Church Postpones Anniversary Date

Teacher Awarded Math Scholarship

Mrs. J. E. Edwards, Matador High School mathematics instructor has been awarded a National Science Foundation scholarship for graduate study in mathematics.

The course will be held at West Texas State University in Canyon. Mrs. Edwards was awarded the scholarship by applying at the University, and will be taking classes in modern algebra and modern geometry. Approximately 30 other teachers will attend the course.

This math course will add six hours to Mrs. Edwards' academic credit. In all, she will have 21 hours above her Master's degree. Her graduate work above the Master's was done at Texas Technological College, Lubbock and the University of Houston.

Mrs. Edwards received her Bachelor's degree at Texas Woman's University in Denton. Her Master's degree was completed at West Texas State. Both degrees were in mathematics.

Advance Time Starts Sunday

You don't have much choice, if you pay any attention to time. It is going to change Sunday to Daylight Saving Time and to keep in pace, clocks and watches must be advanced one hour.

DST will affect almost everyone except those sleeping or fishing. Train, plane and bus schedules, office hours, schools and churches and hundreds of other factors affecting millions of Americans will come under the new time at 2 a.m. Sunday.

Supt. Chas. Johnson said the Matador school system will observe the new time Monday morning. Pastors of local churches announced that they would observe the new time for Sunday worship.

DST will continue six months, until 2 a.m. on the morning of October 27, when clocks will be turned back to 1 a.m. standard time.

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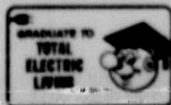
