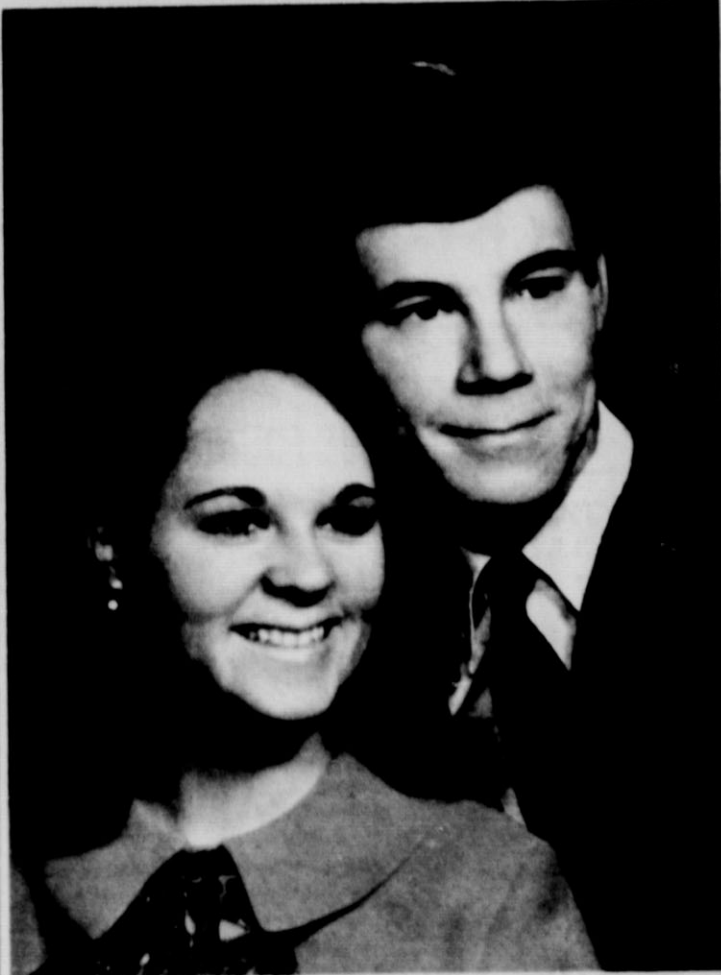
Attend Wedding During Holidays
