELENE 8R, is now available for controlling horn flies, lice and grubs on cattle. The ready to use formulation has been approved by the Pesticides Regulation Division, and has not been known to cause burning or severe scurfing of the hide.

Ruelene 8R should be applied in a backline application at the rate of one fluid ounce per 100 lbs. body weight to animals weighing up to 800 lbs. and no

more than 8 fluid ounces for any animal weighing more than 800 lbs. A single treatment as soon as possible after heftily activity ceases will control grubs, horn flies and lice. Hornfly reductions may be obtained for as long as 3 weeks following treatment. Cattle treated for grubs may be retreated in the fall, winter or spring when lice become injurious. Ruelene 8R should not be applied in Oct. Nov. or Dec. to animals not previously treated for grubs. Cautions are:

Do not apply within 28 days of slaughter; do not apply to lactating dairy animals or dry dairy cows within 28 days of freshening; do not treat sick animals or those under stress from castration, dehorning,

disease, over exertion or excitement; nor within 10 days after shipping, weaning or exposure to disease. Such animals may suffer toxic side reactions. Cattle should have free access to water and feed before and after treatment. When branding at treatment time, brand first; then treat with Ruelene 8R to avoid the possibility of hair catching fire, as the material contains an oil base that facilitates close adherence to the skin and lessens runoff.

The pitch fork is still as important as insecticides in control of up manure piles and spraying around the farm are both essential to rid the farm of these pests.

Nearly 500 million tons of agricultural products are harvested annually in the United States. Since each of these products is handled an average of four to six times, effective processing and distribution depends on the use of modern techniques and methods.

Mesquite, which is becoming a problem in parts of Texas where it was previously unknown, is sometimes spread by animals. Animals transported from infested areas carry the mesquite beans in their digestive systems. Confinement of animals a drylot for three to five days after they arrive in a new area will allow mesquite seed to be eliminated from their systems.
