LONDON, May 13 (Sp1)—The heirs to the royal house of the Netherlands—Princess Juliana, her husband Prince Bernhard, and their two children—arrived in London today.

Princess Juliana led her two-year-old daughter Beatrix by the hand, while nine-month-old Irene was brought in a gas-proof box. Prince Bernhard carried one end of the box and a nurse the other.

The Earl of Harewood, brother-in-law of King George VI, met the royal family at the station.

The name "Irene," signifying "peace," was chosen by Bernhard and Juliana for their infant daughter born within a month of the outbreak of the current European war because, Bernhard said at the baptism, "peace has such great importance for all in the present times."

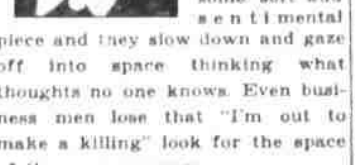
Judith Pickle To Receive Degree From University

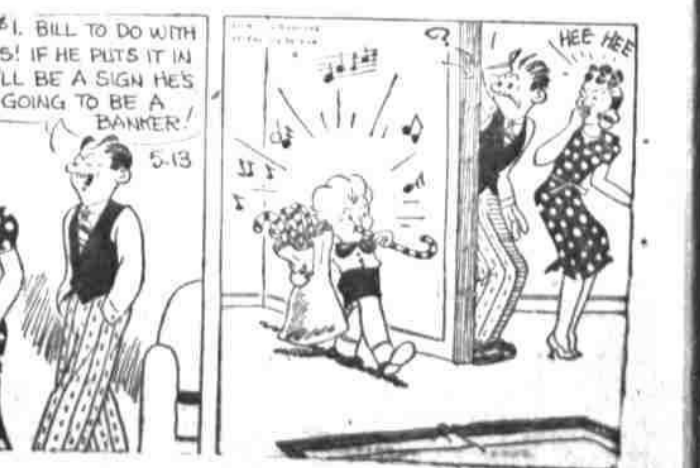

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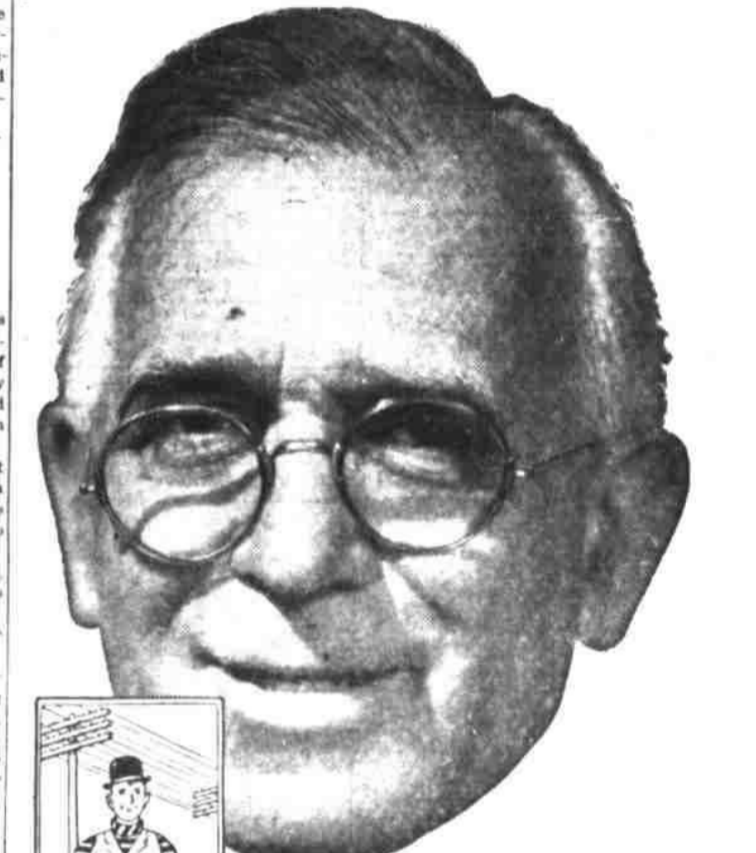
