A fixed opinion merely means that the gate open to allow a thought in, has slammed shut.

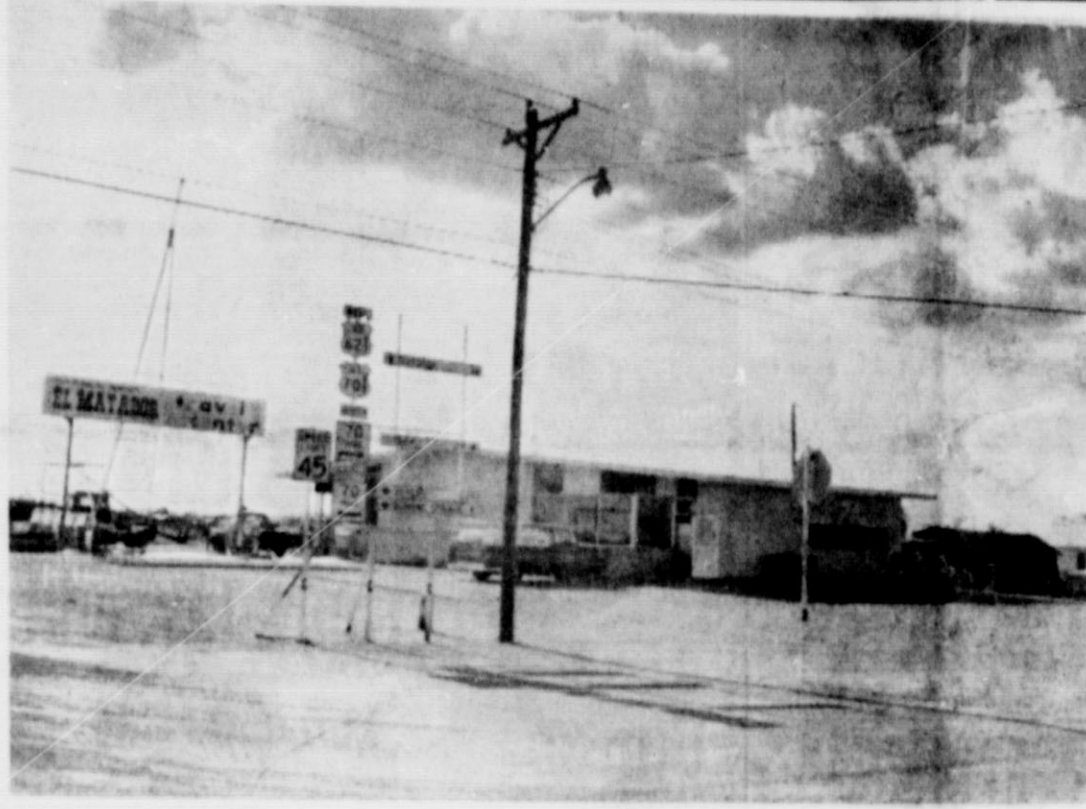
The decoration has no particular appeal, but a great many calendar leaves have been torn away since I have seen a marriage license framed on a living room wall.

Area Pea Acreage Program Launched

MEETING with a small but interested group of area farmers at the Roaring Springs Ag building Friday night, Iradell Holmes, manager of Holmes Green & Dry Pea Co. of Post, explained the new cash crop plan for green peas in detail. He told the farmers that he would provide the blackeye pea seed at cost (he advised planting 20 lbs to the acre) and that he would carry the seed cost until harvest. He said distribution of blackeye seed would be through Marshall Feed & Seed of Roaring Springs.

He said he would gather the peas either by machine or manual labor and that the producer would receive \$1.75 per cwt in the field guarantee. He said the average dry land production is not less than 1000 lbs. per acre in Dawson and Garza Counties. Planting less than ten acres however, is not practical, Holmes said.

Mr. Holmes did not make a speech but talked in an informal meeting, frequently answering questions. He pointed out the great fertilizer value of blackeye peas to land and said some farmers plowing up vines after harvest estimated as much as \$12 value per acre to the land. He said on irrigated land that green peas frequently made as much as 3000 lbs. per acre. The Holmes firm owns six mechanical green pea harvesters.

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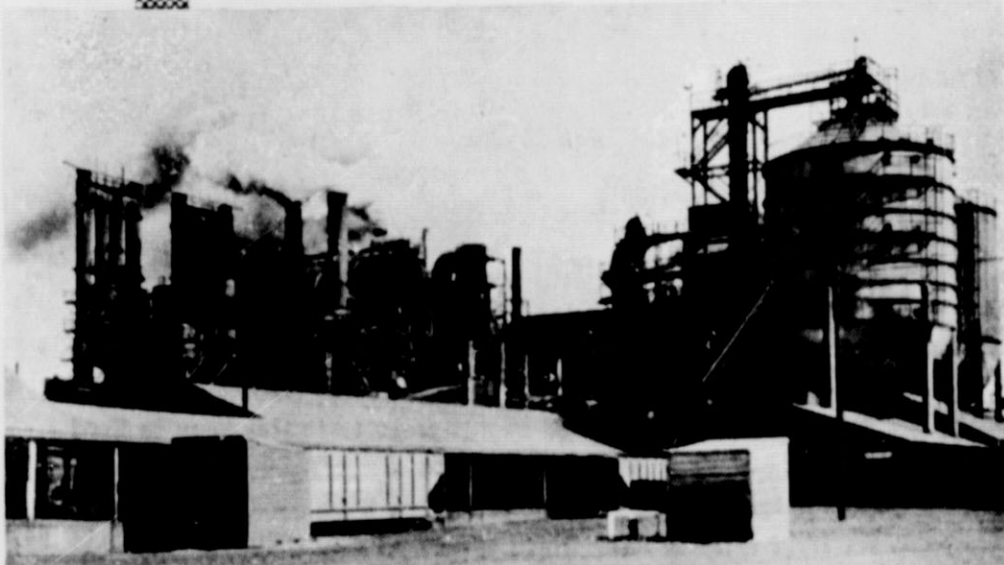
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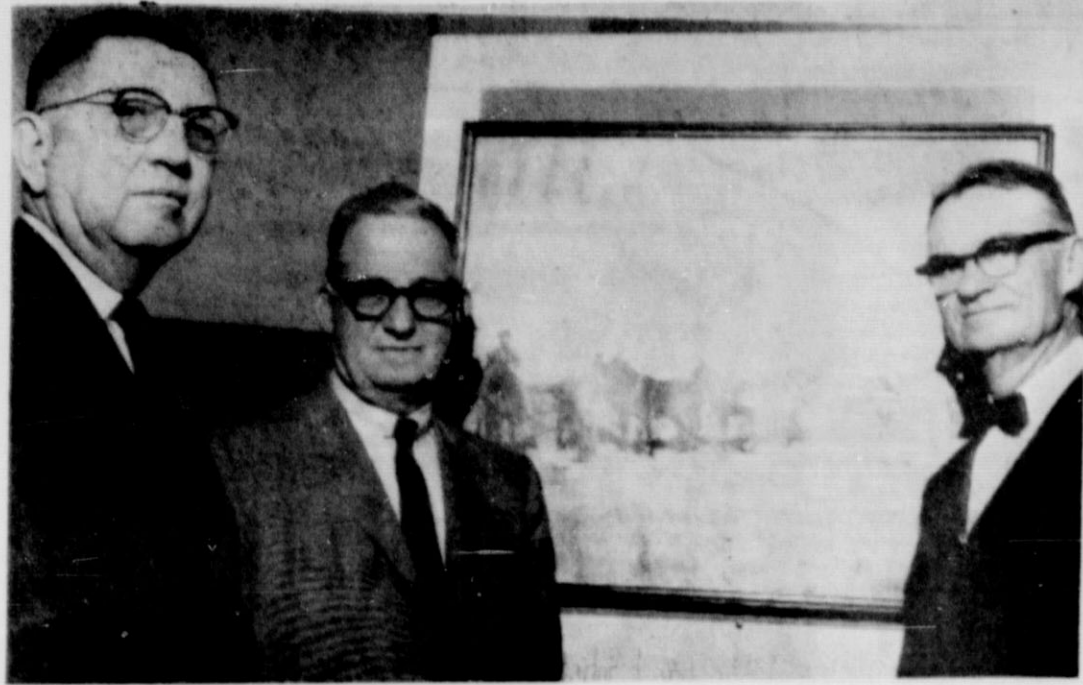

Great Seal of Ranch Goes to Collection

The final epilogue to the fabulous story of the Matador Land and Cattle Company has been completed for Texas Tech's Southwest Collection.

The Collection, Tech's archives, which has been collecting materials on the Matador for a number of years, recently received the great bronze seal of the company, which was liquidated in 1951.

All in all the Southwest Collection has received records and other information totaling 314,000 pieces of material on the unique organization.

The seal, which contains the image of a large bull, was sent to the Collection by J. W. Hatch, director of Lazard Brothers and Company, Ltd. of London, the syndicate that purchased the land.

First major book based on the

Collection records was completed by Dr. William M. Pearce, Tech's academic vice president, and released in February.

Dr. Pearce utilized the records in writing the history of the extraordinary enterprise which combined a "magic" formula of British and American financing, prudent Scottish management and 1½ million acres of West Texas range lands.

The book, entitled "The Matador Land and Cattle Company," was published by the University of Oklahoma Press, and is currently on the market.

The story of the Matador, contained in the voluminous records of the collection, is the story of a group of Scottish businessmen, lured by reports of fantastic profits to be found in American cattle-raising ventures, who organized the Matador in 1882.

They met near disaster in the form of drought, a drop in the cattle market and a severe blizzard, but survived to become the only foreign-controlled cattle company to survive to the middle of the 20th Century.

The vast Matador touched the lives of thousands of West Texans, whose histories have been enriched with the life and times of the great spread.

They began compiling the records, pictures and other materials more than 30 years ago, when Dr. Bailey Carroll, now at the University of Texas, received permission to bring the records to Tech.

The American headquarters records were kept at Denver, Colo., including correspondence, books, ranch manager's reports and other information. Other records came from Dundee, Scotland, and additional material has come from a variety of sources in the state, especially West Texas.

Dr. W. Curry Holden, now director of the West Texas Museum, first introduced Dr. Pearce to the Matador materials, from which the Tech vice president ultimately wrote his book.

Currently the Southwest Collection devotes an entire display case to the Matador, with selected manuscript materials, as well as documents being exhibited.

Dunn estimates that in addition to Dr. Pearce's publication there will be many more manuscripts written on the Matador, based on the vast and now complete materials compiled through the years by Tech's Southwest Collection.
