### STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

The gospel of Christ is a new religion; it is found in the New Testament. This new religion replaced the Old Testament... then He said, "Behold, I have come to do thy will." He takes away the first in order to establish the second. Heb. 10:9.

Read Paul's contrast of the two covenants as taught by an allegory in Gal. 4:19-30. The allegory presents the two covenants as two Bible women-Hagar, the bondwoman and Sarah, the free woman. Near the close of this lesson, Paul writes,

"But what does the scripture say? 'Cast out the bondwoman and her son...' Gal. 4:30.

The "bondwoman" represents the Old Law which was cast out. Listen again. In discussing the two covenants, Paul tells the "brethren in Christ who are at Colossae that

"He has taken it out of the way, having nailed it to the cross. Col. 2:13-17, especially v. 14.

The word "it" refers to the law which contained food and drink offerings, festivals, new moon, Sabbath day, etc. the Old Law.

"He taketh away the first," "Cast out the bondwoman," and "Nailed it to the cross," tell us what was done with the Old Law. This notifies us that the two covenants are not in force during the same dispensation. Christ is the mediator of the New Testament.

When He said, "A new covenant," He has made the first obsolete. But whatever is becoming obsolete and growing old is ready to disappear. Heb. 9:15.

Also, Paul writes that a return to the Old Law amounts to "falling from grace." Gal. 5:4.

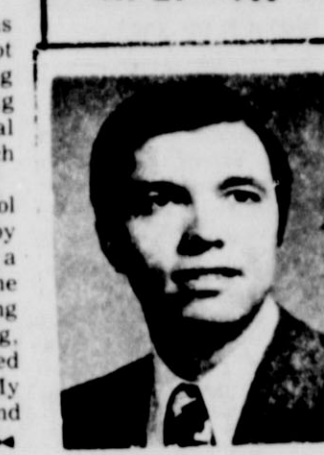
