"Many may be eaten without harm," he advised guests. "But," he cautioned them, "some of these may be poisonous if prepared improperly.

Mesquite beans may be ground into flour. So can Cat Claw beans. These were sometimes ground pod and all by our ancestors. Tornillo is actually better than either mesquites or catclaws, because of the sugar content,"

he said. "Most of you know about berries. Probably as teenagers you ate them fresh off vines or bushes. And you're familiar with Sunflower seeds. "These were obtained in early days by rubbing Sunflower heads against rocks. Not only does the Sunflower produce an oil, but it was occasionally made into a poultice to treat heat

exhaustion," he continued. Grass burr, cat tails, and prickly pear were also listed as possible food sources. "Grass burr could be

ground into a type of flour. The tender shoots of cat tails taste a little like celery, and even the cigar shaped seed heads are edible," he said. "Many species of prickly pear have fruit. Most of you have eaten this, or at least heard of others doing it. But some Indians apparently ate all of the prickly pear including the pads. I guess the stickers made them so he quiped, then fierce." added, "they dipped the pads in batter and fried them. These weren't bad fried, but raw, the pads tasted like Elmer's Glue."


Even so faith, if it has no works, is dead, being by itself. James 2:17.
